MOSAIC MURAL DEDICATION HELD APRIL 15TH

On Saturday, April 15th, 2017, a group of 60 people gathered to celebrate the completion of the Mosaic Mural in Bethany Hall. The group enjoyed a potluck luncheon and a Liturgy provided by Reverend Dr. Ann Dentry, followed by Patricia Morgan who detailed the process of building the mosaic. Finally, the group participated in a hands-on blessing of the mosaic on the wall itself.

The mosaic mural was the inspiration of Tricia Morgan who began planning and designing the mural back in 2012. The group of volunteers gathered to lay the first tiles on a Saturday morning in July 2014 and the last completed panel was hung on the wall on April 1, 2017. Memorial tiles were hand-made and sold as a fundraiser to cover the costs of the materials used to hang the panels.

The volunteers who worked on this project are too many to list. Many of the volunteers joined the project during various stages of the project and a few worked from the beginning to the end. Two volunteers who passed away that we want to remember are Janet Stollenmaier who enjoyed making the memorial tiles and Carl Milleker who accompanied his wife, Margaret on many Saturday mornings.

Over the three years of the work, the volunteers collected thousands of pieces of tile, ceramic plates, cups and bowls along with hundreds of empty wine and beer bottles. The process of building the mosaic was

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messy. Don Schwartz, Aaron Koos and Bob Stiebing cut the glass bottles on a wet saw to make the pieces that made up the mountains and hills. This meant getting splashed with water from the saw and also sprayed with glass dust (eye protection was necessary). The tiles and glass were set into the cement panels with grout (or "goop" as they called it) which dries onto clothes and anything it lands on. Finally, they poured another layer of grout over each panel

and then polished the panel. It usually took about thirty minutes to mop and clean the room at the end of every workday. Photos of the work in progress are on the Salem website.

Sandy McNair worked on the project from the beginning. "I stayed with the project until it was finished because, first of all, the volunteers became a family to me. Second, I really enjoyed the work. Having a creative "job" on the weekends made me energized to go to my real job, which is very analytical. It gave me a good feeling of balance."

Margaret Milleker also worked on the project from the early days. "I stayed with the project because

mosaic tile work was something that I was not familiar with and I have done a lot of different kinds of art. And to be a part of this project with this church, the BEST church, is something I am very happy about."

"This wonderful work of art will serve as a reminder of what we can do together to reach out to the community of believers and non-believers in our midst. The vision, time and talent that came together over four years of planning and work is a testament to an underlying message of hope, perseverance and love," says Char Brooks, Arts Committee Chairman. The committee plans to put a sealant on the mosaic next and possibly install lights so that it is visible after dark. The hope is that the mural stands for many years to inspire the Salem congregation and the many visitors to Bethany Hall. The Baltimore Sun published an article about the

Leaving a Legacy—Your Generosity Makes A Difference

The Salem congregation is indebted to the generosity of Janet Stollenmaier who remembered Salem in her estate planning. Janet, who officially joined the congregation, in October 2015 included Salem in her will by not only directing \$93,000 from two annuities but also leaving 10% of her estate to Salem. Her careful planning and thoughtfulness is a model for all of us. Janet's generosity made a difference.

The gifts received from estates are placed in Salem's Bequest fund. One of the Continuing Resolutions directs the Church Council to tithe all bequests "for benevolence ministries beyond the congregation." Our bequest fund is not an endowment fund. And there are no restrictions on how this money is to be used. In the past we have made gifts to church wide endeavors and for significant capital projects. In 2008 and 2009 we used over \$180,000 to help replace the roof and to repoint the masonry. Our Bequest Fund also serves as a reserve fund for the congregation in times of financial stress.

Please consider including Salem in your estate planning. A good resource to help with your planning is our Synod's ELCA Regional Gift Planner, Alice Benson. Alice is a free resource to help you explore ways to support family and ministries through your planning. She doesn't sell anything, and is glad to answer any questions you have about ways to leave a gift.

Salem's Book Group met on April $10^{\rm th}$, to discuss A Man Called Ove by Fredrik Backman. The Book Group will close its season with The Shack by Wm. Paul Young on May $8^{\rm th}$ and American On Purpose by Craig Ferguson on June $12^{\rm th}$.

Mackenzie Allen Phillips's youngest daughter, Missy, has been abducted during a family vacation, and evidence that she may have been brutally murdered is found in an abandoned shack deep in the Oregon wilderness. Four years later, in this midst of his great sadness, Mack receives a suspicious note, apparently from God, inviting him back to that shack for a weekend. Against his better judgment he arrives at the shack on wintry afternoon and walks back into his darkest nightmare. What he finds there will change his life forever.


Meet Salem's New Disciples

All of Salem's coins will be donated at the June 1-3, 2017 Delaware Maryland Synod Assembly.



