



SALEM SECURITY AND THE NEW CARD ACCESS SYSTEM

You might have noticed that the new doors have been installed and painted. What you don't see is that the new Security System also unlocks the doors for services on Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings and then relocks the doors automatically near the end of the service. In addition, the cameras are working and the DVR is recording all movement throughout the church hallways. Even though the door locking and unlocking is now automatic, all doors can be used for exiting the church, so in case of an emergency like a fire, use the closest door to exit the building as quickly as possible.

The next phase of implementing better security at Salem is to provide access cards to everyone who requires access to the church outside of the Saturday and Sunday service times. All the committee names and names of people who serve on the committees are being entered into the new Security System. Once that is completed, the access cards will be distributed. Everyone who receives an access card will be required to sign for it and agree to follow the rules for using the cards. Each person who receives an access card will be given a hand-out with the rules and the days/times the card will open the church doors. Distribution of the access cards is planned to start the middle of October.

500TH JUBELFEST OF THE REFORMATION.... A COMMEMORATION NOT FOR LUTHERANS ONLY

It's important now to remember that this anniversary year began with a joint ecumenical commemoration held in Lund, Sweden, on Oct. 31, 2016, co-hosted by The Lutheran World Federation and the Roman Catholic Church. The official joint press release from the Vatican and the LWF stated: "The Lutheran World Federation and Roman Catholic Church joint event will highlight the 50 years of continuous ecumenical dialogue between Catholics and Lutherans and the joint gifts of this collaboration. The Catholic-Lutheran commemoration of 500 years of the

Reformation is structured around the themes of thanksgiving, repentance and commitment to common witness. The aim is to express the gifts of the Reformation and ask forgiveness for division perpetuated by Christians from the two traditions."

At the heart of that service was this joint statement signed by Pope

Francis and the president of the Lutheran World Federation, Rt. Rev. Dr. Munib Younan, who is also bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land: "In joyful gratitude to God, we are gathered today to encourage one another in the ministry of reconciliation to which Christ has called us ... we affirm that 'while the past itself is unalterable, the presence of the past in the present is alterable. In view of 2017, the point is not to tell a different history, but to tell that history differently.' So, while the past cannot be changed, we rejoice in the healing of memories we have already seen, and we ask God's guidance toward a transformed future. renewed in our relations to one another and in our witness to the world."

We give thanks that this commemoration will not be occasion for the parochial pride and for divisive entrenchment which generally characterized past celebrations, but rather a path toward further reconciliation and greater understanding. My hopes are broader still. For too many people across the world, the atrocity of 9/11 has become a tool to foster nationalistic jingoism and religious hostilities. Strident and hateful fundamentalism among Christians, Muslims, Jews and others has made such religion the most dangerous force on earth.

Yet not for all. Among a growing and greater portion

of people of all faiths there is also a determined striving for mutual understanding and cooperation than ever before. This can also be a fruit of the Reformation which radically insisted that the grace of God exceeds all religious practice or human deserving. To a degree impossible to imagine in an age when Turkish armies at the gates of Budapest, Genoa and Venice Bishop Younan and Pope Francis at Lund, Sweden threatened to conquer the European world, many Christians,

Muslims and Jews now strive to encounter one another through the love of God pledged for the whole world.

There is excellent cause to celebrate the courage, wisdom, tenderness and eloquence of Martin Luther. When virtually all of the wealth, all the armies, all the powers which then ruled the world were arrayed against him, Luther refused to recant his conviction that God's grace is freely given in love --thereby launching a reformation of the whole Church, and changing the course of history. We have long held such a promise to be our hope for joy on this day and joy at our last. More than that, such a conviction also holds hope for the peace of the world.

