# SARAH GARRETT KREY CALLED TO BE SALEM'S ASSOCIATE PASTOR

Following the Congregational vote on June 29 and 30, Sarah Garrett Krey was unanimously called to be Salem's new Associate Pastor. Sarah is no stranger to Salem, having served as our part-time pastoral assistant for the past year as she finished her final year of seminary at the United Lutheran Seminary (ULS).

Sarah was born and raised in Tullahoma, Tennessee. At the end of high school after experiencing youth ministry, she became interested in some Christian calling but wasn't certain where it would lead her. She then enrolled in the Christian Leadership Program in Belmont University in Nashville. Her experience in her first preaching course and the National Festival of Young Preachers lead to her calling to preach. After graduation, Sarah spent a year as a Director of Children and Youth Ministry before entering the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now the United Lutheran Seminary). She interned at Trinity Lutheran Church in Manhattan under Reverend Heidi Neumark. Sarah found her vicarship to be "both transformative and challenging in a community reflecting the kingdom of God where community and kinship are prioritized over hierarchy." Returning to ULS, Sarah was recognized by the faculty and her peers by being awarded the Frederick Buechner Excellence in Preaching Award and was nominated to speak at commencement.

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Sarah's joining the staff of Salem while finishing her seminary education was a leap of faith and reflected her trust in both the Holy Spirit and the encouragement of Bishop Bill Gohl. But her early experience at Salem was only welcoming. Her first Church Council meetings showed the generosity of Salem in helping out other churches with financial needs. "Salem is fortunate to have the resources it has and it is exciting to imagine how we might use those resources for continued ministry and outreach." Sarah notes that Salem is striving to be pro-active and anticipate future needs when it is easy for churches to fall into a reactionary slump and struggle to remain relevant and attuned to the needs of the community. "Although the congregation of Salem is all over the map, it abides in community in a time where it is tempting to be individualistic and to be self-centered." Sarah sees a willingness and courage in Salem to do new things that God is calling us to do. She is impressed and inspired by Pastor Dave's pastoral care of the Salem and the larger community and is excited about working with him and helping to discern the future of Salem.

#### **Brenda Hurbanis and Kathie Zink**

It was only natural that when they moved to Patapsco Overlook four years ago, Brenda Hurbanis and Kathie Zink would include Salem in their search for a new church home. Both "cradle Lutherans," the pair grew up in families that were extremely active ("totally committed") to their congregations, with relatives serving in a variety of leadership roles.

Baptized at Faith Lutheran in Bellwood, Illinois, and confirmed at St. Mark's in Hagerstown, Brenda was active in Luther League and was among the first class of campers at Mar-Lu-Ridge. But as an adult, she did not feel a particularly close connection to any one congregation. After checking out a few other options once they settled in Catonsville, Brenda worshiped at Salem on Palm Sunday 2016, and there was no doubt in her mind that she had found what they were seeking. She remembers going home and telling Kathie, "You have to go there."

Kathie's faith journey began at Bethany Evangelical Lutheran Church in downtown Baltimore, where she was baptized and confirmed. It was easy for her to be active in a variety of activities, including Luther League, in light of the fact that she grew up within walking distance of the church. When Bethany



closed in the early 1990s, Kathie found herself at a loss, a feeling that lasted for a number of years. At Salem, though, the "very warm, friendly and welcoming" atmosphere that she loved at her first church is present, even though the congregation is a bit larger than the one to which she had grown accustomed. But that's not the only similarity the two churches share: just as at Salem, the chabcel of Bethany featured a portrait of an ascending Jesus, painted by the same German painter in the 1900s.

# Katherine "Kathy" Eccleston

Kathy came to Salem from a 40 acre farm outside Salisbury, Maryland, where she lived for a long time with her husband and six children. She attended Bethany Lutheran Church in Salisbury. She grew up in the Washington, D.C. area attending a Missouri Synod Lutheran Church. When her husband passed away, she decided to move to the Catonsville area as her oldest daughter lives in Elkridge and wanted to be closer to her. Kathy has her own apartment at Brightview and rides to church with Virginia Krenzke, Patricia Krenzke and Mike Hall on Sundays as she no longer drives. She graduated from nursing school in 1954 and worked as a nurse until she became a stay-at-home mom with her children - two girls and four boys, two boys who now live on the military base in Cuba {but not as military enlisted}. Her hobbies include gardening, which she did extensively on the farm and she loves to walk as much as she can. You may see her sometimes heading down S. Rolling Road when the weather permits.



## 170TH SALEM ANNIVERSARY TOUR

of

St. Timothy's Episcopal Church 200 Ingleside Avenue

Saturday, July  $20^{\rm th}$  Tour begins at Noon Watch for the sign-up sheet in the Narthex in July.

