MOSAIC DEDICATION

The mosaic mural dedication on Saturday, April 15th at 12 noon will be held in Bethany Hall, accompanied by a pot-luck luncheon (see sign-up sheet in the narthex). **Tricia Morgan**, who designed and led the project from start to finish, will speak on the process of making and completing the mural. Many thanks to all the volunteers who made this extraordinary mosaic possible. It took almost 4 years and many hours of dedicated work and inspiration. Join us in celebrating its completion and honoring those who made this vision a reality.

JEANS GO GREEN

During 2017 the Guardians of Eden will have an ongoing project: 'bluejeansgogreen'. GOE will sponsor collection drives for used, worn and washed denim periodically throughout 2017. The first collection runs through the month of March.

A collection chest labeled 'bluejeansgogreen' is now in the Narthex. Any worn and washed denim items—shirts, jackets, jeans, skirts, etc. can be placed there. Even decorated denim items can be donated!! Items will be taken by volunteers to local Madewell stores participating in this campaign. Madewell then ships the collected denim.

These denim items are upcycled into cotton based housing insulation installed by groups such as Habitat for Humanity. Our hope is that Salem's denim ends up used in local Habitat For Humanity projects.

LET'S REVIVE HELPING HANDS

For many years Salem had an organization called Helping Hands that provided assistance to Salem members. It mostly centered on providing transportation or running errands like picking up prescriptions or groceries. The Kroft family and later Ida Smith were the coordinators of Helping Hands. It would be a blessing for the congregation to have an organization like Helping Hands so that Salem members would know who to ask for assistance. Right now requests are coming in to the pastors who have no where to turn but to try on an ad hoc basis to find help. Would you be willing to lead and help reimagine such a ministry? If so then please talk to Pastor Dave.

PERU FLOODING AND MUDSLIDES



At the end of January, a local El Niño weather pattern formed in Peru due to an abrupt increase in the surface temperature of the ocean and is expected to continue until at least April. Torrential rains have generated floods and mudslides in 24 out of the 25 regions in the country. States of Emergency have been declared in 12 regions due to the flooding risk, while seven regions have declared a State of Emergency due to sanitation risks. There has been significant damage to infrastructure and homes. The drainage system in Chiclayo and Piura have collapsed due to the

intensity of the rain. Sanitation is also a huge concern as are vector-borne illnesses, especially Zika. Access to potable water, even in Lima, has become scarce. According to the latest National Institute of Civil Defense (INDECI) report, 11,519 houses have collapsed and 12,440 houses are uninhabitable.

Lutheran World Relief, in coordination with the ACT Alliance and CEDEPAS Norte, is helping those affected by the flooding and landslides by providing humanitarian assistance in three districts and seven communities in the province of Trujillo, in the region of La Libertad, and in the north of Peru (Quirihuac, Plazapampa, Santa Victoria and San Pachuzco in Laredo, Guayabito and Dos de Mayo in Poroto and Simbal in the district of the same name). LWR is procuring and distributing tents, inflatable mattresses and mosquito nets, as well as conducting trainings on sanitation and hygiene and offering food assistance. We will reach more than 1,400 families identified as the most affected, giving priority to households headed by women, households with large families, and people with disabilities.

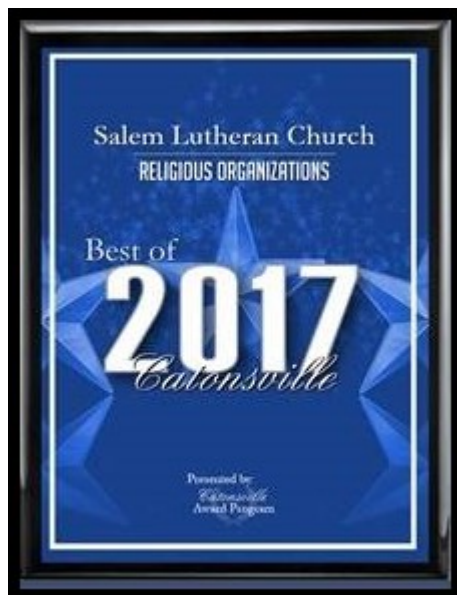
CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

INTRODUCTION TO ADULT FORUM'S STUDY OF LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM

