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FROM OUR SEMINARIAN DANIEL COLLINS



Dearest Salem Family,

Greetings through our Lord Jesus Christ. Once more, it has been my distinct privilege to attend the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago as one of your two seminarians. Due to your generous moral and financial support, I visited Israel, Palestine, Jordan, and Egypt in a travel seminar led by our Palestinian Christian guide Victor, and two seminary professors, the Rev. Dr. Barbara R. Rossing, and the Rev. Dr. Klaus-Peter Adam. Dr. Rossing is a first-class expert on the

book of Revelation; keep an eye out for her newest upcoming book on the intersection of Revelation and climate change. Dr. Adam is the world's foremost scholar of the book of Leviticus, and has assisted on several important archaeological excavations in the Holy Land. Their know-how was greatly appreciated, and on several occasions we found inscriptions

millennia-old and read them with their help.

We visited and heard stories from both sides of the Israel-Palestine conflict, and were quite disheartened to learn that Christians are often caught in the crossfire. Dr. Guy Davis and I ran into each other at a presentation by the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb on the plight of Palestine and Palestinian Christians at his Dar al-Kalima University in Bethlehem (the West Bank), a humanities school where he hopes to empower young Palestinians for leadership and artistry in these difficult times. I also ran into our friend Dr. Davis at the Israel Museum in Jerusalem, where he was quite industrious and diligent in documenting his experiences with photography while traveling with his group from the United Lutheran Seminary of Pennsylvania. My group traversed onto Mount Sinai, which is under the



jurisdiction of the Orthodox Church. It was a very moving experience to see the determination and devotion of Egyptian Christians despite the flourishing terrorist sects in the Sinai Peninsula. Please remember them in your prayers. After forty hours of travel from the foot of Mount Sinai to BWI, I was able to rest and be with you all for our congregational meeting. I thank God for all of the work that we have done, and that we are able to do, and pray God that we may continue in our great endeavors as well as see our areas of improvement. The diligence of the council and its youthful, discerning president continues to encourage me as to the direction of our congregation. Once more, I would like to warmly thank and recognize the most Christian shepherds of our parish: the most dynamic and devout Pastoral Assistant Sarah, the wise and cordial Pastors Ann, Dave, and Ed, and his Excellency Bishop Gohl. The mutual support that this congregation demonstrates shows me a distinct emulation of the spirit of

Pentecost, and gives me so much hope in an age where many have lost it in the church.



MODEL OF SALEM RETURNS HOME

As plans were being made for Salem's 170th anniversary celebration, Pr. Dave suggested that we approach the Catonsville Historical Society to return the model of our building, created in 1955 by our member Richard Eitemiller. Miraculously the model survived the May flood of their building and the Society was happy to oblige.

On Friday, February 15th, Sharon Stanton, Don Schwartz, and Joey Morgan retrieved the model and set it up in the Narthex where it will now be on display during our anniversary year. Thanks go to Sharon for coordinating this and to Don and Joey for doing the moving as well as for cleaning the heavily soiled Plexiglas cover and for gently adjusting some of the display elements.

The model dates to 1955 when Salem was in the process of constructing its original Parish Education Building. Richard Eitemiller supported this project by crafting the model that included a slot in the roof where donations to fund the project could be placed. After several years on display, the model was put into storage at Salem and then brought out in 1971 for the church's art festival. It moved to the Catonsville Library in 1972 to be part of an exhibit of vintage items from several local churches. After its appearance at the library, it eventually moved to the Historical Society, where there was adequate space available for housing it.

The model is 1/8 inch scale and was built using the construction blueprints for the new building and photographs of the original church. A light layer of spackling plaster was spread over the entire building, and the stonework was outlined with a small paintbrush and then colored. Richard Eitemiller estimated that the project took a total of 300 hours to complete, and a refurbishment in 1971 required an additional 250 hours. After years of faithful membership at Salem, he died in 1994 at age 89. He is buried beside his wife, Ruth, at Loudon Park Cemetery.

Today the model could use some cleaning and possibly some minor repairs. Salem is looking for volunteers with experience in working with miniature displays or model railroad layouts who would be willing to undertake this task. Please call the church office if you are interested.

FEBRUARY CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

The Council met with Pastor Paula Canby about outreach to our Hispanic neighbors in Catonsville. Pastor Paula, who led our Three Kings service on Epiphany Day, has offered to work *probono* to do outreach to our Hispanic community in Catonsville. She did ask the congregation to pay for a course in June at the Lutheran Seminary Program in the Southwest (Austin, TX) which would provide advanced Spanish lessons and Hispanic outreach training. The Council authorized up to \$1,200 from the Mission Fund to be used for this training.

Also, the Council approved a list of potential Call Committee members presented by Lisa Yerkey, Call Chair, and Pastor Asendorf. The Call Committee will interview Seminarian Sarah Garrett Krey for the full-time position of Associate Pastor. (Note: there will be no other candidates interviewed.)

SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES AT SALEM

Graduating in 2019? You might be eligible for a Salem Scholarship!