Before Salem's founding German immigrant farmers decided to form their own church, they had been worshipping at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church. Though welcomed at St. Timothy's, they felt the need to worship in their familiar Lutheran tradition and German language. Our tour acknowledges this early bond and allows us to discover the interesting interior of Catonsville's oldest church structure.

St. Timothy's, organized and built in 1844, was designed by prominent Baltimore architect Robert Carey Long. Twenty-five stained glass windows, dating from between 1858 and 1962, grace the worship space. Four of these were designed by Louis Comfort Tiffany, and a number of others were designed by noted German and British glass studios.

Our tour will be led by Tim Fales, St. Timothy's facility manager who will point out and describe the numerous changes and enhancements made to the building since 1844. Following the tour, we will walk to the home of Treen and Nolen Null (directly behind the church) for punch and cookies and a viewing of their hibiscus in bloom.

Today St. Timothy's is no longer home to an Episcopal parish. The sanctuary is the site for occasional baptisms, weddings, and funerals.

New Hope Church, a congregation sponsored by Grace Fellowship Church in Timonium, began when a group of people from Grace felt called to start a new ministry in the suburbs west of Baltimore. New Hope gathers for worship in the church each Sunday at 10:00 AM.

## **WORLD REFUGEE DAY**

June 20

World Refugee Day is an international day of advocacy hosted by the UN Refugee Agency. It's designed to raise awareness and support for refugees, asylum seekers, and other forcibly displaced persons who've fled their homes for fear of harm and persecution.

We are fortunate to be able to work with **Lutheran World Relief**, which assists refugees overseas, and **Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service**, which works with refugees who've come to the United States.

World Refugee Day was formally established in 2001 when the UN General Assembly declared June  $20^{\rm th}$  as the official date.

However, important work for the cause began 50 years prior with the UN's 1951 Refugee Convention, which defined what it means to be a refugee, established a set of basic human rights that every refugee should have, and recognized the scope of the global refugee crisis. In 1967, the UN expanded who could apply for refugee status with the 1967 Protocol.

The number of displaced people in the world is staggering, and the growing climate change crisis is further fueling the crisis.

Recently the United Nations Refugee Agency released a report on the global refugee crisis concluding that the numbers of forcibly displaced people across the globe were at a "record high," with a total of 68.5 million people displaced by the end of 2017. The year reportedly marked the largest increase of refugees in a single year with 16.2 million people (roughly 44,500 people a day) fleeing their homes in 2017.

The resettlement of refugees in the U.S., however, is slowing. According to a report from the International Rescue Committee, in fiscal year 2017-2018, the United States will admit only 21,000 refugees, the lowest number in the history of the U.S. resettlement program.

World Refugee Day hopes to raise awareness about this crisis. Each year, to show solidarity and encourage governments to take action to support refugees, organizations all over the world host events, rallies, and campaigns to advocate for displaced people.



#### REFUGEE TASK FORCE UPDATES

**Aeuein Mabil**, US Navy, is aboard the USS Abraham Lincoln Aircraft Carrier, on assignment now just outside the Persian Gulf, adding to our military presence in the area. Aeuein is the second oldest child in the Mabil family. The Mabil family arrived from Sudan in 2004.

This month the **Alaj family** marks the 20<sup>th</sup> year since their arrival in Baltimore from Kosovo.

**Albin Dragidella** graduated from Lansdowne High School this month, 16 months after the family's arrival from Kosovo.

The **al Fahad family** has received approval for their green cards. Our homework helpers are still seeing the children each week, helping them to maintain their learnings across the summer. The family came from Syria in July, 2016, and we began our relationship with them late in 2017.

Please keep all of our families, in the various stages of their entry into American life, in your prayers. And pray, advocate and work for the record number of refugees, asylum seekers and forcibly displaced persons.


# Lazarus Caucus Gala and Silent Auction at Rolling Road Golf Club

## **HISTORIC OLD SALEM NEWS - UPCOMING BUS TRIPS**

On **Wednesday, July 24**th, Old Salem has planned a bus trip to the Kentmorr Restaurant in Stevensville {across the Bay Bridge} for a delicious two hour all-you-can-eat crab feast which includes steamed crabs, fried chicken, corn on the cob, cole slaw, potato salad, and a bowl of Maryland crab soup with iced tea/soda/coffee/Bud Light draft beer and a dish of vanilla ice cream for dessert. If you have already made your reservation to travel with us, please meet at the Southwest Park & Ride Lot on S. Rolling Road, near the Rt 195 exit, no later than **9:30 a.m.** {Reservation totals had to be called in by July 4<sup>th</sup> to the Kentmorr}.

