A schedule listing Salem's observance of Reformation 500 is being prepared and will be distributed shortly. This guide will include specific events that will occur in 2017 as well as information about ongoing activities and programs. The first Reformation 500 event of 2017 occurs on Sunday, February 19. "Dinner and a Video" will begin at 5 PM with a pot luck supper followed by a showing of the Lutherland Tour program produced for PBS by Rick Steves, renowned travel writer and travel show host. This was a particularly meaningful project for Steves since he is a Lutheran. Put this date on your calendar and watch for the sign-up sheet in February.

## ADULT FORUM IN JANUARY (AND PART OF FEBRUARY)

As part of the celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, Adult Forum is taking a look at Catharina Luther, Martin's wife. To assist us, we are reading and discussing Daughter of the Reformation: a Historical Perspective of the Life and Times of the Wife of Martin Luther by Mary Rasmussen Jackson. The paragraph below is the publisher's description of the book. Please come and join us for discussions on this book at 9:45am on Sunday in the Catharina Luther room.



Many books have been written about the great Reformer Martin Luther, but we know considerably less about his wife Catharina von Bora, the primary relationship in his life. Mary Rasmussen Jackson tells Catharina's dramatic story with authenticity and compassion, deftly reporting what we know about von Bora and filling in the missing content with imagination, clarity, and compelling dialog. The reader is invited to walk beside Catharina, listen to her thoughts, and feel her emotions as she enters and eventually flees from the Nimschen Convent, meets and marries Martin Luther, and brings stability and grace to the Luther household even as the Reformation storm rages around them. The author writes with an intelligible style that is sometimes descriptive and other times evocative. She brings to the project the authenticity of one who grew up in a parsonage and experienced firsthand the rhythms of the parish that shape the flow of family life and relationships. For all of these reasons, this book will be helpful in deepening our understanding of the role of Catharina von Bora, "the Morningstar of Wittenberg," in the momentous life of her beloved Martin and the history shaping events of the Reformation.


### **THE ARTS COMMITTEE**

### A BRIEF SURVEY OF CHRISTIANS PODCASTS

In November at the Adult Forum, Jim Kempton presented a brief survey of Podcasts and Mobile Apps for Christians, The article below is a summary of the podcast portion of the presentation.

Podcasts are a digital audio or visual file, usually which can be downloaded from a website to a media Player (e.g., smartphone, MP3 player) or computer. Novels, video (which are also known as vodcasts), and informational/entertainment programs are the primary types of podcasts. The latter are similar to a radio show and are usually available as a free subscription from the websites, iTunes, or a podcast app. Examples od podcast apps include Google play, Podcast Attic, and Podcast Republic. Many of the podcasts have an associated web site that contains additional material.

The Daily Audio Bible Podcast reads the Bible to listeners over the course of the year. Every day there are Old Testament, New Testament, Psalms, and Proverb readings along with a commentary. The podcast is 30 minutes in duration and is hosted by Bryan Hardin, who is an Episcopal priest. The podcast is also available as an app, the associated website for the podcast is http://www.dailyaudiobible.com. The Moonshine Jesus podcast focuses on theological perspectives in pop-culture, politics, and Christian culture, The podcasts are typically 30 minutes long and are hosted by Mark Sandlin, a Presbyterian pastor and David Henson, an episcopal priest. The publication of new episodes is intermittent. The associated website for the podcast is http://moonshinejesus.podbean.com.

The pulpit fiction podcast, one of Jim's favorites, reviews and discusses the readings in the continuous lectionary and also has monthly interviews with Christian authors. The podcasts are typically 60 minutes in duration and are typically published on the prior Sunday. They are hosted by Robb McCoy, a Methodist pastor, and Eric Fistler, a United Church of Christ pastor. The podcast focuses on helping pastors prepare sermons, but it includes good information for the lay person. Each episode typically has commentary on the second lesson by an guest pastor, a song, reading and commentary on the Psalm by Richard Bruxvoort Colligan, reading and commentary on the first lesson and Gospel by Rob and Eric, and scriptural nuggets. The podcast is in it's fourth year. the associated website for the podcast is http://www.pulpitfiction.us.


