

REFUGEE TASK FORCE UPDATE

We have been working with them for the last nineteen months. In practical and financial matters they are now, and have been for several months, independent.

The areas in which we are continuing to help are language and schoolwork. We have dear and dedicated Homework Helpers, who provide several visits every week, even through the summer. They work with Khalid, age 10, Lujain, 7, and Mohamed, 3. And recently little Ayah, age 2, is taking notice! Their mother Wedyan usually joins in, too.

HISTORIC OLD SALEM NEWS – UPCOMING BUS TRIPS

Our next bus trip on **October 18th** takes us to Cambridge for a tour of the **HARRIET TUBMAN UNDERGROUND RAILROAD VISITOR CENTER (museum)**. We depart from the SW Park & Ride Lot at **8 a.m.** with an approximate return time of **6 p.m.** We will meet our step-on-tour guide at the Sailwinds Visitor Center in Cambridge and travel through the backroads of Dorchester County where Harriet Tubman lived and worked as a child in the Bucktown area. You'll see and learn about Scott's Chapel, the Bucktown Village Store and the Brodess Farm. We arrive at the Harriet Tubman Center around 10:30 a.m. and you can explore the exhibits that helped shaped Harriet's early years as a freedom fighter, leader, and liberator. At 12:30 p.m., we head to Old Salty's Restaurant on Hooper's Island to enjoy a local, home-cooked, buffet style meal, featuring seafood items such as fried soft shell crabs, crab cakes {one per person}, fish, clam strips, chicken, ham, and vegetables with a slice of homemade pie for dessert. After enjoying the wonderful meal, we head back to Cambridge, again traveling along the "Highway to Freedom". This road was used by the majority of enslaved people who fled this area before the Civil War. Landmarks such as the Stanley Institute, Madison, Parsons Creek and Stewart's Canal, and the new Revived Church, will be acknowledged.

Cost of trip, including bus, taxes, gratuities, center admission, & Old Salty's meal is \$85 per person. Nicholas Grempler, a Salem Lutheran Church member and frequent traveler on our bus trips has been working with our Old Salem Board of Directors to place a memorial plaque in the cemetery surrounding the Old Salem Church building located at 701 Ingleside Avenue. The memorial commemorates the 46 infants and small children that are buried in the cemetery in unmarked graves. This memorial is Nick's Boy Scout Eagle Project. We dedicated this memorial and completion of Nick's project on Sunday, August 4th at 2 p.m. There was a brief ceremony and Nick shared the results of his research for the project. Pastor David Asendorf shared a blessing at the site of the memorial and the church was opened to tour and, of course, we had refreshments, too!

On Sunday, September 15th at 2 p.m. at the Old Salem Church, we will have a special presentation by Mrs. Michele Miller (an Old Salem Board member) on Joseph Philip Fusting. Mr. Fusting, although a Catholic himself, was originally from Germany and like Gustav Lurman strove to help Salem's German Lutherans establish the church that was the beginning of Salem in 1849. Mr. Fusting sold the property to the founders of Salem so they would be able to build the church. He, as was Gustav Lurman, was well to do merchant in the area and owned various properties throughout the Catonsville area. Come and learn more about this fascinating gentleman at our open house. (You may even have the opportunity to meet some of Mr. Fusting's descendants!)

Even though it's several months away, it will be here soon...On **Saturday, December 14th** from **11 a.m. to 3 p.m.** there will be a Christmas Open House at Old Salem, with Christmas music from Salem Brass and Louise Rau sharing Christmas tunes on the 1860 hand pumped bellows organ. Refreshments, of course, and a special guest visitor for the children...SANTA himself.

THE SALEM-ST. TIMOTHY'S CONNECTION

Written histories of the founding of our church always refer to the fact that before our German immigrant farmers founded Salem, they first worshiped together with the St. Timothy's Episcopal parish on Ingleside Avenue. St. Timothy's was founded in 1844 and in that year built Catonsville's original church building.

During this anniversary year, Salem has attempted to learn more about this early association and even scheduled a tour of their sanctuary, still standing although much expanded and enhanced since the mid 1840s. Although the tour was cancelled (but may be rescheduled in the future), Salem has been able to locate some information not seen by us before.

In the course of doing research in preparation for our tour, an article in an Episcopal periodical called *The Church Standard* was discovered. In the issue referred to as Volume 80, dated January 19, 1901, there is a reference to our German founders and their experience with the St. Timothy parish. The passage describes a time early in the history of the parish when the founder, George Worthington, was ill, and his assistants stepped in. It reads:

Although the sudden, severe, and long-continued illness of it's founder...the congregation for a time under the charge of the Rev. Norris M. Jones, and subsequently under the that of the assistant minister, Mr. Frost, has steadily increased. In the parochial report to the Convention of 1845, the Rev. Adolphus Frost, a German of high culture, states that a body of Germans in the neighborhood had asked to be admitted to the Church. A congregation was formed of these Germans and Mr. Frost held services in the German language for them until his withdrawal from the parish a few years later.

Rev. Frost's departure must have been a blow to our founders and made the message of Fr. Heyer (featured in the April 2019 Monarch) all the more compelling. No record exists as to how Fr. Heyer learned about the German immigrant farmers in Catonsville and their lack of a German language church of their own. But Salem's history clearly indicates that it was at his urging that our founders decided to move forward to form their very own Lutheran congregation. In September 1849, a meeting was held at the home of Paulus Reich, and the decision was made to found a church to be called the German Evangelical Lutheran Salem Congregation.