Our next bus trip on October 18<sup>th</sup> takes us to Cambridge for a tour of the HARRIET TUBMAN UNDERGROUND RAILROAD VISITOR CENTER {museum}. We depart from the SW Park & Ride Lot at 8 a.m. with an approximate return time of 6 p.m. We will meet our step-on-tour guide at the Sailwinds Visitor Center in Cambridge and travel through the backroads of Dorchester County where Harriet Tubman lived and worked as a child in the Bucktown area. You'll see and learn about Scott's Chapel, The Bucktown Village Store and the Brodess Farm. We arrive at the Harriet Tubman Center around 10:30 a.m. and you can explore the exhibits that helped shaped Harriet's early years as a freedom fighter, leader, and liberator. At 12:30 p.m., we head to Old Salty's Restaurant on Hooper's Island to enjoy a local, home-cooked, buffet style meal, featuring seafood items such as fried soft shell crabs, crab cakes {one per person}, fish, clam strips, chicken, ham, and vegetables with a slice of homemade pie for dessert. After enjoying the wonderful meal, we head back to Cambridge, again traveling along the "Highway to Freedom". This road was used by the majority of enslaved people who fled this area before the Civil War. Landmarks such as the Stanley Institute, Madison, Parsons Creek and Stewart's Canal, and the new Revived Church, will be acknowledged.

Cost of trip, including bus, taxes, gratuities, center admission, & Old Salty's meal is \$85 per person. The group is open to all readers interested in meeting and discussing books. Books discussed range from novels, nonfiction, biographies and short stories to poetry.



*The Library Book.* On the morning of April 29, 1986, a fire alarm sounded in the Los Angeles Public Library. As the moments passed, the patrons and staff who had been cleared out of the building realized



this was not the usual fire alarm. As one fireman recounted, "Once that first stack got going, it was 'Goodbye, Charlie." The fire was disastrous: it reached 2000 degrees and burned for more than seven hours. By the time it was extinguished, it had consumed four hundred thousand books and damaged seven hundred thousand more. Investigators descended on the scene, but more than thirty years later, the mystery remains: Did someone purposefully set fire to the library—and if so, who?

Weaving her lifelong love of books and reading into an investigation of the fire, award-winning *New Yorker* reporter and *New York Times* bestselling author Susan Orlean delivers a mesmerizing and uniquely compelling book that manages to tell the broader story of libraries and librarians in a way that has never been done before.

In *The Library Book*, Orlean chronicles the LAPL fire and its aftermath to showcase the larger, crucial role that libraries play in our lives; delves into

the evolution of libraries across the country and around the world, from their humble beginnings as a metropolitan charitable initiative to their current status as a cornerstone of national identity; brings each department of the library to vivid life through on-the-ground reporting; studies arson and attempts to burn a copy of a book herself; reflects on her own experiences in libraries; and reexamines the case of Harry Peak, the blond-haired actor long suspected of setting fire to the LAPL more than thirty years ago.

Brimming with her signature wit, insight, compassion, and talent for deep research, *The Library Book* is Susan Orlean's thrilling journey through the stacks that reveals how these beloved institutions provide much more than just books—and why they remain an essential part of the heart, mind, and soul of our country. It is also a master journalist's reminder that, perhaps especially in the digital era, they are more necessary than ever.


#### RECENT EMAIL PHISHING

Recently several disciples of Salem received an email claiming to be Pastor Dave requesting a favor. These emails did not come from Pastor Dave and their intend was to fool an unsuspecting victim into providing funds to the perpetrator.


There were several red flags in each of the emails in the chain.

The email did not come from Pastor Dave's Salem email.

The email signature was not Pastor Dave's (he does not use one) and it looks unprofessional for a pastor.



If you respond to this email, this follow-up asks you to buy a gift card.




The widow's name is not given.

Pastor Dave would not describe someone as a widow.

A Google Play card would be an unusual gift for a widow. A food card would likely be more useful. Is this something Pastor Dave would ask you to do?

The second follow-up email is even more suspicious.



The amount of the gift seems very high.

The widow's name is still not given and the email is not familiar and is not from a Salem member. The perpetrator wants the gift cards quickly and wants the information via email instead physical gift cards handed to Pastor Dave.

If you receive a suspicious email from anyone, you should contact them separately (not from replying to the email) and verify. If you get one from Pastor Dave, call the office or email him directly via <a href="mailto:pastordave@salem-catonsville.org">pastordave@salem-catonsville.org</a>.

You can also report it to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) <a href="https://www.ic3.gov">https://www.ic3.gov</a>. If something looks suspicious, it probably is.