The Sermon Brainwave podcast discusses the readings in the Thematic and Continuous Lectionaries. Both lectionaries have the same Gospel and second lessons, but the first lesson and Psalm are different during the season of Pentecost; the ELCA follows the Thematic Lectionary. This weekly podcast is sponsored by Luther Seminary. Three professors from the seminary, Rolf Jacobson, Karoline Lewis, and Matt Skinner, spend 30 minutes discussing the text. This is a great resource, especially during the season of Pentecost, but the hosts do not read the Bible passages and assume the readers have already done so. The Liturgist podcast focuses on providing a bridge between art, science, and Christianity. The Liturgists are a collective of artists and creators who create sacred art and experiences for the spiritually homeless and frustrated. Their work includes live events, conferences, downloadable worship experiences, and a popular podcast. The Liturgists have an unwavering commitment to creating safe spaces and conversations that explore reality from the perspectives of art, faith and science. ### SALEM BOOK GROUP


The Salem Book Group met on January 9<sup>th</sup> to discuss *A Gentleman in Moscow: A Novel* by Amor Towles. They will meet on February 13<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 p.m. to discuss *A Hillbilly Elegy* a memoir of A family and culture in crisis by J. D. Vance.

On March 13<sup>th</sup> we will discuss *The Invention of Nature: Alexander von Humboldt's New World* by Andrea Wulf. Alexander von Humboldt (1769–1859) was an intrepid explorer and the most famous scientist of his age. His restless life was packed with adventure and discovery, whether he was climbing the highest volcanoes in the world or racing through anthrax-infected Siberia



or translating his research into bestselling publications that changed science and thinking. Among Humboldt's most revolutionary ideas was a radical vision of nature, that it is a complex and interconnected global force that does not exist for the use of humankind alone.

Now Andrea Wulf brings the man and his achievements back into focus: his daring expeditions and investigation of wild environments around the world and his discoveries of similarities between climate and vegetation zones on different continents. She also discusses his prediction of human-induced climate change, his remarkable ability to fashion poetic narrative out of scientific observation, and his relationships with iconic figures such as Simón Bolívar and Thomas Jefferson. Wulf examines how Humboldt's writings inspired other naturalists and poets such as Darwin, Wordsworth, and Goethe, and she makes the compelling case that it was Humboldt's influence that led John Muir to his ideas of natural preservation and that shaped Thoreau's *Walden*.



With this brilliantly researched and compellingly written book, Andrea Wulf shows the myriad fundamental ways in which Humboldt created our understanding of the natural world, and she champions a renewed interest in this vital and lost player in environmental history and science.



### A MESSAGE FROM OUR SEMINARIAN

Dear Salem.

Merry Christmas, and Happy 2017 to you all! I was so glad to be able to spend the Christmas holiday in Catonsville with family and friends, and best of all: to worship at Salem! During my time at home, I was given the opportunity to lead a worship service with some residents of Paradise Assisted Living along with amazing co-leaders Vicky Whetstone and Linda Fleischer. It was a peaceful time of celebration and preparation for the Christ Child. As we embark into this new year, I'd like to share some reflections on the past semester in seminary.



"Ethics and Politics in the African-American Community" was especially formative during this election cycle, giving us first-hand accounts of the intersections between theology and policy in the African-American community as well as pushing us toward field work. I chose to attend a demonstration downtown for full-funding of public higher education in the state of Illinois as part of this hands-on work.

My favorite course this semester was definitely my plenary and lab groups of "Intro to Preaching: Encountering the Living Word." This course, as you can imagine, was a chance to try on various preaching styles and methods and begin to find our own sense of voice. I leaned into the art of celebrative design and even experimented with movement in the preaching space.

For my field education work this semester, called "Ministry in Context," I have been serving at Grace Church in Elmwood Park along with my classmate, Molly Eversoll. I have been able to preach twice at Grace, lead Adult Forum, and help administrate the annual fall festival. Each week, Molly and I met with LSTC-alum Pastor Kevin Baker to unpack our learning and receive intensive didactics. I'm looking forward to leading a project in the spring semester as well as to continue preaching and begin working with the youth group.

