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CHILDREN'S MINISTRY NEWS

On Sunday, November 24th, our Sunday school children began preparing for the Christmas Pageant taking place at the 5 p.m. service on Christmas Eve. *The A, B, C's of Christmas* is the title of the pageant this year, led by Lisa Yerkey. Everyone worked on the A, B, C, etc. posters, each describing an aspect of the Nativity Story.

Sunday, December 1st, the First Sunday in Advent, found us working on individual Advent Wreaths which families could use in their own homes during this Season. We'll be studying what Advent is, what is means to us as Christians, and how we are preparing ourselves for Jesus' birth on Christmas Day. Each Sunday will have a different activity centered around Advent, i.e., Cards for Salem's Homebound Members, an Advent word search, and the Great Christmas Sketch-off on Sunday, December 15th. On Sunday, the 22nd, we will have Pageant Rehearsal.

We are looking forward to getting back together on January 5th, learning about the Battle of Jericho. Everyone is invited to join us in Bethany Hall any (or every) Sunday at 9:30 am.

And many, many thanks to Eileen Merriman for leading us through our first semester, with the help of so many volunteers, as well as thanking Zoë Dell and Peggy Dell for working with our 3, 4, and 5 year old students.

This has been a Sunday School project for many years, led by Sue Gdovin and her husband, Pete Salmon. ADVENT ADULT FORUM – STORYTELLING

Join us each Sunday in Advent (December 1^{st} , 8^{th} , 15^{th} , and 22^{nd}) for an adult forum series all about storytelling! On December 1^{st} , we welcomed Rev. Jason Chesnut (ANKOS Films and The Slate Project) who is part of the International Network of Biblical Storytellers. Rev. Chesnut told us a bit about our Christian legacy as "a story people," and highlighted the importance of powerful stories to our faith. On the 8^{th} , 15^{th} , and 22^{nd} , Pastor Sarah will lead a series of talks and workshops encouraging us to identify our own important stories of faith. We will spend time thinking about our own faith journeys and practice sharing our stories with one another.

For the past 4 months, the young adults of Salem (ages 18-34) have been gathering on the first Friday of every month. The shape of each gathering is different – sometimes there's hymn singing, sometimes Bible study, sometimes a service project, and sometimes just a space to hang out and be together in someone's home. But there are a few things that are consistent each time we come together: there's always food of some kind, there's always fellowship, and there's always prayer. And if I know one thing for sure, it's that where there is food, fellowship, and prayer, there is the Spirit of God working in and among God's people. This young adult group is still very new – we're still getting to know one another and just starting to build trust. We're still figuring out what our place is in Salem's larger story. But



As they're no longer used for physical therapy, there's no need to leave 1/3 of the envelope—just an ample margin. And again there is no need for definitive stamps—that is, those that are on sale for long periods of time. Think stamps with the US flag, Liberty Bell, Statue of Liberty. And no use for stamps marked "For Non-Profit Use". I'll sort them out before mailing.

Commemorative stamps are the most marketable. Foreign stamps are welcome, too!

"SUIT UP" FOR ERIC LOEWNER'S EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT TO BENEFIT HELPING UP MISSION

My name is Eric Loewner, I am a senior at Catonsville High School, an Eagle Candidate with Boy Scout Troop 306 and a lifelong member here at Salem.

As an Eagle Scout candidate, my Eagle Scout project must be a benefit to the local community, which I have personally chosen to help impoverished and homeless men have access to proper clothing for job interviews and for when they re-enter the work force.

I am currently working with Helping Up Mission, a men's rehabilitation shelter in Baltimore, to collect gently used suits and business attire for their members. Helping Up Mission has a yearlong religious based program in which they help men recover from addiction. At any given time, there are 500 men at their campus in various stages of recovery. As part of their program, the participants are given the opportunity to interview with local businesses.

Starting Sunday, December 8 and continuing through Sunday, December 29, to assist in my project, I will have a collection box in the Narthex to collect men's suits, ties, dress shirts, dress pants, suit and sport jackets.

I ask that the clothing articles be in good condition, current styles, no stains or tears, no missing buttons, and the zippers must work.

As part of my project, after the collection I will be sorting everything and getting the articles cleaned and delivered to Helping Up Mission in February, so they will have time to distribute the clothing to their residents for their March interviews.

To help with cleaning costs, I will be having a fundraiser at Peace of Pizza on Mellor Ave. on Wednesday, January 15, 2020 from 4 to 8 pm. Part of the sales that night will go towards my fundraising efforts. If you can join us for dine-in or carry-out, let them know at the register it is for Eric's Eagle Project. I will have a collection box there as well for any additional clothing donations.

Proceeds will be donated to Lutheran World Relief.




SALEM'S BOOK GROUP


Salem's Book Group meets on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Upper room although we skip December. *Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again* by Rachel Held Evans is planned for January 13th with a snow date of June 8th and *The Pioneers: The Heroic Story of the Settlers Who Brought the American Ideal West* by David McCullough is scheduled for February 10th.

If the Bible isn't a science book or an instruction manual, then what is it? What do people mean when they say the Bible is inspired? When Rachel Held Evans found herself asking these questions, she began a quest to better understand what the Bible is and how it is meant to be read. What she discovered changed her--and it will change you too.