Under the leadership of Pastor Asendorf, Sunday mornings find members of the congregation in the Katie Luther Room during Sunday school time studying Luther's Small Catechism. The Small Catechism invites us to engage in studying the Bible, to discover ways of how we should share and build our relationships with God and our community, to find meaning in our daily lives and to make a witness to Christ in God's world.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

As part of our celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, Pastor Dave has been reviewing Martin Luther's Small Catechism in Adult Forum. For the next several issues of The Monarch, we will reprint Luther's explanations of The Ten Commandments, The Apostle's Creed, The Lord's Prayer, The Sacrament of Holy Baptism, Confession, and The Sacrament of the Altar (Communion).

I. The Ten Commandments

As the head of the family should teach them in a simple way to his household.

The First Commandment.

Thou shalt have no other gods.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear, love, and trust in God above all things.

The Second Commandment.

Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord, thy God, in vain.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not curse, swear, use witchcraft, lie, or deceive by His name, but call upon it in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks.

The Third Commandment.

Thou shalt sanctify the holy-day.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not despise preaching and His Word, but hold it sacred, and gladly hear and learn it.

The Fourth Commandment.

Thou shalt honor thy father and thy mother [that it may be well with thee and thou mayest live long upon the earth].

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not despise nor anger our parents and masters, but give them honor, serve, obey, and hold them in love and esteem.

The Fifth Commandment.

Thou shalt not murder.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not hurt nor harm our neighbor in his body, but help and befriend him in every bodily need [in every need and danger of life and body].

The Sixth Commandment.

Thou shalt not commit adultery.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may lead a chaste and decent life in words and deeds, and each love and honor his spouse.

The Seventh Commandment.

Thou shalt not steal.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not take our neighbor's money or property, nor get them by false ware or dealing, but help him to improve and protect his property and business [that his means are preserved and his condition is improved].

The Eighth Commandment.

Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not deceitfully belie, betray, slander, or defame our neighbor, but defend him, [think and] speak well of him, and put the best construction on everything.

The Ninth Commandment.

Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not craftily seek to get our neighbor's inheritance or house, and obtain it by a show of [justice and] right, etc., but help and be of service to him in keeping it.

The Tenth Commandment.

Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's wife, nor his man-servant, nor his maid-servant, nor his cattle, nor anything that is his.

What does this mean?--Answer.

We should fear and love God that we may not estrange, force, or entice away our neighbor's wife, servants, or cattle, but urge them to stay and [diligently] do their duty.

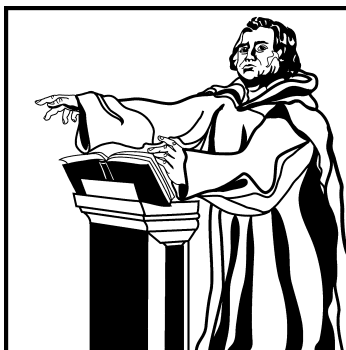
What Does God Say of All These Commandments?

Answer.

He says thus (Exod. 20:5f): I the Lord, thy God, am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate Me, and showing mercy unto thousands of them that love Me and keep My commandments.

What does this mean?--Answer.

God threatens to punish all that transgress these commandments. Therefore we should dread His wrath and not act contrary to these commandments. But He promises grace and every blessing to all that keep these commandments. Therefore we should also love and trust in Him, and gladly do [zealously and diligently order our whole life] according to His commandments.

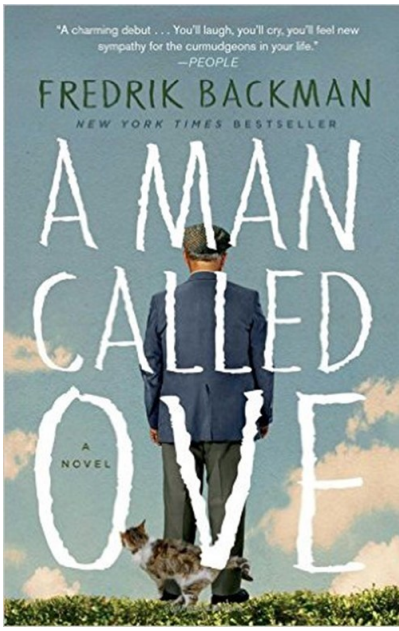

BOOK GROUP – APRIL



Salem's Book Group met on March 13th to discuss *The Invention of Nature: Alexander von Humboldt's New World* by Andrea Wulf.

