Martin Falls

Martin Falls (also Marty) is a native of Morrell Park in Baltimore City and grew up in Elkridge, Maryland. After many addresses in the Baltimore/Howard County area and a few years in Cleveland, Ohio, he now resides in his childhood home in Elkridge, with a (Howard County) Rockburn Branch Park trailhead opposite his driveway and the Avalon area of Patapsco Valley State Park five minutes from his back yard. He has been an avid hiker.

Marty "doesn't come from Lutheran." He was raised in a Methodist church by his parents, who then joined a Christian fundamentalist church while he was still young. This changed his life, but not ultimately for the better, as he was born transgender, which took some time to figure out back then. By age 17, he was in "Christian counseling" for "conversion therapy." By age 19, he was disowned by his parents, excommunicated from the church, and homeless. For some time after, he had a severe "church allergy" and wandered far from the God and the faith of his youth, exploring Buddhism, Hinduism, and Celtic Paganism, and attending churches

of the Metropolitan Community Church, Unitarian Universalist Association, and United Church of Christ denominations.

In 2001, Marty returned to Maryland to care for his mother until her death in 2010. During that time his dog, Alley, a rescue pit bull mix from Baltimore, rescued him and saw him through many challenges. She was his constant companion until he helped her leave her broken body in 2014, 13 years to the day they met.

In January 2019, after much personal loss and deeply depressed, Marty sought a new church home. He remembered the "castle" Salem seemed to him as a child when he went grocery shopping in Catonsville with his mother and saw it again and again. He Googled local churches; Salem was still there!. He emailed Salem's office to ask about the inclusion statement. Within hours, Pr. Dave Asendorf answered and invited him to breakfast at Atwater's for discussion and a tour of the church. Marty has been a part of Salem's family ever since. At Pr. Dave's request, he edited the inclusion statement on Salem's homepage. Marty describes himself as a huge fan/supporter of Pr. Dave, soon-to-be Pr. Sarah, and Pr. Ann, and as "that guy up front who cries."

Marty is a Professional technical writer and editor, currently between jobs. His interests/ background include theater, film, photography, vocal/choral music, animal rescue, environmentalism, and LGBTQ rights. He has sung second tenor in Salem's Psalm 98.

REFUGEE TASK FORCE NOTES




Frank Heber

CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

- Upon receiving news that the Call Committee unanimously recommends the congregation call Sarah Garrett Krey as our full time Associate Pastor, the Council will vote at its June meeting whether to recommend her to the congregation. (Tentative call vote will be on Saturday, June 29 and Sunday, June 30.)
- The Church Council voted to hire Terminix to treat the building for a new termite infestation. The price tag is not quite \$5,000. {The work has been completed.]
- Voted to provide \$2,000 to Sarah Garrett Krey for moving expenses predicated on her being called to Salem as the Associate Pastor.
- Voted to spend approximately \$7,600 to restore and clean the chancel mosaic tiles. [The work has begun.]
- Referred back to Property a proposal by the Property Committee regarding replacing failing connectors in overhead heating system water pipes. The Council requests a more precise estimate from the contractor, A. J. Michaels.

Talk about your "cradle Lutheran": She was baptized as an infant by Pastor Newby, confirmed by Pastor Lottich, and served on Pastor Whetstone's call committee. She attended Sunday School during the "golden days" when baby boomers regularly filled every room in Salem's new wing. She sang in the Junior Choir under the leadership of Elsie Rau and studied every Sunday under the tutelage of devoted teachers that included Miss Elizabeth Heinmuller, (who regularly led opening services with the 23rd psalm, complete with hand motions). She attended three years of confirmation class, trudging every Thursday from Catonsville Junior High (now the new Catonsville Elementary) to Salem, snacking on two cookies and a cup of juice, and, under the pastor's eye, studying Luther's Small Catechism, with, among others, David Rau. PASTOR DAVID ASENDORF WINS PRESTIGIOUS AWARD

Pastor David Asendorf was presented with the Dr. Richard Lee Peterman Good Steward Award at the Delaware-Maryland Synod Assembly. This national award was established in 1984 to honor the parish pastor who demonstrates leadership in stewardship ministry by using innovative programs or new resources to make significant gains in stewardship. Rev. Dr. Amsalu Geleta, Executive Assistant to

Bishop William Gohl and Director for Evangelical Mission and a member of Salem, nominated Pr. Dave for this award. Pr. Dave modestly stated that this award should go to Salem. While some of the contributions noted below were provided by the congregation with the urging of Pr. Dave, most were solely his own.

CONGRATULATIONS, PASTOR DAVE!

In his nomination, Dr. Amsalu wrote:

I believe Pastor **David Asendorf** should receive the **GOOD STEWARD AWARD** because: Pastor Asendorf lives, serves, and leads as a good steward of God's resources. He not only inspires his congregation to support the ministry at the congregation but enables them to support planting churches, support struggling congregations, the synod and the larger church.



He was called December 2006 to Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church, Catonsville, MD and began his call as Associate Pastor at Salem on January 1, 2007 and ordained January 13, 2007. The congregation voted to change his call to Pastor on August 24, 2008.