European Tour September 25th-October 6th

Forty-eight persons, hosted by Pastor Ed and Vicky Whetstone and by Pastor Dave and Nancy Asendorf, left on Monday September 25th to tour Italy and Germany, tracing some of Luther's footsteps in his life leading to the Reformation. "This is an opportunity to visit some of those places where the reformation began," relates Pastor Ed. "From Luther's birthplace in Eisleben to Erfurt, Germany, where he grew up, became a monk, and entered the monastery, to Wittenberg, where he taught, served as parish priest, and nailed the 95 thesis on the door of the church, to Wartburg Castle where he went into hiding: seeing those places helps it to come alive for us," he notes. "We are not just looking at history but at growing more familiar with our heritage as we look to our future!" Nearly half of the group, which returns on October 6th, is a member of Salem. 
Walters Art Gallery, Luther Exhibit, October 15th

Meet Vicar Jay Eckman after the 11:00 a.m. service as he leads a brief discussion about Martin Luther's life and times before heading to The Walters (600 N Charles St) for the exhibit, "Uncertain Times: Martin Luther's Remedies for the Soul." Focusing on the ways in which Martin Luther comforted the distressed souls of his contemporaries by



approaching them as a father, a husband, and a friend—rather than as a priest or theologian, there are approximated twenty works on view. Feel free to bring a bag lunch at the church OR to join the group at the Walters. The Walters is renowned for its diverse art collection and a very special treasure for Baltimore. Admission is free.

"Anthems of Love," Concert Celebrating the Reformation, October 22, 4:00 p.m.




Coordinated by Salem's Director of Music Mary Miller, selections will be performed by Salem's Hand Bell Choir, the Salem Brass, Psalm 98, and the Senior Choir, embellished with musician friends of Mary and of Salem. "I chose music that spoke to me in a way I think Luther would have done: to spread love in troubled times," adds Mary. The concert will feature musicians at the front of the church and will be fun to watch: including stringed instruments, vocal solos, and bells. Arrive early: this event promises to be an amazing concert with Mary's special coordination and touches.

"Martin the Reformer": October 28th (7:30 p.m.), October 29th (9:30 a.m., 2:00 p.m.)

Come to see an original play written by Guy Davis (with Paul Bell), based upon the book "Here I Stand: The Life of Martin Luther" by Roland H. Bainton.

The play centers from the time when Martin Luther decided to become a monk through his marriage to Katie von Bora. Directed by Paul Bell, the play has been casted almost entirely with members or friends of Salem, many of whom have never been on stage before. Nick Mason plays Martin and Paul Bell is the narrator. Of note is the performance of diabolical Pope Leo X, portrayed by Scott Graham. Guy says that it has been a moving experience for him to investigate Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation. "I was raised a Methodist and knew very little about Martin, although I have impersonated him before!" notes Guy.

The 9:30 a.m. performance will be an abbreviated version for the Sunday School.

For the culmination of the celebrations, Pastor Emeritus Ed Whetstone will preach. The service will include Holy Communion and special music by the choirs. Also, Liz Rickel, Director of Children's Ministry, will lead a special festival celebration during the Sunday School hour.

Judy LaGath recounts, "I've learned how marvelously Martin Luther made use of the high tech of his own time! "Brand Luther: How an unheralded monk turned his small town into a center of publishing" by Andrew Pettegree is a book I'm recommending these days. APARTMENT FURNISHED FOR NEWLY ARRIVING REFUGEE FAMILY FROM AFGHANISTAN

As the Refugee Sponsorship Task Force continues to wait for the opportunity to serve as full sponsors for a refugee family, we took advantage of an opportunity to assist Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service with a relative— sponsored family.

In this instance our responsibility was to prepare an apartment with furniture, household goods, and foodstuffs. September 14-19, several teams drove to Riverdale, a near suburb of DC, to deliver the furniture and boxes, and then to unpack everything and make the beds and fill the cupboards and such. The family arrived in the United States and was taken to their new home on September 21.

The new family comes from Afghanistan—father and mother, with a four year old son and daughter, age two. We will have no contact or further responsibility, as now their relatives here, assisted by Lutheran Social Services will provide mentoring and financial assistance.

Our task force thanks all those who donated pieces of furniture, dishes, lamps and other household items, and monies which we used to purchase food and rent a truck. We were also assisted by Thrivent Financial, which gave us a grant for this effort.

Now we will work to replenish these items as we gratefully prepare to do this all over again. So be watching for our call for supplies, and continuing appeal for financial support!

SALEM'S BOOK GROUP


Salem's Book Group has completed its 2016-17 season and is pleased to announce the first three books for the 2017+18 season.