On April 10th, the group will discuss *A Man Called Ove* by Fredrik Backman. Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man who points at people he dislikes as if they were burglars caught outside his bedroom window. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse. People call him “the bitter neighbor from hell.” But must Ove be bitter just because he doesn't walk around with a smile plastered to his face all the time?

Behind the cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. So when one November morning a chatty young couple with two chatty young daughters move in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale of unkempt cats, unexpected friendship, and the ancient art of backing up a U-Haul. All of which will change one cranky old man and a local residents' association to their very foundations.

A feel-good story in the spirit of *The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry* and *Major Pettigrew's Last Stand*, Fredrik Backman's novel about the angry old man next door is a thoughtful exploration of the profound impact one life has on countless others. “If there was an award for ‘Most Charming Book of the Year,’ this first novel by a Swedish blogger-turned-overnight-sensation would win hands down” (*Booklist*, starred review).

The Book Group will close it's 2016-17 season with *The Shack* by Wm. Paul Young on May 8th and *American On Purpose* by Craig Ferguson on June 12th.

REFORMATION 500 CELEBRATION

A tour of the United Lutheran Seminary at Gettysburg is our next event in our Reformation 500 celebration year. The tour is scheduled for Saturday, May 20, 2017. The Seminary, founded in 1826, is the ELCA's oldest and most historic seminary. Its heritage includes service as a hospital after the Civil War battle in July 1863.

We should plan to be at Gettysburg by mid morning so we will need to leave Catonsville at about 8:30 AM. In order to plan possible transportation options, we need to know how many people are interested in participating. If there is enough interest, we might try to arrange bus service but will also explore car pools. Watch for a signup sheet in the Narthex in April to indicate your interest and whether or not you would be able to drive.

SOCIAL MINISTRY POTLUCK



Robin Stockwell from Gilchrist Hospice gave a presentation about Gilchrist's partnership with Ngoranga Lutheran Hospital Hospice on March 26, 2017 at the annual Social Ministry Potluck. We learned about the many challenges in the Tanzania countryside, and the journey of faith in trying to care for the 900+ patients in the area with 5 paid staff members and 40 volunteers. The partnership between Gilchrist and Evangelical Lutheran Church Tanzania is committed to providing both operational

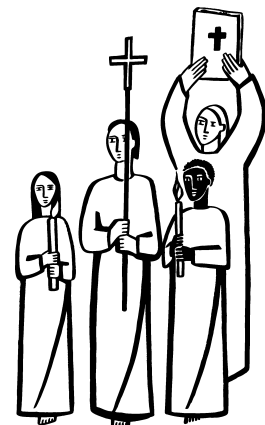
funding as well as special projects like the recent purchase of an ambulance for use in transporting patients to the hospital for care. Robin shared stories of hope and allowing Tanzanians to live and die with dignity.

OUR GENEROSITY MAKES A DIFFERENCE.....SALEM'S BENEVOLENCES

Your generosity makes a positive difference in the life of those in need, and in support of the wider Church. Each year Salem gives 13% of its income to the Delaware-Maryland Synod. Our Synod in turn shares 50% of its contributions with the Evangelical Church in America. This money is used not only to help pay for the infrastructure of the wider church but fuels various ministries, missionaries and outreach endeavors. In addition Salem supports the following eleven charities every year with a designated offering of between \$600 and \$1,500:

And then there is the ad hoc fund raising we do like the Social Ministry fundraiser on March 26 that provided much needed monies for the hospice connected with the Lutheran hospital in Arusha, Tanzania. Our annual Marketplace and Thanksgiving-Christmas Appeal provide significant funds for non-profits including Lutheran World Relief and the ELCA World Hunger Appeal.

We also help those in need within our own congregation through financial gifts to the Second Coat Fund which was started in 2006. This fund helps our own sisters and brothers who face financial stress usually because of unemployment or health issues.

So for a typical year the Salem Congregation gives away approximately 20-24% of all the money that we receive. For most congregations that is an eye-popping figure.