Pastor Asendorf serves and encourages the congregation to be partners with local, synodical and ecumenical partners. He uses God's given resources to experiment new outreach ministries, shared his gifts, talents and treasure with his local church and community, with the synod, and beyond. Each year the congregation gives to a new and renewing congregation a substantial amount of money to start new and fund the ongoing ministries.


Many of us are already aware of Pr. Dave's many contributions to our Synod and to the Catonsville community. To give few examples of how he leads the life of steward, Dr. Amsalu listed a few of Pr.. Dave's contributions

Synod Service

- 2007 Served on the Synod Assembly Worship Planning Team
- 2007-2015 Served as a Synod representative on the Directing Committee of the Lutheran Campus Ministry, University of Maryland
- 2007 to present Works to help organize and lead the annual Synod Summer Confirmation Camp, a week-long retreat for confirmands held at Mar-Lu-Ridge
- 2009 2010 Served as Intern Cluster Leader, LTSG
- 2010 Helped to create a Synod Green Team to encourage Synod congregations to support environmental education and action. Hosted a one-day Green Event at Salem Church in the Fall of 2010 that addressed greening church buildings, organic gardening and being proactive in various water issues. This effort laid the groundwork for the Synod's present Creation Care ministry.
- 2011- present Works closely with the pastor of Community of St. Dysmas, the Synod's Prison congregation, on a variety of issues. Salem provides free office space for St. Dysmas, in addition to other material and financial support.
- 2012 to present Serves on the Synod Candidacy Committee; appointed Chairperson of

the committee in May 2015

- 2009-2013 Worked with the Synod to help launch Oasis of Grace, a SAWC [Synodically Authorized Worshipping Community] in the Owings Mills. The Salem congregation served as the fiscal agent and provided financial support, and counsel and support provided to the mission developer, Pastor Hambisa Belina.
- 2013-2015 Actively supported the Synod's effort to establish a mission congregation, now called Church on the Square, in the Canton neighborhood of Baltimore City. The Salem congregation provided \$60,000 over three years in addition to other logistical and spiritual support
- 2013-2015 Co-chaired the Synod's Malaria Campaign Task Force (Note: Salem Church, a congregation of 600, raised over \$33,000 for the campaign, the 8th largest giving congregation in the ELCA as reported by *The Lutheran*).



- August 2016 April 2017 served as Vice-Pastor of St. Andrew's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Parkville, MD
- Ongoing –Offers meeting space at Salem for most of synodical committees, boards, teams, workshops and trainings. Pastor Dave and his staff are always open to synodical ministries and actively participate in them.

Catonsville Community Service

- 2012 2013 Launched a community organizing initiative to address homelessness in our community, in response to homeless people coming to Salem. Gathered Baltimore County government representatives, elected State and Baltimore County leaders, other congregations, and community organizations to develop a three-prong effort to combat homelessness through an education program at the local men's homeless shelter, to recruit interns from local colleges to volunteer at the shelter, and to improve health services for homeless men.
- 2012 to present Serves on the Catonsville Emergency Food Ministry (now named Catonsville Emergency Assistance), the local food pantry. The organization also assists with eviction prevention and utility assistance. Secretary 2013 -2015, Vice Pr.esident 2015-2017, President 2017-2019
- 2016 Present Organized a Catonsville Ministerium, local Catonsville clergy that meet monthly to network and interact with the community on various issues like safety of our congregations and combating political hate
- 2018 led the congregation to send \$15,000 to Salem Lutheran in Baltimore City and \$16, 000 to Faith Lutheran in Salisbury, Maryland to help them with ministry expenses.
- 2018 Led the congregation to provide a financial gift to St John's, Brooklyn, which was struggling to fix their old boiler so that they can continue an excellent ministry of feeding the poor in the neighborhood.



In celebration of Salem's 170th Anniversary, we were asked to re-run a poem originally written by Pastor Ed Whetstone for our 150th anniversary and updated in our 165th anniversary year.

In Honor of Salem's 150th Anniversary

Listen, beloved, and you will hear
Salem's story from its very first year
till now, year one hundred sixty-five,
and how the church continues to thrive,
all by grace in this time and sphere.

With immigrant ships our story began crossing the sea from German lands, fleeing hardship and hunger, revolution and strife, to find in this new world new hope, new life, these refugees from their *Vaterland*.

They built a fieldstone church on a country lane, a home midst their homes to worship again, where they'd pray and sing when the bell was rung in liturgy accustomed to their ear and tongue, giving thanks in familiar refrain.

To the church they streamed on the Sabbath day, by horse or carriage or walking their way.

"Ein feste Berg" were the words they sang when the organ pipes from the balcony rang, and "Unser Vater" were the words they'd pray.

All 'round the church God's Acre lay, waiting generations passing away.

For children a schoolhouse was built on the lot; in German and English the lessons were taught. Both in life and death, church held sway.

At the close of the first half century's duration, still faithful to their baptismal vocation, they dared together a courageous decision; for the gospel they embraced a stirring vision, mindful too of the next generation.

