"I'm still getting used to Salem's worship space and to the timing with Pastor Dave, though." Vicar Jay says that he knew at a very young age that he'd most likely be pursuing a career in the church and found a great deal of support from family and congregation to follow that dream. His home church was in Willow Street, PA (outside of Lancaster).

500TH JUBELFEST OF THE REFORMATION-THE HOLY HOUSEHOLD AS CHURCH

Long before Luther had a family of his own, he was preoccupied with the teaching of children and the need for Christian education.

Through all the turbulent early years, all those tumultuous events which have been described these past months, Luther was also a dedicated pastor of the Wittenberg congregation, and devoted to instructing youth in the essentials of the Christian faith.



This became for him a lifelong vocation and a bedrock strength of the Reformation. Soon it extended beyond Wittenberg to the whole family of territories and free cities that embraced the new evangelical principles.

His enduring guidance remains with us in the Small Catechism, which shapes our confirmation program and still provides a succinct, articulate, profound and inspired summary of the basic tenets of our faith. These months we are also printing sections of the Small Catechism in the Monarch. There is no finer summary of the heart of our faith than in the three brief paragraphs of Luther's explanation of the Apostles' Creed.

The Small Catechism was designed to help pastors (and parents!) teach children. The Large Catechism was principally to aid pastors in teaching their congregations. Both were published in 1529.

Luther also called upon local governments to provide public education. The state was to be a "common father" in the education of their people. Schools proliferated throughout Reformation lands.

A further dynamic, too little known, is Luther's insistence that girls' education was as essential as boys'. In the Western world, Luther's insight and leadership was a major dynamic in the long road toward female education. In succeeding decades girls numbered almost half the students in Reformation land schools. (In contrast, in 1587 Vienna, girls accounted for 2% of the students.)

Luther's own family may not have initiated his interest and commitment to children, but he was a very involved and devoted father, and from early on this provided both example and credibility to his lifting up of the holy tasks and joys of family life.

One biographer describes this as "the holy household as church."

LUTHER'S SMALL CATECHISM

As part of Reformation 500, we are printing sections of Luther's Small Catechism. This month, we present Luther's discussion of the Sacrament of Holy Baptism.

As the head of the family should teach them in the simplest way to those in his household.

THE INSTITUTION OF BAPTISM

First: What is Baptism?

Baptism is not just plain water, but it is water used by God's command and connected with God's Word.

Which is that Word of God?

Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Matthew, "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit!"

THE BLESSINGS OF BAPTISM

Second: What does Baptism do for us?

Baptism works forgiveness of sin, delivers from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare. What are these words and promises of God? Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Mark, "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned."

THE POWER OF BAPTISM

Third: How can water do such great things?

It is certainly not the water that does such things, but God's Word which is in and with the water, and faith which trusts this Word used with the water. For without God's Word the water is just plain water and not baptism. But with this Word it is baptism, that is, a gracious water of life and a washing of rebirth by the Holy Spirit.

Where is this written?

St. Paul says in Titus, chapter 3, "God saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by his grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life." This is a trustworthy saying.

THE MEANING OF BAPTISM FOR OUR DAILY LIFE

Fourth: What does baptizing with water mean?

Baptism means that the old Adam in us should be drowned by daily contrition and repentance, and that all its evil deeds and desires be put to death. It also means that a new person should daily arise to live before God in righteousness and purity forever.

Where is this written?

St. Paul says in Romans, chapter 6, "We were buried with Christ through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life."

SALEM'S ENTRY IN CATONSVILLE FOURTH OF JULY PARADE



HISTORICAL OLD SALEM NEWS (continued)




Vinegar Girl: A Novel (Hogarth Shakespeare), October 9


Forgiveness 4 You: A Novel, November 13

At once a brilliant satire set in the world of advertising and a serious reckoning with religion, the remarkable new novel by the author of *The Forever Marriage*, *Forgiveness 4 You*, is a startlingly contemporary novel about faith and religion in an America addicted to quick fixes and instant gratification.

Gabriel McKenna is an ex-Catholic priest, and with his quiet job at a quiet bookstore, he is—slowly—rebuilding his life. But even at the bookstore, people from all walks of life find their way to

him and feel compelled to share their stories and reveal to him their deepest, guiltiest secrets.

One of these people is Madeline Murray, a high-powered advertising executive, who, hours after her weepy confession, has a revelation: If she felt so comforted by this stranger, perhaps there's something remunerative to his consoling abilities. Madeline has a vision: a business that will offer a secular form of confession and forgiveness—the comforts of religion, without the religion. Without knowing exactly how it happened (and whether any of it is morally sound) Gabriel is transformed by Madeline and her colleagues into the centerpiece of the forgiveness brand. And so a therapeutic revolution unleashes itself on America—or is about to, until a terrible secret threatens to torpedo the business and the man at the middle of it. Which would all be bad enough, were it not for temptation—in the form of Madeline herself.

GUARDIANS OF EDEN PLANT TREES

Spring 2017 heralded the beginning of Guardians of Eden (GOE) naturescaping project on the south side of Salem's parking lot. There is a 200+ square foot rectangular area covered with undesirable plants including Japanese Honeysuckle, English Ivy, Bittersweet Nightshade and Common Clotbur. Through naturescaping, GOE plans to transform this area into "backyard habitat" that provides food, shelter and nesting habitat for local songbirds as well as being attractive.

Naturescaping is an alternative landscaping approach to traditional landscaping. Naturescaping is the practice of using simple techniques, primarily planting native plants, to create a thriving "garden" without the use of synthetic chemicals. Planting native plants is essential because these plants are uniquely adapted to local soil and climate conditions. These species are also more resistant to pests and diseases than non-native species.

Environmental benefits derived from this Naturescaping project include:

- -- conserves water (less plant watering)
- -- reduces stormwater runoff (rainwater infiltrates soil)
- --eliminates use of synthetic chemicals (fertilizer, herbicide, insecticide)
- --provides food(seeds,berries,insects) and habitat(nests) for birds.

This spring, GOE's goal was to plant native understory trees to provide an anchor for the planting scheme. Twenty native understory trees were ordered. Pastor Dave graciously picked up and delivered the trees. Tree species included common serviceberry (*Amelanchier arborea*), Black Cherry (*Prunus serotina*), American Hornbeam (*Carpinus caroliana*), Common Persimmon (*Diospyros virginiana*), Eastern Red Cedar (*Juniperus virginiana*), Hickory (*Carya Glabna*), Washington Hawthorn, (*Crataegus phaenopyrum*), Witchhazel (*Hamamelis virginiana*), Smooth Sumac (*Rhus glabra*), and Winged Sumac (*Rhus copallina*). These trees were obtained with the help of the Delaware-Maryland Synod's Creation Care team and a grant from the Chesapeake Bay Trust. GOE members and several 5th/6th grade boys planted these 20 trees over the course of several weeks.

Going forward, the primary summer goal is to keep trees watered. Later this summer, GOE hopes to cover selected sections with cardboard/newspaper topped with mulch. The dual purposes of this technique are to kill weeds and naturally amend (fertilize) the soil. Over several weeks as both the cardboard/paper and mulch decompose they fertilize the nutrient poor clay soil underneath. Hopefully, later summer/early fall additional areas can be covered and left to decompose through winter.

During the Spring 2018, GOE hopes to plant native shrubs to complement the understory trees. Finally, time and manpower permitting native perennials (wildflowers) and grasses get planted to fill and complete the naturescaping.




