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CONFIRMATION CLASS CHALICES

As you might have read in the last edition of the Monarch, this year our confirmation class spent time learning about the sacraments of baptism and holy communion. As we learned about and discussed the Lutheran theology of communion, each confirmand was encouraged to think about how they feel when they receive the gift of the Eucharist and what it means to them. In January, we took a field trip to The Pottery Cove on Frederick Road where they were able to channel their thoughts and feelings into artwork which they painted on 8 individual communion chalices.

During the season of Lent, we will be changing the way we take communion during our Sunday services so that we can incorporate the chalices that our confirmands worked so hard at painting. Instead of coming to the altar rail and using the small cups, we will have two stations where we will commune by intinction (dipping the bread into the cup of wine or juice). Our confirmands' chalices will be on a rotation and used for communion for the entire season of Lent, and the confirmands will be assisting with communion in the absence of their regular acolyte duties of picking up the small cups.

Our confirmands are very proud of their chalices and want to share the inspiration behind their designs. Enjoy these photos and the descriptions of their chalices in their own words!

"I chose to paint my chalice with clouds in the galaxy because the clouds represent the heavens and the clouds in the infinite stars and galaxies represent that God's love is infinite. Communion helps me remember that God's love is infinite; it makes me think of the heavens, God's love, and that this is God's table." - Abbie



"My reason why I put a music note, the word 'Shalom,' and the color blue is because the color blue makes me think of the angels in heaven. The reason why I put the music note on is that we have songs during communion. It is also peaceful during communion, so that's why I wrote 'Shalom,' which means 'peace.'" - Anna

"I painted my chalice purple because purple is a royal color. I added a cross because I think of a cross when I have communion. I painted the inside yellow because chalices are yellow." - Jacob



"My chalice shows the changing of the seasons. It shows winter changing to spring. I chose to do the seasons because they remind me of the part of communion where no matter what part of the year it is that God is always offering forgiveness." - Maggie

"I chose this design because we had a limited amount of time. It relates to communion because around the rim it says: 'The blood of Christ shed for you.'" - Matthew



“My chalice represents an abstract stained glass window. I drew and painted abstract shapes along the outside of the chalice. The yellow in the bowl of the chalice is to represent God’s light coming into the church during mass. I picked a stained glass design for my chalice because I think stained glass windows are interesting. They can depict a story from the Bible in the form of art.” - Noah



“On my chalice, I used my thumbprint to create animals. I did this because God created animals and they remind us that we are all different and unique in our own way. I also put ‘This is my blood shed for you’ because that is what Jesus said to his disciples at the last supper. Also, it reminds me that Jesus gave his blood to us and for us.” - Samantha

“My chalice looks like a sky full of clouds with a cross on it. I chose that design because when I think of Jesus, I think of the sky and how he was crucified. My chalice is related to communion because it’s about God and it has a cross.” - Trinity

CALL FOR MEMBERS TO SIGN UP TO BE USHERS

We have an ongoing need for members to sign up to serve as ushers. Our goal is to have a roster of at least 16 ushers for both the 8:15 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. services so that an usher would be scheduled approximately once a month. This is a very manageable service commitment. We welcome husbands and wives, dads and sons, moms and daughters, etc. to usher together.

Ushering is a fairly easy way to serve the Lord and your Salem family at worship services. Ushering is also a great way to enhance your own worship experience. The responsibilities of ushering can be summed up as follows:

- helping all worshipers as they enter the church, especially visitors, to feel welcomed
- assuring that the service runs smoothly
- assisting those with special needs
- and assisting with emergencies

Ushers receive a Checklist that details all the things they are responsible for before being put on the schedule. New ushers are scheduled with veteran ushers to help them feel comfortable with their duties.

Some specific usher duties include distributing bulletins, counting the number of worshipers, ringing the church bell prior to the start of worship, receiving the offering, assisting with the distribution of communion, and cleaning and straightening up the pews after the service.

However, if for some reason you are unable to usher on a date you are scheduled, we ask that you try to switch assignments with another usher or let the church office know as soon as possible that a “Volunteer Usher” is needed for that date.

I hope that some of you will be moved to sign up for ushering in 2020. I will be glad to get you a copy of the Usher Checklist showing all the jobs that ushers do. Please give me a call on 410-627-2288 or email me at pd422@comcast.net if you are willing to serve as an usher.


SNOW POLICY

BOOK GROUP



Salem's Book Group meets on the **second Monday** of each month (except December) at **7:30 p.m.** in the Upper Room. On March 9, we will discuss *The Road Back to You*, on April 13, we will discuss *The House Next Door*, while on May 11, we will discuss *The Radium Girls*.



AEUEIN MABIL



Valentine’s Day was particularly sweet this year, as Aeuein Mabil returned home to Catonsville for a three week leave from the U.S. Navy. Poised and self-confident, Aeuein was warmly received at Salem, particularly by those who remember her as a little girl not yet four years old.