It must be counted Salem's boldest feat that they left country lane to build on Main Street, leaving German behind for a wider grace, here poised the community to embrace, their metamorphosis to native complete.

In the heart of the village they laid the foundation; then in 1903 was the dedication, a magnificent building of cut granite stone

with a spacious nave like they'd never known, and their dream began its realization.

The parish flourished in this visible place, and soon they adorned their cherished space with a pipe organ, mosaic tiles, marble and brass, a masterful painting and brilliant stained glass, a sanctuary of uncommon grace.

Parish life abounded with new ministries, new organizations, numerous activities:

Men's Brotherhood, church picnics out on the Bay, a Sunday School orchestra and the Ladies' Aid.

Soon they needed to expand the facilities.

They dug out a basement, added a stage to the hall. By mid-century the classrooms had grown too small. In '54 they erected a Sunday School wing with a hall for church suppers and gatherings, later a parking lot, and filled it full.

Conflict in the city 'tween races and generations affected the church as well as the nation-civil rights, blockbusting, anti-war Protests, war on poverty, many people distressed, and Salem suffering reverberations.

Community service became the central vision launching these and more with faithful ambition: a Pre-school for children, for seniors, Lunch Plus, rotating folk liturgies for worship use, but not without stress and division.

Affirmation and healing were God's work to be done, while building on all the outreach begun: food pantry and refugee sponsorships,

food pantry and refugee sponsorships, global work and urban church partnerships, through service making Christ known. Through the years of the last quarter century, for many of us vivid, living memory, an increased staff brought innovations.

We undertook a major renovation,

Prizing still healthy harmony.

In '49 we'll be two hundred years old.

What will these coming several decades hold?

When they gather for that anniversary,
what will they say of the likes of you and me?

Will they say we were faithful and bold?

Let's hope that for all that we hold dear, for all those things that we cherish herethe altar and painting, the tiles and stained glass, the strains of the organ, the marble and brass, liturgies, plays, our groups and dinners--

Let's Pray that for the gospel we could set it all aside, like our forebears long ago, whatever betide, give up our surroundings, the beautiful art, verbage and hymnals and make a new start-if love, faith and hope would abide.

It's God's Story here through the years that we trace.

We're a royal Priesthood, God's chosen race, and the needs of the world wear God's own face. A church of *living* stones is the *real* place.

Salem means the people in whom God dwells. It is, above all, God's tale we tell.

All shall be well, and all things shall be well, yes, all manner of things shall be well.

For we've been given grace upon grace. We celebrate grace upon grace.

One of the lasting impacts our MDiv class hopes to have left at LSTC is our Senior Gift: a stipend fund for students completing Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE), starting this summer. (Yes, this includes our very own Reverend Seminarian, Daniel Collins!) Our senior class, recognizing the critical role that Chaplains of all faith traditions play in the holistic care of patients and their families, has raised over \$7,000 in stipends for students serving as Chaplains in CPE programs! We know first-hand that the programs themselves can be very expensive, especially when you're working full-time, often without any pay or scholarship money. We hope that these stipends will help alleviate the financial burden of the CPE experience so that Chaplains like Daniel can live fully into their roles of accompanying people and exercising their ministerial gifts without having to worry as much about affording meals and housing. Our class is proud to have supported the work of Chaplain seminarians in this way and hopes that the fund will live on well past 2019!

As for Mathew and me, we have each been interviewing with congregations in central Illinois, (where we have been assigned for first call), at two separate congregations. As soon as we have more official information about call and ordination, we will be sure to share that with you. For now, we deeply covet your prayers as we move forward with this process.

Thank you for accompanying me through this incredible journey, dear Salemites. I feel so blessed to have such an incredibly supportive home congregation!

No dues, no admissions interviews, no hazing rituals!




CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP EVENTS

BOOK GROUP



The Book Group will end its season on June 10 with *The Sun Does Shine* by Anthony Ray Hinton. In 1985, Anthony Ray Hinton was arrested and charged with two counts of capital murder in Alabama. Stunned, confused, and only twenty-nine years old, Hinton knew that it was a case of mistaken identity and believed that the truth would prove his innocence and ultimately set him free.

But with no money and a different system of justice for a poor black man in the South, Hinton was sentenced to death by electrocution. He spent his first three years on Death Row at Holman State prison in agonizing silence—full of despair and anger toward all those who had sent an innocent man to his death. But as Hinton realized and accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive, but find a way to live on Death Row. For the next twenty-seven years he was a beacon—transforming not only his own spirit, but those of his fellow inmates, fifty-four of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. With the help of civil rights attorney and bestselling author of *Just Mercy*, Bryan Ste-

venson, Hinton won his release in 2015.

With a foreword by Stevenson, *The Sun Does Shine* is an extraordinary testament to the power of hope sustained through the darkest times. Destined to be a classic memoir of wrongful imprisonment and freedom won, Hinton's memoir tells his dramatic thirty-year journey and shows how you can take away a man's freedom, but you can't take away his imagination, humor, or joy.




