Gift cards have a \$0 balance, and the kids are back in school, once again praying for snow days.


It's January 6, the twelfth day of Christmas, Call it Epiphany, the Feast of the Magi, "Little Christmas." Or how about "The Day of the Three Kings"?

This year, Salem will host a Three Kings/Tres Reyes worship service at 4 p.m. on Sunday, January 6. Conducted in Spanish, the service will be led by Pastor Paula Canby of Shepherd of the Glen Lutheran Church, Glenwood (Howard County).

The idea to worship in Spanish is the brainchild of Pastor Dave. "I have been noticing Hispanic folk in the north Winter's Lane/Melvin Park area," he said, "and in my poking around, I had a conversation with a guidance counselor at Hillcrest Elementary, who confirmed that – yes! – there is a growing presence of Hispanic folk there."

One objective of this new way to worship is to gauge interest in the community for Spanish services, Pastor Dave added, a "build it and (hope) they will come" effort.

Of course, English-speaking folk are welcome to attend, and the bulletin will be bilingual. An opportunity to brush up your high school Spanish?

# ADULT FORUM FOR JANUARY 2019 WHO AM I TO BE? WITH PASTOR ANN



Each of the 3 sessions (January 6, 13, and 20) will have this general structure:

- \* Introducing the theme in a brief, teacher-led talk
- \* Taking an active part in a related spiritual exercise
- \* After some time of silence, opening to questions and discussion that are not always 'teacher-led'

#### January 6 Just a Toe in the Water

January 1st of every year seems to reawaken pledges to change. Bad habits are the most likely targets to expel from our lives. But a spacious-seeming New Year also has room for new aspirations, such as exploring spiritual life. How we approach this – as either "our human project" or "the Spirit's work in us" (and, thus, God's business) – could lead to quite different outcomes. This Toe-in-the-Water class will cover the territory as if we were preparing for a trip: Learning useful words and phrases; taking inventory of 'your' suitcase; and practicing what to leave behind. Bon Voyage!

#### January 13 A Sense of Direction

Whether you are walking a trail in Baltimore County or trying to find your way in Venice, Italy, most of us are grateful for a 'natural' sense of direction. In this 'chapter' of the forum we will talk about how the 5, or 6, senses can be like a spiritual compass. Some biblical stories will be reads as models of this.... Which may, in turn, prompt personal memories of spiritual path-making.

#### January 20 Being Mortal... and Navigating Beyond

The title, "Being Mortal," is taken from a recently-published book by physician Atul Gawande. He observed changes in the way we treat very-late-middle-age and time-of-death; changes brought about by medical science that have subsequently rocked familial and social life. In Christian theology, the (mortal) time-of-death is mirrored by 'entry into' eternal life. Is this next aspect of our lives static? ...Or could it be just as dynamic (more dynamic?) as our spiritual learning/growing in present life has been? Obviously a highly-speculative hour of adult forum, this is not without implications for how we want to live – and die – now.

#### COLUMN FROM SEMINARIAN DANIEL COLLINS

Dearest Salem Family,

Greetings through our Lord Jesus Christ. It has been my distinct privilege to attend the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago for this, my first semester, as one of your two seminarians. This was made possible by your generous financial support, for which I heartily thank you. A great many of you have provided support to me in this endeavor, and for this I praise God. I pray for you in the congregation and keep you in my heart. I will be writing for you in a new column of the Monarch, and I hope to encourage conversation with you through this contribution.

As for what I am doing here, I have received fine teaching in theology, parish practice, and devotion to our Lord. This past semester, I took classes in Hebrew Bible, New Testament Greek, Ministerial Leadership, and Historical Theology. I would like to highlight the Rev. Dr. Ralph W. Klein II, the professor of the Hebrew Bible course, who is one of the top ten Old Testament Scholars of the past century. He translated II Chronicles for the NRSV, and was recently asked to translate Ezekiel for the newest revision of the NRSV, to



which he declined, citing retirement. He was one of the leaders of the Seminex movement, which was instrumental in the foundation of the ELCA. Pastor Gerry Rickel was one of his first students; I will be one of his last. The Rev. Dr. Kimberly R. Wagner, one of my professors in Ministerial Leadership, a fiery preacher and compassionate educator, is a rising star in the theological community for her watershed research on ministerial response to the unfortunate phenomenon of gun violence in this country. Hers will be a name to watch for as her dissertation will soon be turned into a groundbreaking bestseller for all to read. Last, but certainly not least, I must also mention Dr. Eunyung Lim, my fantastic Greek professor, who just received her Ph.D. in New Testament Studies from Harvard Divinity School this past May. She is a dynamic teacher and preeminent scholar, and also my advisor. I look very much forward to working with her in these coming years.

Now, as you all know, the Lord works in mysterious ways. As it turns out, my beloved Salem



congregation, your two seminarians live just above and below each other in the same building! Many congratulations to the soon-to-be Rev. Amy Asendorf Berger. You saw that first in print here. If you haven't seen the pictures of her and Mathew's new cat, I would advise you to see them as it is spiritually nourishing. Amy and Mathew have provided me with counsel and advice in a new and strange place this semester, for which I am grateful. I got to know Pastoral Assistant Sarah

this Christmas, and with her excellent preaching and refreshing pastoral style, she will no doubt soar to great heights, which I await with great anticipation. Finally, I would like to thank the most Christian shepherds of our parish: Pastor Ann, Pastor Dave, and Pastor Ed, and our Eminent Bishop Gohl for their support of my candidacy. The church is privileged to have leadership such as yours. Furthermore, here's a shout-out to Council President Philip, perhaps the youngest in the denomination. He's one of the hardest workers that I know. Give him a hearty welcome on my behalf.

Christ prevails, Christ reigns, Christ commands.





Your financial contributions to Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services are needed more than ever.










### SALEM CHRISTMAS SUPPER CLUB FESTIVITIES




#### SAVE THE DATE: WORLD DAY OF PRAYER


#### **BOOK GROUP**


The Death of Mrs. Westaway by Ruth Ware