DID YOU KNOW?

In the office we have been talking about how Salem welcomes people, and some of the conversation involved the Kiosk. The big "WELCOME" sign says welcome; but the Kiosk also seemed like a road block. In order to make room for Sarah's Ordination and the expected crowd, we removed the Kiosk from the Entrance Area. Immediately we heard comments about how spacious that area feels; it is now open and inviting; visitors can see the Narthex and people and know which way to go to worship. But this also caused some consternation— where do we put flyers advertising both Salem events and those of the neighborhood?

Salem, of course, has a Facebook page and a website; and we print a Parish Announcements page each week and Pastor Dave or Pastor Sarah tells us on Sunday morning anything that we didn't know about before we printed. We have decided to use the bulletin boards above the water fountains to post signs about events, both Salem and neighborhood interest. We will continue to use the easels in the Narthex for events that require sign-up sheets or need special emphasis. There is also a bulletin board between the two bathrooms in that hallway to sign-up to sponsor flowers or CEA and for Servants in Worship charts, both by the month and soon also, by the "job". The new arrangement is in the planning stages, but should be ready soon.

The group is open to all readers interested in meeting and discussing books. Books discussed range from novels, nonfiction, biographies and short stories to poetry.



The Library Book. On the morning of April 29, 1986, a fire alarm sounded in the Los Angeles Public Library. As the moments passed, the patrons and staff who had been cleared out of the building realized this was not the usual fire alarm. As one fireman recounted, “Once that first stack got going, it was ‘Goodbye, Charlie.’” The fire was disastrous: it reached 2000 degrees and burned for more than seven hours. By the time it was extinguished, it had consumed four hundred thousand books and damaged seven hundred thousand more. Investigators descended on the scene, but more than thirty years later, the mystery remains: Did someone purposefully set fire to the library—and if so, who?



Weaving her lifelong love of books and reading into an investigation of the fire, award-winning *New Yorker* reporter and *New York Times* bestselling author Susan Orlean delivers a mesmerizing and uniquely compelling book that manages to tell the broader story of libraries and librarians in a way that has never been done before.

In *The Library Book*, Orlean chronicles the LAPL fire and its aftermath to showcase the larger, crucial role that libraries play in our lives; delves into the evolution of libraries across the country and around the world, from their humble beginnings as a metropolitan charitable initiative to their current status as a cornerstone of national identity; brings each department of the library to vivid life through on-the-ground reporting; studies arson and attempts to burn a copy of a book herself; reflects on her own experiences in libraries; and reexamines the case of Harry Peak, the blond-haired actor long suspected of setting fire to the LAPL more than thirty years ago.

Brimming with her signature wit, insight, compassion, and talent for deep research, *The Library Book* is Susan Orlean’s thrilling journey through the stacks that reveals how these beloved institutions provide much more than just books—and why they remain an essential part of the heart, mind, and soul of our country. It is also a master journalist’s reminder that, perhaps especially in the digital era, they are more necessary than ever.

CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING IN JULY

The Salem Church Council held a special meeting in July to discuss the current state of our Sunday School, Confirmation Program and Youth Program. Three questions surfaced which the Council will work on in the following year: 1) How do we encourage more families with young children to participate in Sunday School? 2) How do we make our Confirmation Program transformational? 3) What changes are needed in the High School program to encourage more relational interaction?

The Church Council also made some decisions regarding pressing property concerns and other issues:

Authorized \$9,485 from RSVP to replace the outside door near the Youth Room

Authorized \$4,000 from the Memorial Fund for new microphones

Authorized \$8,000 from the Mission Fund to be gifted to the Mountain of God worshipping community (Christ, Inner Harbor) to help purchase a 20-person church van to transport folks to worship.

DE/MD SYNOD APPOINTS PASTOR ASENDORF AS VICE PASTOR OF CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH, EDMONDSON AVE

Pastor Dave has been appointed by the DE/MD Synod as the Vice Pastor of Christ Lutheran Church which is located two miles from Salem on 5700 Edmondson Avenue. Last month Christ's pastor, Ken Powell, accepted a call to Trinity Lutheran Church in Reisterstown. Seminarian Karen Pugatch has been assigned by the Synod to Christ Church to preach and distribute consecrated elements each Sunday.

Pastor Dave's responsibilities are:

To supervise Seminarian Pugatch

Consecrate the elements for Holy Communion

Attend the Church Council meetings (held every other month)

Report to the Synod as required

The congregation is currently renting space for two other worshipping communities. The Mara Evangelical Church (MEC) worships in the afternoon. The MEC originated in Myanmar, formerly Burma, and was founded by English missionaries Rev. and Mrs. Reginald Arthur Lorrain in 1907. The congregation at Christ Lutheran is one of the eight MEC congregations in the US. The MEC is a member church of the Lutheran World Federation. The other worshipping community is an Ethiopian Orthodox congregation that worships early in the morning. Beginning at 5 am every Sunday morning, they transform the chancel in the church with colorful icon screens and regularly use incense during their worship services. Both of these immigrant congregations worship in their native language.


