Robin Schaefer doesn't really feel like a new member since she has been employed here almost two





SALEM'S BOOK GROUP

Salem's Book Group meets September to June on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 in the Upper Room. All are welcomed.

On March 12th, the Book Group will discuss *Purple Hibiscus: A Novel* by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie. Fifteen-year-old Kambili and her older brother Jaja lead a privileged life in Enugu, Nigeria. They live in a beautiful house, with a caring family, and attend an exclusive missionary school. They're completely shielded from the troubles of the world. Yet, as Kambili reveals in her tender-voiced account, things are less perfect than they appear. Although her Papa is generous and well respected, he is fanatically religious and tyrannical at home—a home that is silent and suffocating.

As the country begins to fall apart under a military coup, Kambili and Jaja are sent to their aunt, a university professor outside the city, where they discover a life beyond the

confines of their father's authority. Books cram the shelves, curry and nutmeg permeate the air, and their cousins' laughter rings throughout the house. When they return home, tensions within the family escalate, and Kambili must find the strength to keep her loved ones together.


Purple Hibiscus is an exquisite novel about the emotional turmoil of adolescence, the powerful bonds of family, and the bright promise of freedom.

ELCA PRESIDING BISHOP (AND SALEM) TO PARTICIPATE IN RALLY TO END RACISM

In commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr., the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), will join ecumenical and inter-religious partners for Act Now: Unite to End Racism April 3-5 in Washington, DC (http://www.rally2endracism.org/). The focus of the three-day event will be a rally April 4 on the National Mall.

The event, organized by the National Council of Churches in Christ in the USA, will bring together many ELCA members from across the country. The ELCA is a founding member of the council.

The rally's call to action emphasizes three key points: awaken to the truth that racism is evil and hurts us all; confront racism through truth-telling and action to right the wrong; and transform the hearts, minds, and behaviors of people and institutions.

GRADUATING IN 2018? PLEASE CONSIDER APPLYING FOR A SALEM SCHOLARSHIP!

Salem's high school seniors--and their families--have many concerns about post-high school plans at the beginning of the new year. not the least of which is the cost of higher education. Do keep in mind the ministry of Salem's Scholarship program, which for over 20 years has assisted Salem members as they undertake the next step in their academic preparation. Stipends of up to \$750 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill, but they can make an important difference.

Salem scholarships recognize accomplishment in any of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need. They also take into account the differing ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may be the best fit for students.

The deadline for 2018 applications is <u>April 15</u>. Salem's high school seniors will receive a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program, but it's not too early to learn about the program. If you want to learn more, a print brochure and application form are available from the church office. The application form is also available on Salem's website www.salem-catonsville.org.

PROFILE REPORT SUBMITTED TO SYNOD

The Profile Report, which is the first step in calling a new Associate Pastor, was approved by Salem's Church Council on February 20, 2018 and uploaded to the ELCA and the Delaware-Maryland Synod the following day. The Profile Report allows Bishop William Gohl to match Salem with potential candidates. It included demographic and other information of Salem and Catonsville as well as the results from the Congregational Survey given to Salem Disciplines in December. The Survey identified the different talents and gifts that are desired of a future Associate Pastor. Profile Committee Chair, Guy Davis, expressed thanks to everyone on the Committee and to everyone who returned the Survey. "Salem is blessed to be able to add an Associate Pastor to our staff and to offer a welcoming opportunity for whomever we call."

CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Voted to make a \$1,000 gift to the Lutheran Seminary of Theology at Chicago to help with their financial problems. This money will be taken from our Mission Fund.

We need delegates for the Synod Assembly at Hunt Valley, 5/31-6/2/2018. See Christy Hensler-Davis Voted to tithe the \$41,000 bequest from Janet Stollenmaier. \$4,100 will be contributed to the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission

Tyler and Mary Glander are moving south for work. We will need to replace Tyler on Salem's Church Council. Philip Isaiah is asking a few people to consider signing up.

The issue of our computer system was raised and Christy Hensler-Davis will be approaching the Tech Committee with Council concerns that the staff have improved PCs.