500th Jubelfest of the Reformation—Back in Wittenberg

We last left Luther at the Wartburg, where his Prince had hidden him away from the Holy Roman Emperor who had declared him outlaw after the Diet of Worms. In addition to translating the New Testament into German, he continued to write pamphlets which were secretly delivered to printers in Wittenberg where they found a ready and grateful readership. He also kept an active correspondence with his friends and colleagues. From high in the Wartburg he posted his letters "from the regions of the air" or "from the midst of the birds, which ...praise God, night and day, with all their might".



He received letters and messages from Wittenberg, too, and much of what he read caused him deep concern. There were forces in Wittenberg pushing reforms in a more radical direction. There were reports of liturgies and ceremonies of worship being banished. Some places organs and church art had been destroyed. He felt a need to return home and give direction to the reformation with his personal presence. A letter from his closest colleague Philip Melanchthon urging him to return was all he needed. Though Prince Frederick thought it still dangerous and unwise, he released him from hiding. Still in his disguise as "Junker George", Luther returned home in 1522. There, Luther encouraged poets and musicians to write hymns for church worship, and expressed favor for the continued use of the church's liturgies and art forms.

Much was shifting in Europe as the medieval world was giving way to the Renaissance. Only a handful of years earlier, Columbus had encountered North America, and shortly after Pizarro ventured into South America. World trade was growing at a rapid rate. New inventions such as the mariner's compass, the telescope and the printing press opened the way for immense change.

The Reformation had awakened new leaders and strains for reform, many more radical than Luther and the reforms he sought in church worship and life. The most immediate and troublesome was surely that which exploded in the Peasant's Revolt in 1524 and 1525. The causes of this tragic struggle and violence are far wider than Luther's reforms and far more complex. But the Reformation's wind of freedom from secular and ecclesiastic authority ranged much wider than matters of the liturgy and life of the Church.

Daily life for the vast numbers of peasants, the lowest members of the social order, were still mired in the injustices of loss of their lands to the nobility and the high taxes of Church and State. Riots broke out in many places. Early on, Luther expressed sympathies for the peasants and their cause. But as the violence grew, he spoke out against armed revolt and supported the nobility in suppressing the rebellion. Then as the aristocracy mounted a slaughter of the poorly armed peasant armies—an estimated 100,000 to 300,000 are reported to have died, Luther condemned the nobles. His was a middle course, never easily defensible and widely condemned. Surely it affected support for Luther. Nevertheless, the Reformation continued. And grew. Luther labored to shape the ongoing life of the Church. He wrote his German Mass so that the people could worship in their common tongue, and began work on the catechisms for teaching in home and parish. Changes were soon coming, too, that transformed Luther's own home life.

Entering the Homestretch with Adult Forum

Adult Forum has had an exciting 2016-2017 year. We started the year with a study of the Martin Luther and the Reformation. We then followed it up with a review of podcasts and smart device applications for Christians and finished 2016 with a look at Advent imagery. In 2017, we started with a study of Katharina Luther and followed it with sessions on the songs of Tennessee Ernie Ford, Luther's Small Catechism, and reflections on the work of Richard Rohr.

Adult Forum is now entering the homestretch for this year. After the month of April, there are five more Sunday School sessions in Adult Forum. Four of the sessions will focus on the Book of Galatians.

In Galatians, we find a Paul at his most youthful, least understated, and most non-compromising. Martin Luther loved the book of Galatians and used it to form the basis of Lutheran, Reformed, and Evangelical theology. Come join us at 9:45am on Sunday mornings, as we explore one of the earliest New Testament writings.

Luther's Small Catechism

We continue in this **Reformation 500** year to reprint sections of the Small Catechism

II. The Creed

As the head of the family should teach it in a simple way to his household.

The First Article.

Of Creation.

I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth.

What does this mean?--Answer.

I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my limbs, my reason, and all my senses, and still preserves them; in addition thereto, clothing and shoes, meat and drink, house and homestead, wife and children, fields, cattle, and all my goods; that He provides me richly and daily with all that I need to support this body and life, protects me from all danger, and guards me and preserves me from all evil; and all this out of pure, fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me; for all which I owe it to Him to thank, praise, serve, and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

The Second Article.

Of Redemption.

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord; who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary; suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; He descended into hell; the third day He rose again from the dead; He ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of God the Father Almighty; from thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

What does this mean?--Answer.

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned creature, purchased and won [delivered] me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil, not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, in order that I may be [wholly] His own, and live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, even as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.


The Third Article.

Of Sanctification.

I believe in the Holy Ghost; one holy Christian Church, the communion of saints; the forgiveness of sins; the resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting. Amen.

What does this mean?--Answer.

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Ghost has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith; even as He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian Church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith; in which Christian Church He forgives daily and richly all sins to me and all believers, and at the last day will raise up me and all the dead, and will give to me and to all believers in Christ everlasting life. This is most certainly true.
