REFORMATION TRAVELS BY PASTOR DAVE

Salem's trip to Italy and Germany was a wonderful adventure. There were 21 Salem members along with 27 other folks, most from nearby Lutheran congregations, who journeyed together on our Luther Land Tour in September and October. It may have seemed odd that we began in Italy, spending a day in Rome, a day in Florence and then a day in Venice. But recalling Martin Luther's personal history, his visit to Rome in 1505 was a pivotal moment in his growing awareness of the corruption of the Church. With his own eyes he witnessed the priests opulent living and their blatant disregard for the sacraments and spiritual life. So how fitting that like Luther, we too, left Italy by crossing the Alps into southern Germany.

Our first stop in Germany was Munich which was in the throes of Octoberfest. Nancy and Liz Rickel insisted that Pastor Gerry and I visit the Hofbrau Beer House and we went along reluctantly. I mean who wants to enjoy a plate of sauerbraten and a large stein of German beer for lunch. :0) We had a lovely time meeting Italians at our table and then an Austrian mom and son who came to celebrate the young man passing tests to enter the military. The mom put a decorated gingerbread heart around Nancy's neck and gave it to the four of us as a gift. But she insisted we must eat it there. Beer and a big gingerbread cookie – does it get any better than this?

One of the questions that I have been asked so many times, is what was the most special moment during my trip. As you would imagine that's a very difficult question. Certainly the splendor of the Sistine Chapel, St Peter's Basilica and Michelangelo's magnificent sculpture of David all stand out. Taking a gondola ride in the canals of Venice is not something you do every day. Or sitting in the pew of the New Church in Berlin built next to the destroyed ruins of

the Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church was a poignant moment to reflect on the folly of war and the horrific destruction of World War II. The New Church, housing an active Lutheran congregation, has walls made of a concrete honeycomb containing over 20,000 stained glass inlays. The colors of glass were inspired by the glass in the Chartre Cathedral in France. The predominant color is blue, with small patches of ruby red, emerald green and yellow. Stunning and spiritually uplifting.

But, for me, the most moving moment was being on a parapet of the Wartburg Castle overlooking the Thüringen forest. You may recall that Luther was "kidnapped" by his protector Frederick the Wise and hidden for his own safety in the castle after the Edict of Worms when Luther boldly asserted to the papal authorities, "Here I stand!" The Wartburg Castle is near the town of Eisenach and nestled on a ridge in the Thüringen forest. The surrounding countryside looks nearly the same as when Luther spent a year in exile, using the time to translate the Bible into German. Standing there, looking out over the rolling wooded hills, the floating mists and the soaring birds, I felt as Luther could have been standing by my side. So I'll end this truncated travelogue with the beginning of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "Eisenach Luther in the Wartburg"



Safe in this Wartburg tower I stand
Where God hath led me by the hand,
And look down, with a heart at ease,
Over the pleasant neighborhoods,
Over the vast Thuringian Woods,
With flash of river, and gloom of trees,
With castles crowning the dizzy heights,
And farms and pastoral delights,
And the morning pouring everywhere
Its golden glory on the air.

500TH JUBELFEST OF THE REFORMATION

Now we have celebrated the 500th Anniversary of the posting of the 95 Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. As it is widely claimed, this was an event that changed the world.

I thought this month, as a final article in this anniversary year, I would leave you with some of my favorite quotes from Luther. You may see a few you'd like to note and remember.

This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness, not health, but healing, not being but becoming, not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it, the process is not yet finished, but it is going on, this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified.

God writes the gospel not in the Bible alone, but in trees and flowers and clouds and stars.

The Christian shoemaker does his duty not by putting little crosses on the shoes, but by making good shoes, because God is interested in good craftsmanship.

God does not need your good works, but your neighbor does.

Pray like it all depends on God; then when you have finished praying, work like it all depends on you.

A person who...does not regard music as a marvelous creation of God, must be a clodhopper indeed and does not deserve to be called a human being; he should be permitted to hear nothing but the braying of asses and the grunting of hogs.

Prayer is not overcoming God's reluctance. It is laying hold of His willingness.

My heart, which is so full to overflowing, has often been solaced and refreshed by music when sick and weary.

Be a sinner and sin boldly, but believe and rejoice in Christ even more boldly.

I have held many things in my hands, and I have lost them all; but whatever I have placed in God's hands, that I still possess.

A religion that gives nothing, costs nothing, and suffers nothing, is worth nothing.

Hope lives in all things. Everything that is accomplished in this world is accomplished by hope.

PREPARING FOR A NEW REFUGEE FAMILY

Last month, with the congregation's good and generous help, the Refugee Sponsorship Task Force furnished an apartment for a refugee-sponsored Afghani family in Riverdale, MD. We worked through Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area, which is handling sponsorships in this area for Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services.

The members of the task force did a terrific job gathering the items, cleaning things, transporting them and setting up the apartment. Several hundred dollars of the Refugee Fund were spent on foodstuffs and for a truck to move the furniture. (The Refugee Fund now totals \$10,753.)

