VICAR'S LESSONS LEARNED LESSON THREE:

REJOICE AND CELEBRATE THE ORDINARY

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Paul, in Philippians 4:4-7

It's that time of year when we intentionally reflect on all our blessings and give thanks to God. There is no doubt that there are many reasons to rejoice in the Lord. At Salem, we show our gratitude whenever we gather together, especially when we worship. It seems that Salem does a special blessing just about every week with all the blankets, school kits, scarves, and people we pray over. As one member put it, "Vicar, I think doing blessings can be added to your resume now." This is most certainly true! It's truly been a hallmark of my internship.

At Salem, I have learned that we do not only celebrate and rejoice in life's extraordinary gifts but also the ordinary gifts. This act of celebration can enable us to recognize the many opportunities before us. The attitude of celebration helps unleash our energy and creativity to embrace and promote the vision and mission of the church. As people of God, we can talk about the many strengths and virtues of Salem, but living in an attitude of celebration is different. Our extravagant God invites us to live in a spirit of rejoicing and celebration.

Attitudes in our society often push us to espouse a worldview based on fear, scarcity, and competition. If we buy into it, this fear can become a self-fulfilling prophecy. But our God is a God of abundance. God gave us an abundant world, and it is our call to embrace a grateful outlook. As a community, we learn to highlight positive trends, to work with obstacles, and to continue striving toward the goals of the church. We are all reflectors of Jesus. Much as a dour outlook breeds apprehension, so a generous attitude brightens the vision of those around us. So let's celebrate what is working well!

Although it may appear to be paradoxical, celebrating what is right about the church also helps us to harness the energy we need to fix what's wrong. Rejoicing in the many ordinary things that are right will help us to be more prepared to address the issues that need attention. When we recognize the good, we're implicitly acknowledging that solutions do exist for the challenges that lay before the church.

In Paul's letter to the Philippians, his invitation to "rejoice" flies in the face of the world's pervasive attitude of scarcity. Looking on the bright side may sound naive to the cynics of the world. But we are invited to "let [our] requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard [our] heart and [our] minds in Christ Jesus." We are in the world but not of the world, and our abundant God is not fearful.

Making a conscious effort to celebrate and rejoice in ordinary events that are going well can help all of



us become more effective in fulfilling the vision and mission of the church. Together, we can nurture our grateful attitudes so that our commitments to our tasks become more creative and rewarding.

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed people can change the world," said Margaret Meade. "Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." Again, I say, rejoice! Let's celebrate the many gifts of Salem, both ordinary and extraordinary, and by God's grace, we will have the energy and creativity to address the challenges we face.



MARTIN, THE REFORMER CONCLUDES SALEM'S REFORMATION 500 CELEBRATION

Salem's commemoration of Reformation 500 concluded with *Martin, The Reformer*, an original drama written by Guy Davis with Paul Bell. Full performances, directed by Paul Bell with Guy Davis, were held on Saturday, October 28 and Sunday, October 29 with a shortened performance for Sunday School students on October 29 during the Sunday morning education hour.

Early in 2016 Pastor Dave Asendorf approached Davis and Bell with the idea of creating a drama about Martin Luther to be presented as part of the congregation's Reformation 500 observance events. The pair worked diligently to write a play that captured Luther's struggles with his own salvation, his concerns about abuses in the Church of his day, and his realization that ultimately his efforts to focus on God's will had been successful.



Martin, The Reformer included a cast of 25 characters. Davis and Bell were delighted that their production was cast almost entirely with members or friends of Salem, many of whom had never been on stage before. Of special note was Nick Mason, who had never acted on stage, did a superb performance as Martin Luther. The character Wilhelm acts as a narrator throughout the play, and his description of events in the life of Luther assisted audience members, those familiar with Luther's life and those who were learning about him for the first time, fully understand the significance of the events unfolding on stage.

The costuming for *Martin, The Reformer* gave a very polished, professional look. Only three of the actors were dressed in outfits rented from a local costumer. The others wore garments purchased on the Internet at a very reasonable price. These costumes have now been included in the church's permanent collection and will be available for all future dramatic productions at Salem. Davis and Bell are pleased to see this legacy from *Martin* and are equally pleased to report that much of the costuming expense was covered by a grant from Thrivent.