Born in South Sudan, Aeuein and her family fled to Egypt to avoid political strife. They lived for several years in a refugee camp before arriving in the United States in September 2004. Aeuein has little memory of this time but said that in childhood photographs she “gives the ‘thumbs up’ and smiles a lot.” Speaking only Dinka and Arabic, she learned English and attended local schools; while a student at Catonsville High, she began to plan for her future. Aeuein realized that even with scholarship help, she would still leave college with “a lot of debt.” After meeting with a recruiting officer, she began to consider

enlisting in the armed services.

Several months after high school graduation, Aeuein made the decision to enlist in the U.S. Navy. “At first, I was scared to join and just kept putting it off. But I had to do something,” she explained. She committed to five years of service, passed an entrance test, and was sent to Naval Station Great Lakes, located near North Chicago. Here, Navy life at boot camp was by far the most difficult time for her. “They yell at you all day long for no reason,” she explained, “and every week you’re given the chance to go home.” But Aeuein was determined to succeed (“you just set your mind to finish”).

Next up was Navy A School at Naval Air Station Pensacola. Upon successful completion of her courses, she was assigned to the *USS Abraham Lincoln* and was deployed on April 1, 2019; what followed turned out to be the longest post-Cold War era deployment for a U.S. carrier (295 days).

While at sea, Aeuein is involved in monitoring the “launch and recovery” of aircraft. With some 5,000 people aboard the ship, it is a floating city. Her living arrangements are somewhat “awkward,” thanks to the tight quarters to which women members of the crew are assigned. She tries to awaken early every morning so she can pull her beautiful raven-colored curls into a bun, don army-green pants and a top, and lace up her boots. The “worst” is waiting in long lines for meals that can be “terrible.” Fortunately, she has overcome her initial bout with seasickness (“they say you can’t feel the rocking on a huge ship, but you can”).



Ports of call break up the monotony. Her face beams when she talks about Spain (“I loved the coffee”) and she said the locals love Americans. Bahrain and Hawaii also get high scores, but not so in the case Duqm, a town in Oman, situated on the Persian Gulf. “Nothing but dust,” she said, with a caged area (“the sandbox”) protected by armed guards. Here, women face an 8 p.m. curfew, hours earlier than their male counterparts.

Best of all, she concluded, are the friendships she has made.

Aeuein keeps in touch with folks back home via email, although, unlike her contemporaries, Facebook and internet surfing are forbidden. Although she has little personal space, she has a small compartment in which to keep her mail, "prayer letters," and Bibles. Looking ahead, she thinks she might well remain in the service for 20 years. "It gets better and easier as you go along." For now, just call her "Airman Mabil."

**DR. BWIRE CHIRANGI OF SHIRATI HOSPITAL IN TANZANIA,
GUEST SPEAKER AT THE ADULT FORUM
IN REFORMATION HALL
MARCH 15, 9:30-10:30 A.M.**

We have a rare opportunity to hear firsthand how Salem's love and support of Lutheran World Relief are providing life-saving medical care to women in one of the most remote regions of Tanzania. As the Medical Officer in Charge at Shirati KMT Hospital in Tanzania, Dr. Bwire Chirangi works tirelessly to stop rising cervical cancer in Tanzania through prevention, screening, and treatment for those diagnosed early. In the Mara region of TZ, the diagnosis of women who are HIV positive is surging, which increases their risk of developing cervical cancer by at least 50 percent and hastens onset of the disease by as much as 10 years. Dr. Chirangi and his team seek to conduct early-stage cervical cancer screenings and provide same-day treatment. Dr. Chirangi also volunteers as a clinical instructor in the Department of Reproductive Medicine at the University of California, San Diego. He has co-conducted a study on maternal health and coauthored an article on this study.

In January, LWR quilts and personal care kits were distributed to all cervical cancer patients receiving treatment at Bugando Medical Center in Mwanza, TZ, and another distribution is scheduled for March. Thanks to the devoted handiwork of groups like Salem's quilters, people are being wrapped in God's love around the world!

STEWARDSHIP MOMENTS IN WORSHIP

Last month, Pastor Dave began our Stewardship Reflections with a few words on WHY we give. As Salem's Financial Secretary, I'm here today to talk briefly, about HOW we give. You may be surprised to know how many different options there are.

I'm sure everyone is familiar with the traditional forms of giving by putting cash or a check in the offering plate. You can drop it in loose, use a green pew envelope, or get a set of preprinted envelopes with your own individual number. The advantage of this method is that it feels more intentional by the physical act of giving, especially if you give weekly. The offering is a part of the church service and is certainly part of worship. Whether or not you put something into the offering plate, it's a good time for silent reflection on our blessings, enjoying the choir, and remembering why we give.

Electronic giving may not be the traditional method but it is definitely gaining in favor. Forty members of Salem are currently set up to make recurring contributions electronically. Last year 30% of all giving was done electronically, including those recurring contributions and people giving special, one-time gifts. The preferred and most common source for electronic giving is via a checking account because Salem pays less in fees, but there is also the option to use a credit card, if you prefer. I feel the advantage of electronic giving is that it lets us be intentional in a different way. We don't have to remember to bring cash or a check to church and our offering is still made if we can't make it to the service. This consistency benefits the church as well, especially during the summer months when attendance decreases. But what about missing the physical act of giving? You can always write a note on a green pew envelope that you are giving electronically and drop that in the plate.