Thank you, thank you, thank you for your generous giving to others. Without being immodest, it's important to know that your generosity is known throughout the Synod and in our Catonsville community. The Salem congregation is recognized for its generous spirit. Your generous giving changes lives for the better. How fitting that we close this brief article with an excerpt from the Apostle Paul's letter to the congregation at Corinth:

"We want you to know, brothers and sisters, about the grace of God that has been granted to the churches of Macedonia; for during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints— and this, not merely as we expected; they gave themselves first to the Lord and, by the will of God, to us, so that we might urge Titus that, as he had already made a beginning, so he should also complete this generous undertaking among you. Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking." 2 Corinthians 8: 1-7

SALEM SCHOLARSHIP TIME

Salem's high school seniors--and their families--have many concerns about college plans at the beginning of the new year, not the least of which is the cost of higher education. Do keep in mind the ministry of Salem's Scholarship program, which for over 20 years has assisted Salem members as they undertake the next step in their academic preparation.

Stipends of up to \$750 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill, but they can make an important difference. This past year, four students completed their college programs with the support of Salem Scholarships, and five will continue their studies with renewed scholarships.

Salem scholarships recognize accomplishments in any of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need.

They also take into account the differing ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may be the best fit for students.

For the 2017-2018 academic year, the deadline for applications is April 15. Salem's high school seniors have received a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program. For more information, a printed brochure and application form are available from the church office.



REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP UPDATE

Our group of about thirty has continued the work of preparing to sponsor a refugee family. Though the present fate of our country's long commitment to welcome refugees remains unclear, we are eager still for the chance to address the needs of this, the world's most vulnerable population, in any way we are able. The 46th Psalm, the inspiration for Luther's greatest hymn, begins "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." We pray for the opportunity, as a channel of God's grace, to help provide a refuge for those desperately seeking safety, and a home.

500TH JUBELFEST OF THE REFORMATION – THE WARTBURG CASTLE

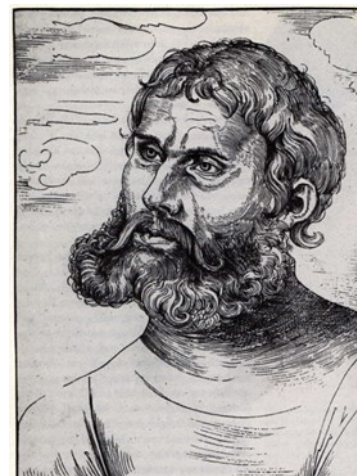


Perhaps the most iconic image of the Reformation is the Wartburg Castle, built in 1067 on a precipice high above the town of Eisenach in Thuringia. Surely, that is in no small part because the imposing castle serves so well to represent the Reformation's iconic hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God".

But it would be just as fitting because during Luther's year at Wartburg occurred one of Luther's most significant accomplishments: in eleven weeks' time, he translated the New Testament from Hebrew into German. It was a tremendous achievement, and also a great gift to God's people.

You recall that last we left Luther heading home in May, 1521 from the Diet of Worms where he had been denounced a heretic and outlaw, with few trusting the safe passage home he had been promised. On the road he was kidnapped, a ruse of Prince Frederick who then hid him away in the Wartburg Castle.

There he adopted the guise of Junker Jörg, or Knight George, shunning his monastic appearance and growing a beard and hair and wearing common garb. But he did not abandon his passion to the cause of the Reformation. He poured his days, heart, genius and faith into the immense task of translating the New Testament so it could be read by common folk. The result, in an amazing eleven weeks' time, was a translation from the Hebrew which employed a scholarship yet admired today.



By his translation, he is also credited with being the primary force in establishing a common language among the many dialects of the German language. It serves as one of the earliest instances of the power of a mass medium upon a population. His order of the books of scripture, hitherto varying widely, became normative and remains so today in all languages. His translation prompted and influenced translations into other language and strongly influenced Tyndale's translation into English and the King James Bible soon after.

This is remembered as the September Bible, published after his return to Wittenberg the next year and adorned with woodcuts by Lucas Cranach. Afterward began work on the Old Testament which was published in 1524.

That greatest of Luther's hymns drew from the 46th Psalm which begins, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Such was his experience at the Wartburg.