Our 21st Century *Martin* has now traveled much further than the actual 16th Century *Martin* ever did.



Davis and Bell sent a copy of their script to Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Modesto, California in exchange for a copy of their script for *You Were There: The Reformation*, a play in the style of early radio by Michael A. Clarke. A video of *Martin, The Reformer* is available on YouTube via a link on Salem's web site: www.salem-catonville.org.

Coincidentally, the free will offering at the performance raised \$500 for Lutheran Disaster Response during the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. DVDs of the performance are available with the proceeds going to Lutheran Disaster Response. See Guy Davis if you wish to purchase one.



The Confession by John Grisham, January 8th

For every innocent man sent to prison, there is a guilty one left on the outside. He doesn't understand how the police and prosecutors got the wrong man, and he certainly doesn't care. He just can't believe his good luck. Time passes and he realizes that the mistake will not be corrected: the authorities believe in their case and are determined to get a conviction. He may even watch the trial of the person wrongly accused of his crime. He is relieved when the verdict is guilty. He laughs when the police and prosecutors congratulate themselves. He is content to allow an innocent person to go to prison, to serve hard time, even to be executed.

Travis Boyette is such a man. In 1998, in the small East Texas city of Sloan, he abducted, raped, and strangled a popular high school cheerleader. He buried her body so that it would never be found, then watched in amazement as police and prosecutors arrested and convicted Donté Drumm, a local football star, and marched him off to death row.

Now nine years have passed. Travis has just been paroled in Kansas for a different crime; Donté is four days away from his execution. Travis suffers from an inoperable brain tumor. For the first time in his miserable life, he decides to do what's right and confess. But how can a guilty man convince lawyers, judges, and politicians that they're about to execute an innocent man?

“LEADING LADIES” PRESENTED BY SALEM PLAYERS

Salem Players is celebrating their 40th anniversary this year. In November, Salem Players presented “Leading Ladies”, a play by Ken Ludwig. The plot of “Leading Ladies” involves the crazy hijinks of two struggling, male actors who travel and perform Shakespearean plays and are desperate to get their hands on money to support their plays. They learn about a rich, old woman who has just died and her family is in search of her two missing nieces who stand to inherit two-thirds of her \$30 million estate. The two men dress as women in an attempt to trick the old woman’s family into believing that they are the long lost nieces. This plot is based on the theme of the Shakespearean play “Twelfth Night” but it also brings to mind the 1959 Marilyn Monroe film “Some Like it Hot” or the 1993 Robin Williams movie “Mrs. Doubtfire.” And the level of comedy performed by the male leads in “Leading Ladies” was just as hysterical and enjoyable.

Supported by a greatly talented cast, these two leading “men”, Jim Gerhardt and Lenny Taube performed the parts of long lost nieces Stephanie and Maxine so convincingly and with great physicality that the audience was pushed to laugh out loud on a regular basis. Their incredible abilities to switch back and forth between their male and female characters made them even more endearing. The dressing crew of Anita Lane and Sara Toscano did a tremendous job of keeping up with their lightning-fast costume changes.

Ashley Gerhardt, who recently appeared as Peter Pan in last May’s Salem Players production, played Meg, the dear niece of the rich, old woman. Meg has an undying love of theatre and desire to be on stage. However, her fiancé, the money-grubbing Reverend Duncan Wooley, played by Mike Levin is staunchly opposed to theatrics and is immediately suspicious of the two leading ladies when they come on the scene. Other supporting characters include Louis Miles and Katie Frey along with Marge Ricci who plays the rich, old woman and Tim Evans as her doctor are all wonderfully oblivious of the cross-dressing men.


Scott Graham’s direction of the cast opened them up to a wild journey of discovery and hilarious romantic mix-ups. Stage Manager Fran Huber and assistant Berlyn Huber-Wells handled the scene changes very well and Amanda Yerkey and Marleigh Toscano supported the lighting and sound design of the show. It was a joy to watch from beginning to end.