Salem's Book Group opened its season by discussion *Plug Ugly Ball: A Mobtown Tale of Bullies and Baseball* on September 11. Future books are:

Vinegar Girl: A Novel (Hogarth Shakespeare), October 9

Pulitzer Prize winner and American master Anne Tyler brings us an inspired, witty and irresistible contemporary take on one of Shakespeare's most beloved comedies.

Kate Battista feels stuck. How did she end up running house and home for her eccentric scientist father and uppity, pretty younger sister Bunny? Plus, she's always in trouble at work – her pre-school charges adore her, but their parents don't always appreciate her unusual opinions and forthright manner.



Dr. Battista has other problems. After years out in the academic wilderness, he is on the verge of a breakthrough. His research could help millions. There's only one problem: his brilliant young lab assistant, Pyotr, is about to be deported. And without Pyotr, all would be lost.


When Dr. Battista cooks up an outrageous plan that will enable Pyotr to stay in the country, he's relying – as usual – on Kate to help him. Kate is furious: this time he's really asking too much. But will she be able to resist the two men's touchingly ludicrous campaign to bring her around?

Forgiveness 4 You: A Novel, November 13

At once a brilliant satire set in the world of advertising and a serious reckoning with religion, the remarkable new novel by the author of *The Forever Marriage*, *Forgiveness 4 You*, is a startlingly contemporary novel about faith and religion in an America addicted to quick fixes and instant gratification.

Gabriel McKenna is an ex-Catholic priest, and with his quiet job at a quiet bookstore, he is—slowly—rebuilding his life. But even at the bookstore, people from all walks of life find their way to him and feel compelled to share their stories and reveal to him their deepest, guiltiest secrets.

One of these people is Madeline Murray, a high-powered advertising executive, who, hours after her weepy confession, has a revelation: If she felt so comforted by this stranger, perhaps there's something remunerative to his consoling abilities. Madeline has a vision: a business that will offer a secular form of confession and forgiveness—the comforts of religion, without the




religion. Without knowing exactly how it happened (and whether any of it is morally sound) Gabriel is transformed by Madeline and her colleagues into the centerpiece of the forgiveness brand. And so a therapeutic revolution unleashes itself on America—or is about to, until a terrible secret threatens to torpedo the business and the man at the middle of it. Which would all be bad enough, were it not for temptation—in the form of Madeline herself.

In *Forgiveness 4 You*, Ann Bauer combines her gift for characterization with a broad American canvas to dazzling effect. Written with verve and confidence, *Forgiveness 4 You* is an unusually ambitious novel that blends cutting-edge satire with a serious mediation on faith in the twenty-first century.

The Confession by John Grisham, January 8th

For every innocent man sent to prison, there is a guilty one left on the outside. He doesn't understand how the police and prosecutors got the wrong man, and he certainly doesn't care. He just can't believe his good luck. Time passes and he realizes that the mistake will not be corrected: the authorities believe in their case and are determined to get a conviction. He may even watch the trial of the person wrongly accused of his crime. He is relieved when the verdict is guilty. He laughs when the police and prosecutors congratulate themselves. He is content to allow an innocent person to go to prison, to serve hard time, even to be executed.



Travis Boyette is such a man. In 1998, in the small East Texas city of Sloan, he abducted, raped, and strangled a popular high school cheerleader. He buried her body so that it would never be found, then watched in amazement as police and prosecutors arrested and convicted Donté Drumm, a local football star, and marched him off to death row.

Now nine years have passed. Travis has just been paroled in Kansas for a different crime; Donté is four days away from his execution. Travis suffers from an inoperable brain tumor. For the first time in his miserable life, he decides to do what's right and confess. But how can a guilty man convince lawyers, judges, and politicians that they're about to execute an innocent man?



HISTORICAL OLD SALEM NEWS

We hosted Mrs. Sally Riley from the Historical Society of Baltimore County at our Annual Members' and Friends' Open House on Sunday, September 17th. She presented "Rumor or Fact: A Town Under Loch Raven Reservoir" through a slide presentation of the town and telling us about its brief history which covers the time period from the early 1800's until the 1920's. The program is quite fascinating as there actually is a town – Warren – that was flooded by Baltimore City to provide the water supply to this area. Warren was a mill town that thrived in the late 1800's and early 1900's.