As if classes were not enough on their own, I once again tutored ESL-learners through our school's writing and language center, served as the Spirituality Mentor for the Chicago chapter of the Lutheran Volunteer Corps, sang with our school's Gospel Choir, performed in Chapel with our liturgical dance group, and led the newly-formed international French-speaking club! I was happy to only be taking 3.5 credits in order to have the time and energy to focus on these other forms of ministry that I so love.

Thank you all so much for your continued prayers, encouragement, and financial support! This semester will be particularly nerve-racking as I am in the midst of applying to Internship sites for next school year. Please keep this important decision in your prayers. I am very blessed by your generosity, Salemites! Now, it's back to the Arctic!

### 500<sup>TH</sup> JUBELFEST OF THE REFORMATION

Luther's presentation of the 95 Theses to his bishop, and likely also his posting of them on the door of the Castle Church, was soon followed by the increasing rumble of the newly invented printing presses. Within two weeks the theses spread across Germany, and by two months the theses could be found across Europe.

They soon came to the attention of Pope Leo X. Indulgences were common practice and a useful instrument in the Church's fundraising. Pope Leo summoned Luther to Rome for questioning and discipline. Before Prince Frederick sent Luther on this journey, he asked Luther for an explanation of his views and was satisfied by Luther's response, trusting in his sincerity and the strength of his position. He requested that the meeting be held on German soil.

In October 1518 Luther met with the papal delegate Cardinal Thomas Cajetan in Augsburg, who demanded he disavow his 95 theses. Luther refused, stating he could not do so unless convinced by scripture of his error. More directly, he stated that the papacy did not possess the final authority to interpret scripture. The meeting closed in a fury, without a solution.

He returned to Wittenberg, continuing to teach and write, and made public his declaration that the Bible did not sanction the pope's exclusive authority over scriptural interpretation. In the summer of 1519 he debated the great Dr. Eck on that subject in Leipzig. Again there was a heated debate with no resolution.

Back in Wittenberg, his followers braced themselves for the powers in Rome to strike. It came on June 15 in 1520. In a papal decree, Pope Leo commanded Luther to abandon his writings and declarations or face excommunication. Luther refused and in early December of that year, in the center of town burned the papal bull. His followers added to the fire pamphlets and books by his enemies. On that spot in 1830 was planted the "Luther Oak" which still stands today. On January 3, 1531 Pope Leo excommunicated Luther.

The next confrontation would take place at the regional Imperial Diet, a legislative event presided over by Charles V, Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire. It would be held at the German city of Worms on the Upper Rhine.

### REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT LAUNCHED!

With the permission of the Church Council and encouragement of Salem's pastors, a group of members has been exploring and preparing to apply to Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service to sponsor a new refugee family. In December we made our application and this past Sunday a representative for Lutheran Social Services- National Capital Area, the local agency handling the resettlements for LIRS, provided us with our orientation.

We will now begin in earnest our preparations. We do not know just when our family will arrive. That will depend on the progress of our preparations and the availability of a family. We'll now proceed to locate possibilities for apartments, employment, and furnishings. We are also now inviting contributions from members of the congregation to support this effort. There is a special Refugee Resettlement Fund for the new family; no funds from the church budget will be used.

We do not know the place from which the new family will come. We have requested a family from Syria or the Middle East, but have indicated our willingness to serve as most needed. At present our group of twenty-five or so members has divided into a number of sub-groups to oversee various responsibilities of this process. In this Monarch you begin to see their appeals for help.

It has been our joy across the last 40 years to sponsor three families from Vietnam, one from Kosovo and one from South Sudan. Now we begin to envision a new family somewhere, waiting for us. No other entrants to the United States are so thoroughly vetted as refugees. And no others are so desperate.

We welcome your prayers for our effort. Pray too for the world's 95 million refugees and displaced persons. Together we have the opportunity to positively address a major world crisis. Together we have the chance to hear Jesus say to each of us, "I was a stranger, and you welcomed me."