SALEM EMBRACES YOUNG LEADERSHIP

Salem is one of the few, if not only, established ELCA churches to have two young adults as church leaders. The Church Council in September unanimously elected Christy Hensler-Davis, 27, and Philip Isaiah, 20, to be President and Vice President, respectively. The two leaders also add ethnic diversity with Christy being Hispanic and Philip being half Egyptian. Like many of Salem's congregation, they are not lifelong Lutherans but come to Salem from other faith backgrounds: Christy from the United Methodist Church and Philip from the Presbyterian Church. Christy is a nanny/tutor with plans to become a Spanish teacher. Phillip is studying Cultural Anthropology and Political Science at UMBC.



The two leaders plan to bring fresh eyes and creative ideas to bridge the age gap and to encourage more young people to join and become active in the church. Christy commented, "One of my goals is to have the Church Council and the Congregation to become even more involved in the community. Young adults are often interested in service projects to help others." For example, a joint service project between Salem members and the nearby fire station could serve to bring people together and, perhaps, provide some evangelism. Fortunately, Salem is not one of the "we've never done it this way" churches and is open to new ideas.

Christy and Philip also want the Church Council to be more active and visible to the Congregation. The first approach will be to use the display case to highlight the spiritual gifts that each council member brings to Salem. A new annual activity with the youth and Sunday School can help build relationships with the future leaders of the church.

Third: A group of dedicated artisans of the Mosaic Mural came together in October to put a coat of sealer on the mural. This sealer will help the grout to be protected from rain and freezing conditions over the winter, and will add to the longevity of the largest piece of artwork that belongs to Salem. Thanks to Tricia Morgan for organizing the workday and supplying all the tools and materials necessary to finish the job! And thanks to all the dedicated workers who finished the job in record time! REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP TASK FORCE CHOOSES TWO COMMITMENTS

This past Sunday we heard it in worship-- our Lord saying to those who cared for people they didn't know, people different from themselves, people regarded as lost and least, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me." But soon he said more. "You saw me: the homeless and hungry, the nearby immigrant or distant refugee, all the life-challenged, unentitled and disadvantaged people. I realize you didn't know it was me. But it was me. And you savored your privileges, gave your self-centered thanksgiving. But you didn't care. You did not welcome me."

It's heavy, I know. Vicar Jay preached that faith is not just a way of thinking about God, but it requires commitment and action. As G. M. Hopkins states in a sonnet: "Each ... crying *What I do is me. For that I came.*" (The italics are his.)

What is new is that we are setting aside our plans to sponsor a new refugee family from the time of arrival, since the prospect is uncertain and seems distant. We are instead working to assist two families who are already here.

We continue our commitment to assist the cousin of Lirije Alaj, our church sexton, who was chosen in the immigration lottery to emigrate from Kosovo. Her family has an appointment at the US Embassy in Pristina this week, after which they'll prepare to move. We expect them to arrive by March. They will come relative-sponsored by the Alajs (whom we sponsored in 2000). The Alaj family will provide the major portion of their mentoring. We will assist by furnishing an apartment, finding employment, and early financial aid. With your good help, we have most of what we'll need for their apartment. When it's closer to the time of their arrival, we will give an alert for anything still needed.

We have committed to serve as the primary support for a Syrian family nearby. The agency-sponsored (not LIRS) family arrived over a year ago and is living in Irvington. Their primary needs are for mentoring, language, advocacy at school, and increased social relationships with Americans. In these latter months, they have been helped by Syrians who came long before, and by persons from various organizations and churches. We are meeting with these individuals this week. Some will continue their help, and some shift to other families. We will serve as the primary organization and give the effort organization and oversight along with our personal involvement. We are excited, and have been restructuring ourselves into new groups for this active ministry.

At this point we are asking your assistance in two ways. We need individuals who are willing to assist with transportation, such as taking the wife to a doctor's appointment when the husband is at work, or out for groceries. For the present, contact me to volunteer, along with times when you would generally be available.

Secondly, we need to renew our appeal for your financial support. For the offering plate, use a Pew Envelope and mark it "Refugee Fund". When you mail a check to the church, please be sure to also direct it to the Refugee Fund.

In our next newsletter, we will introduce this new family. In this season of Advent, with its holy hush of expectation and faithfulness, we encourage you to include refugees in your prayers and financial charity, and be ready to welcome our Lord. Even in the stranger.




