"Who and what he was future ages will know without a stone."

~Inscription on the tomb of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg (translated from Latin)

Any study of the early Lutheran church in America encounters the towering presence of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg. Born in 1711 in the German Electorate of Hanover, ordained in 1739, Muhlenberg emigrated to America in 1742. He was called by German-speaking Lutherans in Pennsylvania. Muhlenberg discovered a church that was scattered, desolate and leaderless. His tireless work, infectious spirit and capable leadership led to the creation of a Lutheran church in America that lives on today in the 9,000 congregations of the ELCA and in thousands of life-sustaining Lutheran schools and ministries in the United States, and around the world. Indeed, no memorial stone is needed to commemorate Muhlenberg's life and work.

And, for many of us, we too can look to the saints who have gone before us and left blessing upon

blessing on us during their lifetimes. Saints who passed on the gift of faith, who have selflessly sacrificed on our behalf, who have modeled kindness and love. Saints who need no stones for us to cherish their enduring presence in our lives.

This All Saints Day we give thanks to God for all the saints who from their labors rest, and who have left us a rich legacy of faithfulness.

Not only that, but you have the benefit of quality products besides! Look for the Fair Trade cart in the narthex.



WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ADULT FORUM!

November finds us launching into a five-part series entitled "Transformed Community: God's Agent of CHANGE led by Jim Kempton; this is part of the Lutheran Outdoor Ministry for 2019. The theme verse for the five sessions is Romans 12:2, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect."

The kind of transformation Paul is talking about, change that requires the "renewing" of minds, is not easily come by. It demands that we not conform to this world but rather live counter-culturally. This kind of faithfulness requires a group effort! We will focus on the nature and character of Christian community—what kind of change it makes in the world and also how it challenges its individual members, even as it sustains them, in the work of living with radical generosity, inclusion, compassion, justice, and forgiveness.

November 3: Generosity Transforms Community (Acts 2:41-47, the early Christian community)

November 10: Compassion Transforms Community (Luke 14:7-14, the parable of the wedding banquet)

November 24: Inclusion Transforms Community (Luke 10:25-37, the parable of the good Samaritan)

(Please note that each session is self-contained, but they are tied together by the theme verse; in other words, one can miss one session and still get something out of the other three.)

Justice Transforms Community (Matthew 20:1-16, the parable of the laborers in the vineyard) and Forgiveness Transforms Community (Mark 2:1-12, Jesus heals the paralyzed man) will be topics for two Sundays in early 2020. (Think of it as your favorite television series taking a holiday break.)

VIVALDI'S GLORIA TO BE PRESENTED ON DECEMBER 15th

Salem's many talented musicians, accompanied by several guest artists, will perform Antonio Vivaldi's *Gloria* at both services on December 15th. Each year Director of Music Mary Miller selects a cantata written for either the Lenten or the Advent season and directs its performance as a sermon-in-music during worship. The words of *Gloria* are especially appropriate for this Third Sunday in Advent since they include the message of the angels to the shepherds, announcing the birth of the Christ child, "Glory to God in the highest" (Luke 2:14).

Vivaldi (1678-1741) composed the cantata in about 1715, as part of his duties as a violin instructor and composer at the Ospedale della Pieta, an orphanage-conservatory for homeless girls in Venice. Like his father before him he was an accomplished violinist, a skill that brought him to the faculty of the school in 1703, a few months after being ordained as a



priest. His decision to enter the priesthood seems to have been based on the financial support it could offer while he pursued a career in music. He was a prolific composer, writing probably more than a thousand pieces of music during his lifetime. Scholars believe his works were known to Johann Sebastian Bach and influenced his composing.

Although successful and popular during his life, Vivaldi did not manage his wealth well and was buried in a pauper's grave in Vienna. It was not until the 20th century that the manuscript of *Gloria* was rediscovered among his writings. It was first performed in modern times in Siena in 1939. It was not until 1957 that the most authentic original version was first performed at the First Festival of Baroque Music at Brooklyn College, New York.

Salem is very blessed to be able to experience this inspiring work as we prepare for the celebration of Christmas.

FROM OUR SEMINARIAN

Greetings Salem Family in Christ,


Time has flown by since the last time I wrote for you all here in *The Monarch*. Quite a few things have changed for the better in my life. The latest publication saw me as a cosmopolitan young bachelor at our seminary in Chicago, Illinois, coming back East to do hospital chaplaincy in Gettysburg, PA. Well, over this summer, your seminarian ministered to over one thousand five -hundred patients, visitors, and staff at WellSpan Gettysburg Hospital and WellSpan Surgical Center. My work primarily focused in the Emergency Department, where I learned very much about pastoral care in times of crisis.



I lived at United Lutheran Seminary-Gettysburg Campus during chaplaincy, and just happened to be placed across the hall from a lovely young woman named Amelia, also a seminarian and a chaplain at WellSpan York Hospital. Well, to make a long story short, we've been dating for five months now, and for *some* reason I decided to transfer my seminary education entirely to ULS-Gettysburg. This semester is quite exciting, and I've been taking many pastoral care classes in particular, with Rural and Small Church Ministry as a highlight. CHILDREN'S MINISTRIES




SALEM BOOK GROUP

Salem's Book Group meets on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Upper room. On October 14th we discussed our own experiences and vignettes from *Accidental Saints: Finding God in All the Wrong People*. We'll explore flight and race relations with *Hidden Figures* on November 11th (snow date of January 8th). *Inspired: Slaying Giants, Walking on Water, and Loving the Bible Again* is planned for January 13th and *The Pioneers: The Heroic Story of the Settlers Who Brought the American Ideal West* is scheduled for February 10th.

Before John Glenn orbited the earth, or Neil Armstrong walked on the moon, a group of dedicated female

mathematicians known as "human computers" used pencils, slide rules and adding machines to calculate the numbers that would launch rockets, and astronauts, into space.

Among these problem-solvers were a group of exceptionally talented African American women, some of the brightest minds of their generation. Originally relegated to teaching math in the South's segregated public schools, they were called into service during the labor shortages of World War II, when America's aeronautics industry was in dire need of anyone who had the right stuff. Suddenly, these overlooked math whizzes had a shot at jobs worthy of their skills, and they answered Uncle Sam's call, moving to Hampton, Virginia and the fascinating, high-energy world of the Langley Memorial Aeronautical Laboratory.



Starting in World War II and moving through to the Cold War, the Civil Rights Movement, and the Space Race, *Hidden Figures* follows the interwoven accounts of Dorothy Vaughan, Mary Jackson, Katherine Johnson, and Christine Darden, four African American women who participated in some of NASA's greatest successes. It chronicles their careers over the nearly three decades they faced challenges, forged alliances, and used their intellect to change their own lives, and their country's future.

His theme will focus on the passage above. "Jesus spoke of his desire that all people might be united in their love for one another as he and his Father were of one mind and Spirit. In this time of increasing divisiveness in our country, where bigotry, intolerance and the impulse to attack rather than listen respectfully to the views of others has become the norm, what might it mean for us to live into Jesus' dream for his followers?"