Drawing on the best in recent scholarship and using her well-honed literary expertise, Evans examines some of our favorite Bible stories and possible interpretations, retelling them through memoir, original poetry, short stories,



soliloquies, and even a short screenplay in *Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again*. Undaunted by the Bible's most difficult passages, Evans wrestles through the process of doubting, imagining, and debating Scripture's mysteries. The Bible, she discovers, is not a static work but is a living, breathing, captivating, and confounding book that is able to equip us to join God's loving and redemptive work in the world.



Pulitzer Prize-winning historian David McCullough rediscovers an important and dramatic chapter in the American story—the settling of the Northwest Territory by dauntless pioneers who overcame incredible hardships to build a community based on ideals that would come to define our country.

As part of the Treaty of Paris, in which Great Britain recognized the new United States of America, Britain ceded the land that comprised the immense Northwest Territory, a wilderness empire northwest of the Ohio River containing the future states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin. A Massachusetts minister named Manasseh Cutler was instrumental in opening this vast territory to veterans of the Revolutionary War and their families for settlement. Included in the Northwest Ordinance were three remarkable conditions: freedom of religion, free universal education, and most importantly, the prohibition of slavery. In 1788 the first band of pioneers set out from New England for the Northwest Territory under the leadership of Revolutionary War veteran General Rufus Putnam. They settled in what is now

Marietta on the banks of the Ohio River.

McCullough tells the story through five major characters: Cutler and Putnam; Cutler's son Ephraim; and two other men, one a carpenter turned architect, and the other a physician who became a prominent pioneer in American science. They and their families created a town in a primeval wilderness, while coping with such frontier realities as floods, fires, wolves and bears, no roads or bridges, no guarantees of any sort, all the while negotiating a contentious and sometimes hostile relationship with the native people. Like so many of McCullough's subjects, they let no obstacle deter or defeat them.

Drawn in great part from a rare and all-but-unknown collection of diaries and letters by the key figures, *The Pioneers* is a uniquely American story of people whose ambition and courage led them to remarkable accomplishments. This is a revelatory and quintessentially American story, written with David McCullough's signature narrative energy.

MOSAIC REDEDICATION

Salem celebrated the rededication weekend for the reredos and the very fine mosaic tile restoration on Sunday, October 20 with a very animated Pot Luck fellowship dinner and talk delivered by Mr. Mark West and Mr. Rick Shelley, the artists who performed the restoration. There were over 60 folks who attended the dinner and slide presentation with lecture. The attendees were from the Baltimore art community and Salem members. Pastor Dave kicked off the festivities with the doxology and a warm and fun evening of fellowship, food, and information about the restoration of tiles by experts Mr. West and Mr. Shelley ensued. The mosaics were last cleaned 39 years ago and were sorely in need of cleaning and repair. The attendees learned much about the wonderful art pieces of Salem, to include the Tiffany stained glass pieces, the Tiffany glass tiles, and past contributors to Salem's art.

After the talk and slide presentation, Mr. West and Mr. Shelley invited the audience to review pieces of the mosaic tile walls, and Mr. Shelley also demonstrated the process of cutting tiles and glass and how mosaic pieces are created. These two gentlemen were most generous with their time and talents, donating a number of hours of work without compensation so that the project could be completed.

QUILT SHOW IN AGAPE GALLERY

The days are shorter and the nights are colder. But Salem can keep you warm: A hot drink (see Pr. Ed's Fair Trade table), a good read (check out the Salem book club), and...a quilt? From now until January 5, the Agape Gallery presents *Pieced Warmth*, an exhibition of 20 quilts by members of the Village Quilters Guild. And three of the quilts are the work of two members of Salem.

Jane Stolte's "Bold Bargello" is an in-your-face arrangement of 21 different fabrics ("pretty complicated," according to Jane), that came together at a quilting retreat. "It was a challenge." On the other hand, her "Mysterious Winter" is the result of an online "mystery quilt" and is shown side-by-side to "A Christmas Story" (same pattern, different quilters and fabric selections).



Salemite Rene Stiebing is well represented with "Kimono," made using remnants of Asian fabrics and reflecting her lifelong interest in Asian art (who knew?). Rene said that Jane had the fabric for the kimonos, but that she spied the neutral cotton batik on a quilters' "free table" and knew it was "perfect."

A good mix of traditional quilt patterns and those not-so-much, subdued colors and vibrant hues, large quilts and small: there is a good mix. "East Meets West" is centered around a vintage handkerchief depicting Buddhist temples and gods. Another documents memories of a visit to Germany. "I Spy" is sure to evoke a smile (particularly to the young at heart), while

"Paradise Patchers: In Memoriam" pays tribute to quilters who have not been forgotten. One has a purposeful "mistake," because only God is perfect.

The Agape Gallery is located in the upstairs hallway and this time spills into the Katie Luther Room. Although some of their members' work has been exhibited here before, this is the first show dedicated

exclusively to the Village Quilters Guild, approximately 100 women of varying experience and skills. The Guild meets on the third Thursday of each month from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., September through June, at the FOP Lodge. Meetings include a speaker's talk, show-and-tell, and potluck luncheon; there is a holiday party and June tea. Dues are nominal, and visitors, for just \$3, are welcome, even if only for inspiration. Special events include contributions to a variety of charitable projects. On the Salem front, just saying, Rene is the president, and Jane is the secretary.
