It seems impossible that it has been a year since our seminarian began his association with us!


Vicar Jay Eckman joined us on Father's Day, June 18th 2017 and he will be leaving us on Father's Day, June 17th 2018.

Vicar's Lessons Learned Lesson Eight: Celebrate

"Rejoice in the Lord always: again I will say, rejoice." Paul, in Philippians 4:4

Relationships, like good news, deserve to be celebrated.

Celebration is a spiritual experience. It lifts us, however temporarily, from the seriousness and even the routine of everyday life. It is a welcome interlude that brings balance to life. All work and no celebration make Johnny and Jill dull disciples. Celebration lifts the spirits and gladdens the heart — even when good things come to an end. It rejuvenates the body and gives strength for that journey. It can be a lubricant that makes the world go round.

As I reflect on this year, there is much to celebrate. I celebrate all the times we worshiped, ate, sang, played, and prayed together. I celebrate all the laughs, the times learning and listening, looking at art, attending the many concerts and plays, witnessing to the Catonsville community, and yes even our meetings together. I celebrate all the people who were baptized and fed, who were served in love, married and laid to rest. You have invited me to your homes, shared meals with me at your tables, and embraced me with open arms. I am humbled by your love and will cherish our time together. Salem is truly a special place. A place worth celebrating.

Some congregations (like Salem), admittedly, have more to celebrate than others, but all have something to celebrate, and all disciples will have more to celebrate if we celebrate what there is. THE CATONSVILLE 9

As part of the 50th anniversary commemoration of the actions of the Catonsville 9, Salem hosted a prayer service on May 6, 2018. Notable participants were Pastor David Asendorf, Rev. Edward Whetstone, Rev. Dell Hinton (pastor of Gwynn Oak United Methodist Church and President of the Central Maryland Ecumenical Council), Rev. Neil O'Farrell from St. John's Episcopal Church. The Charm City Labor Chorus provided musical inspiration. The sermon was delivered by Father Joseph Muth of St. Matthew's Catholic Church.

A transcript of that sermon follows:

"Good evening and thanks to everyone for making this remembrance so personal, so political, and so prayerful. This is a powerful memory of the past and a prophetic encouragement for the future and what we now face. This weekend we are honoring the prophets of another time who stood in our stead and represented all of us in the face of an unjust war. We are grateful for their witness, their sacrifice, their tenacity, their prophetic action, and their unwavering commitment to peace and justice and to calling America to be its best self: Thank you, Dan Berrigan, Phil Berrigan, David



Darst, John Hogan, Tom Lewis, Marjorie Bradford Melville, Thomas Melville, George Mische, and Mary Moylan. You changed the course of a nation, you changed the course of our lives, and you inspired many others to follow.

So in your honor we "lift every voice and sing till earth and heaven ring, ring with the harmonies of liberty"---today "let our rejoicing rise high as the listening skies—and let it resound loud as the rolling stream". We have not given up. Today is not just a memory of what was, it is a commitment to what will be. We want you to know that we will "march on until victory is won". (Lift



Every Voice and Sing--James Weldon Johnson).

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, and other preachers and orators have used the following quote to help us understand the dilemma we are in at any given time. There is some discrepancy as to the exact translation, but the spirit is true nonetheless.

We can tonight agree with Dante that " 'the hottest places in hell are reserved for those, who in a period of moral crisis, maintain their neutrality '. There comes a time when silence is betrayal." These words are difficult to hear, because we cannot allow silence, or the violence of silence to overtake us.

You remember, I am sure these words! "'Fools'" said I, "'You do not know silence like a cancer grows. Hear my words that I might teach you Take my arms that I might reach you', But my words like silent raindrops fell and echoed in the wells of

words that I you', But my wells of



"And the sign said 'The words of the prophets are written on the subway walls and tenement halls and whispered in the sounds of silence". (The Sounds of Silence--Simon and Garfunkel).


We are so glad that the Sounds of Silence did not overtake the Catonsville Nine,

We are so glad they overcame the temptation to be silent. We are so glad that they spoke and acted.

There comes a point in all of our lives when we can no longer go along with the path that our elders and leaders have laid out for us.

It is not easy to oppose your government at any time, but it is important to note that "dissent and disloyalty are not to be equated. Many people will use any means to silence dissent, even calling dissent, "Fake News"!! (If you know what I mean?)