The Council endorsed the Profile put together by Salem's Profile Committee led by Guy Davis. The Council was very appreciative of the Committee's work and Guy's leadership. The Profile is now shared with the both the ELCA and our Synod Bishop.

REFUGEE TASK FORCE UPDATE

Last Sunday the congregation welcomed the **Dragidellas** to the US and to Catonsville at a reception following the late service. The family thanked the congregation for the generous support they've received from Salem in furnishing their apartment and providing early financial assistance.

The Dragidellas have immigrated to the States from Kosovo having won the diversity lottery, a time-honored practice by which persons from small countries have the opportunity to apply for visas to the US. We are assisting the Alaj family, which is sponsoring them. With the Alajs' assistance, and ours, they are becoming acclimated, the son has begun school, and employment will be soon.



We now have several persons and teams visiting the **al Fahads** each week, becoming friends with the parents and children and providing tutoring for the wife and school-age children. Recently we've also provided some needed furniture. The al Fahads arrived from Syria in the summer of 2016. They are now in the process of applying for their Green Cards.

We thank the congregation for your support! Monies will continue to be needed for a time, so we request your donations to the Refugee Fund. Use a pew envelope and clearly mark it for the "Refugee Fund". Our faith also calls us to advocacy now, much needed for refugees and immigrants. Keep them, too, in your prayers: the 65 million refugees and displaced persons the world over.

"Welcome the stranger." Those are words of our Lord, who someday will say also to us, "When you welcomed the stranger among you, you were welcoming me." (Matthew 25).

<u>VICAR'S LESSON LEARNED</u> LESSON FIVE: DIVERSITY IS GIFT

"There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work." Paul, in 1 Corinthians 12: 4-6



"Diversity is a gift, not a problem," a friend of mine used to say. But the reality is that we live in a culture where differences are emphasized more than common core beliefs. Culture influences our institutions and the way we do our work.

In the Corinthian passage quoted above, the apostle Paul calls for unity in the midst of diversity and for the community to understand itself as one body. He begins by reminding us that although we have a diversity of gifts and ministries, there is only one Spirit and one Lord. Lately I have been wondering how the diversity of gifts and unity of spirit are reflected in our work? As a congregation, do we intentionally take time to look at the various gifts and experiences that people bring and how they interact with each other? How does that diversity strengthen the work of the gospel?

Understanding diversity as a gift compels us to ensure that each person contributes. How are the contributions of disciples valued and recognized? Has Salem developed a culture where all opinions are actively sought? As you reflect on your own time at Salem, are there people who never speak a word? I believe these questions are important for us to think about and think about often.

Paul's message to the Corinthian church is as real today as it was then. Aware of divisions and problems among them, he offered counsel on how they could work together. In these verses, Paul outlines a number of principles to use in community building.

Acknowledge the diversity of gifts.

Everyone has something to contribute: find out what that is.

Since God has provided us with individual gifts, the use of our gifts should ultimately help build God's kingdom.

In a community, every person is important, and no one should feel or act as if they are better or more indispensable than others.

Invite contributions from persons from whom you least expect to hear. Make sure that the input of everyone is solicited and welcomed.

People in the community need to care and respect each other. There will be diversity of opinions, but respect must always be the norm.

Empathy with others; community members need to know how to cry together and how to laugh together.

Remember that diversity of gifts is intentional. God made and created each one of us as unique.

Former football coach Lou Hotz said that the answer we give to three questions will determine our success or failure:

Can people trust me to do my best?

Am I committed to the task at hand?

Do I care about other people and show it?

As Hotz reminds us, if we can answer all three questions with yes, I think we will be in a pretty good place. During my ministry at Salem I have come to learn that God has given Salem a diversity of gifts, has called us to work as one, and has blessed us by providing us with the opportunities to be involved in God's mission.










PEOPLE'S COMMUNITY CHURCH

Friday evening March 9th between 6 and 8 p.m. Baked goods can be brought on Friday evening and/or Saturday morning.