Now we're ready to gather things all over again as we still hope to be able to sponsor our own refugee family. So we will again welcome the congregation's assistance.

A TRADITION OF SCHOLARSHIP(S)

The 500th anniversary of the Reformation reminds us that it all began with Luther's diligent scholarship, carefully examining Biblical texts to discern the gospel message and sharing the good news with others through his translation of the Bible into the German language so that it became accessible to everyone.

A quarter century ago, two Salem members, themselves life-long educators, felt so strongly that the church should do what it could to support our young people in their pursuit of learning that they left the substantial bequest that became the original financial basis for the Salem Scholarship Awards Program. Since then, others have pitched in with financial contributions to assure that the scholarship fund can be self-sustaining.

Salem Scholarships can fund only a small portion of students' college expenses, as the cost of higher education continues to climb and place increasing financial burdens on families. Not only do they make a monetary difference to pinched budgets, but, equally important, they represent an affirmation to our young members from Salem's congregation as they enter into this important stage of their lives. This fall recent scholarship recipients Lea Marshall and Will Kreps headed off to college, Lea to Roanoke College and Will to the University of Dayton. Entering their sophomore year were Abigail Timmel (Northeastern University), Ben Massey (Roanoke College), and Duncan McNair (Salisbury University). Katherine Kempton began her junior year at St. Mary's College of Maryland, while Jenna Kerr is a senior at Towson University.

This year's high school seniors will receive letters early in the new year inviting them to consider applying for a Salem Scholarship as they make plans for continuing their education. The traditional deadline for applications is <u>April 15</u>.

Contributions from Salem members help to sustain the scholarship program, and contributions are most welcome. We invite you to help keep the Lutheran tradition of scholarship alive at Salem, especially as we celebrate the $500^{\rm th}$ anniversary of the Reformation and the holiday season.

NEW PHOTO DIRECTORIES EXPECTED IN DECEMBER



Forgiveness 4 You: A Novel, November 13

At once a brilliant satire set in the world of advertising and a serious reckoning with religion, the remarkable new novel by the author of *The Forever Marriage*, *Forgiveness 4 You*, is a startlingly contemporary novel about faith and religion in an America addicted to quick fixes and instant gratification.




Gabriel McKenna is an ex-Catholic priest, and with his quiet job at a quiet bookstore, he is—slowly—rebuilding his life. But even at the bookstore, people from all walks of life find their way to him and feel compelled to share their stories and reveal to him their deepest, guiltiest secrets.

One of these people is Madeline Murray, a high-powered advertising executive, who, hours after her weepy confession, has a revelation: If she felt so comforted by this stranger, perhaps there's something remunerative to his consoling abilities. Madeline has a vision: a business that will offer a secular form of confession and forgiveness—the comforts of religion, without the religion. Without knowing exactly how it happened (and whether any of it is morally sound) Gabriel is transformed by Madeline and her colleagues into the centerpiece of the forgiveness brand. And so a therapeutic revolution unleashes itself on America—or is about to, until a terrible secret threatens to torpedo the business and the man at the middle of it. Which would all be bad enough, were it not for temptation—in the form of Madeline herself.

In *Forgiveness 4 You*, Ann Bauer combines her gift for characterization with a broad American canvas to dazzling effect. Written with verve and confidence, *Forgiveness 4 You* is an unusually ambitious novel that blends cutting-edge satire with a serious mediation on faith in the twenty-first century.

The Confession by John Grisham, January 8th



For every innocent man sent to prison, there is a guilty one left on the outside. He doesn't understand how the police and prosecutors got the wrong man, and he certainly doesn't care. He just can't believe his good luck. Time passes and he realizes that the mistake will not be corrected: the authorities believe in their case and are determined to get a conviction. He may even watch the trial of the person wrongly accused of his crime. He is relieved when the verdict is guilty. He laughs when the police and prosecutors congratulate themselves. He is content to allow an innocent person to go to prison, to serve hard time, even to be executed.

Travis Boyette is such a man. In 1998, in the small East Texas city of Sloan, he abducted, raped, and strangled a popular high school cheerleader. He buried her body so that it would never be found, then watched in amazement as police and prosecutors

arrested and convicted Donté Drumm, a local football star, and marched him off to death row.

Now nine years have passed. Travis has just been paroled in Kansas for a different crime; Donté is four days away from his execution. Travis suffers from an inoperable brain tumor. For the first time in his miserable life, he decides to do what's right and confess. But how can a guilty man convince lawyers, judges, and politicians that they're about to execute an innocent man?