If you are interested in electronic giving, you can email me for the signup form. Or, you can go online to the Salem website and use the "Donate Now" tab. In fact, you can get to the online form quickly using your mobile device to scan the QR code in the salmon insert to the bulletin.

Another trend that is not as common, but is worth mentioning because it's starting to catch on, is to make a contribution by donating stock. If that might be an option for you, talk to an accountant to see about the potential tax benefits.

Lastly, regardless of the method used, you have an option on how OFTEN you make your contributions. Weekly and monthly are the most common but we have several people who give quarterly and annually as well. It's great that Salem provides us all so many options, so that we're each able to find the one that works for us.

Stipends of up to \$750 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill, but they can make an important difference.

Salem scholarships recognize accomplishment in any of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need. They also take into account the differing ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may be the best fit for students.

The deadline for 2020 applications is **April 15**. Salem's high school seniors will receive a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program, but it's not too early to learn about the program. If you want to learn more, a print brochure and application form are available from the church office.

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting was held on Sunday, February 9, 2020 in Bethany Hall and was called to order by Sharon Stanton, Church Council President, at 1:10 p.m. The meeting followed the usual format, which included opening prayer, litany provided by ELCA, a hymn, pastors' comments, council president's comments, treasurer's report, staff reports and committee reports. Highlights from the reports include:

Pastor Dave

- ◆ 2019 saw an increase in overall attendance, with an average attendance of 239 people each weekend.
- ◆ We received 39 new members and are financially sound.
- ◆ Salem has three potential opportunities in 2020:
 - Living together in Christ despite political affiliations that may be different,
 - Hispanic outreach,
 - Reaching the unchurched – using our financial resources to support the development of a new church or partnership in collaboration with the Synod.

Pastor Sarah

- Grateful for the gift of her first call to Salem.
- Working closely with the confirmands as they continue on their journey this year, and enjoying the growth and excitement that is building with the young adult group.
- Joining the Synodical Vitality Team whose mission is to support new mission starts and redevelopments.

Treasurer's Report

- No questions were asked about the budget as reported in the annual report.
- The treasurer's report was unanimously accepted as presented by those in attendance. A motion to accept the report was made by Sharon Stanton and seconded by Eileen Merriman.

Attendance at the meeting included 75 adult voting members, 2 children, and 6 visitors (non-voting members).

The meeting was adjourned at 2:00 p.m.



CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Approved a proposal by AJ Michaels to make repairs to our heating system in Bethany Hall at the cost of \$5,375.

Approved a proposal by Lewis & Hitchcock to make minor repairs to our pipe organ in the nave and to do a thorough exploration of the organ chest. Cost is \$2,500, to be taken from the Memorial Fund.

Instead of an Easter Breakfast in Bethany Hall, there will be an Easter Fellowship Event in Reformation Hall between worship services on Easter Sunday this year. The event will be sponsored by the Salem Youth and the Salem Church Council.

The Church Council accepted an offer by the St. Vincent DePaul Society of St. Mark's to place a clothing donation bin on our property. It will be placed near the Newburg entrance to our parking lot on the grass and will not obscure the sight lines for automobiles coming in or out of the parking lot. There is no cost to Salem and we are not responsible for doing anything with the clothes. The bin will be 3.5' x 3.5' x 5'.

CHURCH ON THE SQUARE IS THRIVING

In 2013, our congregation began partnering with the Canton Mission, which later was named Church on the Square (COTS). The new mission began at the home of Messiah English Lutheran Church on the square in the Canton neighborhood of southeast Baltimore. For the next three years, Salem provided \$60,000 from our Mission Fund to help launch the new congregation, which was a joint venture of the DE-MD Synod and the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland. Father Jim Hamilton, an Episcopal priest from Detroit, was the first pastor and is still leading the congregation.

Today there are on average 75 folks in worship at the weekend services, one on late Saturday afternoon and one on Sunday morning. COTS is now financially sustainable and is a thriving congregation active in its surrounding community.

Nick has accomplished quite a lot as a Scout, earning 56 Merit Badges and 7 Eagle Palms – 3 Bronze, 2 Gold, and 2 Silver ones. The committee is responsible for the content of the *Monarch* and Salem's website (www.salem-catonsville.org), for church photography and videography, and for Salem's social media outreach, including Facebook, YouTube, Linked-in, and FaithStreet.

Membership

Guy Davis is the committee's chair. Other members include Karen Amy, Barbara Beem, Dan D'Avella, Peggy Dell, Mary Carroll Mason, Joey Morgan, Bethann Snyder, Ed Whetstone, Ken Wolfram, Steve Kopp, and the pastoral staff. Membership is open to all who wish to help with communications.

Highlights of Work in 2019

The Committee published 12 issues of the *Monarch* and maintained Salem's website and social media presence. In addition, videos of sermons, some anthems, and special services, including two ordinations, Vivaldi's Gloria, and the Christmas Pageant, were video recorded thanks to Joey Morgan and posted to YouTube, Facebook, and Salem's website.