Salem's high school seniors - and their families - have many concerns about post-high school plans at the beginning of the new year, not the least of which is the cost of higher education. Do keep in mind the ministry of Salem's Scholarship program, which for over 20 years has assisted Salem members as they undertake the next step in their academic preparation. Stipends of up to \$750 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill, but they can make an important difference.

Salem scholarships recognize accomplishment in any of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need. They also take into account the differing ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may be the best fit for students. The deadline for 2019 applications is **April 15**th. Salem's high school seniors will receive a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program, but it's not too early to learn about the program. If you want to learn more, a print brochure and application form are available from the church office.

MARNI McNICHOL SCHOLARSHIP 2019

Salem member Meghan McNichol-Tress would like to inform the congregation's high school seniors of a scholarship in memory of her mother. The Marni McNichol scholarship is open to all seniors graduating from a Maryland high school who will be attending college next year. Typically the students selected will have been affected by someone close to them having breast cancer but any students whose lives have been affected by another type of cancer are also encouraged to apply. The top winner will receive \$10,000 and \$10,000 will be divided between three runner ups. Applications should be submitted by **April 1**st and winners will be announced the first week of May. Talk about getting involved right from the start: Meg Bower is already a member of Salem's refugee task force. For that matter, this profile might easily have been an autobiography, in light of the fact that she has joined Salem's communications committee. (For the record, she was assigned to write about other new disciples).

As often happens, it was her role as a mom that first brought Meg to Salem. "I've been hanging around Salem for a number of years," she explained, having first worshiped at the children's Christmas Eve service. She has spent many hours on the premises as a "piano mom" (her daughter studies with Mary Miller) and then as a "choir mom" (when her daughter joined St. David's Choir). On those Sundays when the choir sings at the 8:15 a.m. Sunday services, Meg has been worshiping on the left-hand side of the nave, towards the front. And then she has found herself as a "stage mom," thanks to summer drama camp and the Salem Players' production of *Peter Pan*. The question remains, however, when does Meg find time for her demanding career as an AICP-certified planner. Meg was born in Michigan and lived there until she was three. 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BOOK GROUP

The Salem Book Group meets on the **second Monday** of each month at **7:30 p.m.** in the Upper Room.

Following a snow delay, we discussed *Big Little Lies* by Liane Moriarty on February 25th. From the author of Nine Perfect Strangers, Truly Madly Guilty, and The Husband's Secret comes a novel about the dangerous little lies we tell ourselves just to survive.

On March 11th, we will discuss Joanna Goodman's The Finishing School. In this suspenseful, provocative novel of friendship, secrets, and deceit, a successful writer returns to her elite Swiss boarding school to get to the bottom of a tragic accident that took place while she was a student twenty vears earlier.

How far would you go to uncover the truth?

One spring night in 1998 the beautiful Cressida Strauss plunges from a fourth-floor balcony at the Lycée Internationale Suisse with catastrophic consequences. Loath to draw negative publicity to the school, a bastion of European wealth and glamour, officials quickly dismiss the incident as an accident, but questions remain: Was it a suicide attempt? Or was Cressida pushed? It was no secret that she had a selfish streak and had earned as many enemies as allies in her tenure at the school. For her best friend, scholarship student Kersti Kuusk, the lingering questions surrounding Cressida's fall continue to nag long after she leaves the Lycée.



Kersti marries and becomes a bestselling writer, but never stops

wondering about Cressida's obsession with the Helvetian Society—a secret club banned years before their arrival at the school—and a pair of its members who were expelled. When Kersti is invited as a guest to the Lycée's 100th Anniversary, she begins probing the cover-up, unearthing a frightening underbelly of lies and abuse at the prestigious establishment. And in one portentous moment, Kersti makes a decision that will connect her to Cressida forever and raise the stakes dangerously high in her own desire to solve the mystery and redeem her past.

An unputdownable read as clever as it is compelling, *The Finishing School* offers a riveting glimpse into a privileged, rarefied world in which nothing is as it appears.

AND DID YOU KNOW? ABOUT OUR SEMINARIAN, DANIEL

'Here I am, a Lutheran seminarian'

Several things drew Daniel to Lutheran School of Theology (LSTC) in Chicago, including his desire for a more ecumenical community since he is a recent addition to the Lutheran community. He also got a better financial aid package there, since two other seminary options didn't include costs beyond tuition.

Daniel was raised Southern Baptist in Baltimore, Md., went to Presbyterian (PCA) schooling, attended Messiah College, an Anabaptist institution, and now says, "Here I am, a Lutheran seminarian."

"The Nicene Faith brought me here and the reforming zeal keeps me here," he said.

Having sojourned through multiple denominations, he attempts to carefully balance theological, philosophical, and historical positions to compare many perspectives within Christian faith, in order to strengthen his Lutheran perspective "for the sake of catholicity."

Daniel says "My journey has been rather different from the average cradle Lutheran. Between me and my colleagues, our reactions can be different, and there is a productive exchange of ideas. We are all deeply committed to social justice, and I endeavor to pursue it from the vantage point of orthodoxy."