Dr. King was known as a Civil Rights Leader, but as he put the pieces together about Civil Rights, Segregation,



the poor at home. It was sending their sons and their brothers and their husbands to fight and to die in extraordinarily high



proportions relative to the rest of the population. We were taking black young men who had been crippled by our society and sending them eight thousand miles away to guarantee liberties in Southeast Asia which they



had not found in southwest Georgia and East Harlem." I wonder tonight if you can hear the seeds of the Black Lives Matter movement in these words of Dr. King. But these were similar words of Medgar Evers almost 17 years earlier when he became a Civil Rights Worker. He said that when he was in France during WWII, he was free to walk the streets dating a white woman if he chose to do so. He was not able to do that in Jackson, Mississippi, his home town. He joined the Civil Rights Movement to make a change here in the USA. He was assassinated on June 12, 1963 in his home town. Dr. King said that "we have been repeatedly faced with the cruel irony of watching Negro and white boys on TV screens as they kill and die together for a nation that has been unable to seat them together in the same schools."

Thomas Merton, who also died in 1968, carries on this theme of Dr. King. In 1965 he wrote that "We are living in the greatest revolution in history----a huge spontaneous upheaval of the entire human race: not the revolution planned and carried out by any particular party, race, or nation, but a deep elemental boiling over of all the inner contradictions that have ever been in man, a revelation of the chaotic forces inside everybody. This is not something we have chosen, nor is it something we are free to avoid. This revolution is a profound spiritual crisis of the whole world..."

If that was true then, you can only imagine what Merton would say today! Dr. King said that "the war in Vietnam is but a symptom of a far deeper malady within the American Spirit". Has this malady that King refers to, or the spiritual crisis that Merton refers to been addressed in our own time? We still have a choice today, Dr. King says "nonviolent coexistence or violent coannihilation. We must move past indecision to action. If you can walk, and you can breathe, and you can think, and you can pray, then action still needs to be taken by you and I.

Where is our spiritual center and where is our ethical center? Whose voices are being raised to

give us hope? Are we listening to Black Lives Matter, the Youth from Margery Stoneman Douglas High School, the youth in our own schools and families? as the violence continues and has spread from other countries to our own city streets.

The Words of hope come from poems, and scripture, and songs. Dr. Walter Brueggemann tells us that if the dominant version of reality is violence than the church is called to preach the Sub--Version, and if preached well enough, it becomes a subversion of the dominant version and gives people hope.

Dr. Brueggemann says that the source of violence is: 1) Deprivation, 2) Breakdown of community connections, and 3) silence. The antidote is: 1) Bread and meeting peoples' needs, 2) solidarity in community, and 3) listening to another's story and helping them find their voice.









Alice Walker in her book, *Possessing the Secret of Joy*, tells the story of the young African woman named Tashi who killed the woman that mutilated her as a teen ager. As Tashi is tried and convicted, her arguments express her dignity, strength, and the recovery of herself. As soldiers line the roadway to her execution, Tashi's friends boldly walk through them. They show up on the other side of the field from where she will be executed. They unroll a banner over the wall that gives her, her final message of what she was able to accomplish.

The banner says that says, "Resistance is the Secret of

Joy."

So, my brothers and sisters, I call you to a continual spirit of resistance in the spirit of those we honor this night. Resist!!!



There is so much to do that we cannot give up. So much that came from a dishonest war that still resonates in our society. So we, too, continue to Resist!!



Good News for our Kosovar and Syrian Families

The Dragidella family has excellent employment news. Fehmi, the father, recently began a new full-time job in Jessup during the week and has reported that it is going well. He also continues to work part-time on the weekends. Boocha, his wife, and Albiona, their daughter, both had their jobs upgraded to full-time positions.

The al Fahad family also received good employment news in May. Mahmoud, the father, has been offered new employment with a 50% increase in pay and will begin very soon. Once he begins his new job, we hope to relocate the family to a new home in a neighborhood outside of Baltimore City, hopefully in Baltimore County.

Ongoing Needs for our Refugee & Immigrant Families Volunteer Babysitters & Tutors Needed!