Salem Youth Group will be selling homemade soups and breads between services on the following Sundays:

LESSON TWO FROM VICAR JAY - THE HOLY WORK OF BUDGET

"When it was already late, his disciples came to him and said, "This is an isolated place and it is already very late. ³⁶ Send them away so that they can go into the surrounding countryside and villages and buy something for themselves to eat." ³⁷ But he answered them, "You give them something to eat." And they said, "Should we go and buy bread for two hundred silver coins and give it to them to eat?" ³⁸ He said to them, "How many loaves do you have? Go and see." When they found out, they said, "Five—and two fish." ³⁹ Then he directed them all to sit down in groups on the green grass. ⁴⁰ So they reclined in groups of hundreds and fifties. ⁴¹ He took the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he gave thanks and broke the loaves. He gave them to his disciples to serve the



people, and he divided the two fish among them all 42 They all ate and were satisfied," -Mark 6:35-42

I have learned that October is the time where Salem is knee-deep in the budget process. Committees and staff meticulously review their budgets making last-minute alterations trying to make the dollars work. This work has made me think not only about our church budget but also my conceptions of personal budgeting. Now I know this should be holy work, work that captures our highest hopes and dreams for who we want to be, where we want to take our ministries. But, if I was honest, at times it feels anything but holy or sacred. It feels secular, calculated, and sterile. To focus on numbers and metrics, on ratios and line items seems far from the care that defines us, removed from the needs we strive to meet daily, and detached from the faces of those we serve in the name of our loving God. How could this be?

The parable of the loaves and fishes is a two-part story. In it, Christ took basic resources and distributed them among the hungry. Though we commonly say he "multiplied" the loaves and fishes, this word is not found in any of the Gospel accounts. Perhaps over time and across cultures and languages, we've added the concept that Christ multiplied the limited food so that we could wrap our brains around the event. Somehow we filled in that detail because it made sense to us, for, after all, you can't feed a multitude on a few loaves and fishes. . . Or can you?

The other part of the story is equally important: "They all ate and were satisfied" (Mark 6:42 NET). Nowhere does the Scripture tell us that everyone ate until they were full. It says simply that Jesus blessed the limited food, distributed it among the people, they ate and were satisfied. And there were leftovers to share on another day. All were satisfied, not only by the loaves and fishes but also by the Word and the community they shared on that distant hillside.

Perhaps we can take the story of the loaves and fishes with us as we approach our finances and the management of our ministries, especially in times that can be financially trying. After all, our budgets (both personally and communally) are about our highest hopes and dreams, and our commitment to advance God's mission. Through my own financial experiences, I have learned that budgets and management are about growth and new ideas, and in other times they are about satisfying the basics with a few loaves, fishes, and a community that shares. When we remember this and look at the abundance of resources we actually have before us, it is amazing how far those resources stretch, especially when we remember, as Christ did, to bless them as we distribute them across the multitude. The theme for Free Ride this year was "Reform School." What does this mean?

Two thousand years ago, an edgy rabbi from Galilee gathered a group of losers and started traveling from town to town, stirring up trouble in synagogues, hanging out with social outcasts, healing the sick, casting out demons, and getting into fights with the powers that be. Five hundred years ago, a



snarky and faithful German monk named Martin Luther started causing trouble in the name of Jesus in Germany and throughout Europe.

Here's the thing — the Holy Spirit is always up to something. Always challenging our assumptions. Always troubling people in power. Always working toward justice. Always calling us to repentance. Always raising us to new life. Always reforming ... reforming us, reforming our church, reforming our society. Together we'll draw from God's Word and our confessional foundations to dive deep into this ongoing work of Reformation.

DEDICATION OF QUILTS FOR LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF Saturday, November 11 and Sunday November 12

Look forward to being surrounded by cozy quilts covering the pews on Saturday, November 11 and Sunday November 12. Once a year, quilts are dedicated at Salem church services prior to taking them to the Lutheran World Relief Warehouse in New Windsor, MD. From there, quilts are sent all over the world where recipients use their LWR Quilts to shield against the cold and rain, and for warm bedding. They are also used as simple tents, floor coverings, or a wrap to hold a baby on a mother's back.

Last year, 110 quilts were dedicated; and this year we have surpassed our goal of making 130 quilts! Our team has grown to include Mary Miller, Judy LeGath, Deb Brohawn, Trish Kilduff, Rene Stiebing, Jane Stolte, Barb Myers, Caryn Freiberg and Julie Nau. We also include Dave Trump as an honorary member because he brings us so many sheets and blankets from the Charlestown sales.

Each quilt has three layers – a top which has fabric squares sewn together in a 60×80 " rectangle, a filler for warmth and stability, and a backing large enough to fold and sew over the top and filler to hold the quilt together. Imagine the quantities of supplies needed: fabric for tops, batting and blankets for filler, sheets or fabric for backings, thread, and embroidery floss for tying the quilts. This year as well as last year, Thrivent awarded grants of \$250 so that we are able to purchase supplies through a Thrivent Action Team project. We are also grateful that Salem has included this ministry in its budget.

How can you help?

- Join us Wednesdays from 1 to 3 PM in the Katie Luther room. We usually have three sewing machines working to sew tops as well as stations to assemble quilt layers, tie finished layers with knotted embroidery floss, and cut fabric to assemble "kits" for the tops. You don't need to know how to sew!
- Donate fabric, sheets and blankets in the box located in the Narthex. Think of us as you do your Fall housecleaning or shop at yard sales.
- After the 11 AM Service on November 12, please help us bag the quilts and load them into our vans for transport to the LWR Warehouse.