In mid-May, Salem began tutoring the al Fahad family in English on Mondays and Thursdays. We need volunteer babysitters to watch the baby (8 months) and toddler (age 2) in the Salem nursery during tutoring. Hours are 3:30-5:30pm. We have one Salem member each day but need more volunteer babysitters. For tutors, we need at least one additional tutor for Mondays and general backup help during the summer vacation to ensure a consistent schedule for the family's English language development. We also provide tutoring on Wednesdays. We specifically need babysitters on the following dates: June 11& 25; July 9, 23, & 30; August 2, 6, 9, 13, 16, 20, 23, 27, & 30.

Note: Babysitters may be adult or youth members of Salem but will not be paid. However, the hours will count towards school community service requirements. Tutors should be college-age or adult members of Salem and will not be paid.

During his tenure David has overseen the painting of the nave and narthex, re-carpeting of the nave, the General Office renovation, the resurfacing of the parking lot, the installation of the new entrance doors and other smaller projects. Rusty Schaefer has been appointed by the Church Council as the new Property Chair and begins June 1. Thank you Rusty for answering the call.

Kitchen Project Vote Passes Unanimously

By a vote of 130-0, the congregation approved the recommendation of the Church Council to purchase a new stove and range, commercial refrigerator and microwave. The total project comes to over \$14,000. Installation is planned for late June.

Church Council Highlights

Property Chair, David Rau updated the Council on the Kitchen project and the condition of the property. There are no major projects pending and the emphasis will be on maintenance. David also notified the Council that he was stepping down and that Rusty Schaefer had agreed to take on the job of Property Chair. The Council formally approved Rusty Schaefer as chair.

The Council was notified that Salem received \$159,234 from the estate of Dottie Phillips. The Council authorized Pastor Asendorf to explore tithing this gift to a Synod congregation that is working to transform itself for mission.

The Church Audit was completed by Ray Hamelin and Lynn Spruill. The Council requested the Finance Committee to report back on the findings regarding tightening the voucher process.

The Council endorsed Daniel Collins to enter the Candidacy Process for ordained ministry.

Pastor Asendorf brought Salem's WWII plaque "Roll of Honor" to the Wittenberg Room and asked that the Council request the Art Committee to permanently place the plaque somewhere on the first or second floor. The Council agreed.

Noisy Change Offering Received

Thanks to everyone who donated to the Noisy Change Offering to help support the ELCA World Hunger Appeal. We raised over \$275 as of the time of publication. This offering will be taken to the Synod Assembly.

BOOK GROUP


On May 14, the group discussed *Destiny of the Republic* by Candice Millard. James A. Garfield was one of the most extraordinary men ever elected president. Born into abject poverty, he rose to become a wunderkind scholar, a Civil War hero, and a renowned and admired reformist congressman.

Nominated for president against his will, he engaged in a fierce battle with the corrupt political establishment. But four months after his inauguration, a deranged office seeker shot Garfield in the back.

On June 11, the book group will close its 2017-18 season with a discussion of *Here I Walk* by Andrew L. Wilson. In 2010, Andrew Wilson and his wife, Sarah, walked in the footsteps of Martin Luther, re-creating his famous pre-Reformation pilgrimage from Erfurt to Rome. Their trek was well publicized, with coverage in the *Christian Century*, *First Things*, the *Wall Street Journal*, and *Books & Culture*. They were also interviewed by travel expert Rick Steves on his popular radio program. As they walked their journey of a thousand miles over seventy days, thousands of readers followed along on the Wilsons' blog.

This engaging narrative brings readers along as Andrew and Sarah traverse Europe, visiting sites such as Coburg Castle, Ulm's Münster, the

Alps, Milan, Florence, and Rome. Their journey provides a unique window into the history of the Protestant Reformation and a creative entryway into the life of Luther. The book also reflects on the contemporary ecumenical significance of the events of the Reformation, exploring what the changes of the past 500 years mean for the Christian present and future.



HISTORICAL OLD SALEM

Annual Founders Day Sunday, June 3, 2018 2:00 PM

Historical Old Salem celebrates Founders Day each year on the first Sunday in June. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I. On June 3rd we will be learning about the life and death of Sgt. George Edward Reich, who is buried



in the cemetery surrounding our original church home.

Sgt. Reich, a descendant of the Reich family who were founding members of Salem, served in the American Army that went to France in 1918 in support of our country's allies. He was killed in action on November 9, 1918, just two days before the Armistice. Both a lifelong resident of Catonsville and member of Salem, he was 26 years old at the time of his death.


