THANK YOU to all of those who came out and supported our fall production of *Nunsense*. The show was seen by nearly 300 people, and did earn a small profit, so we are able to tithe over \$100 back to Salem's general fund.

Have you noticed the stained glass that was recently added to Reformation Hall? We've had some questions about it, so thought we'd give you a little more insight to our group.

<u>WHO?</u> /WHEN? It all began in 1977, with an idea hatched in a Church Council meeting to pull the congregation out of the doldrums during that year without a pastor. President Don McBrien, keenly aware of Pat Burgemeister's theatrical experience and talents, asked her to gather folks to put on a show, specifically one involving people of all ages. Her first collaborators were her husband, Bill, and her dear friend Charlotte Douthat. In the early years Bill designed and built the sets using a college textbook as a guide. There was practically nothing about the productions Pat didn't talk over with Charlotte. Then, there was Charlotte's daughter, Lisa, a recent college grad gaily appearing in musical theater around Baltimore. While the first show was in rehearsal the new pastor (Ed Whetstone) was called. Ed starred in our second production, along with Charlotte, and even directed a show, soon afterward. These five are remembered as our founders.



Through the years more and more people were engaged in the enterprise. Looking back through our programs, the number of people involved with Salem Players numbers in the hundreds. When Pat moved to Florida, **Claire Graham** led our group until her death in 2012. At that time we realized that in order to sustain our existence, we needed to organize and become less of a monarchy. We now have a board of core members to carry on the planning and production of our shows. We created by-laws defining our commitment to Salem, and an updated logo incorporating Salem's bell tower was designed by Scott Yerkey, (replacing the original one designed by Jack Austin in 1978).

<u>WHAT?</u> Our first show was a royalty-free temperance play from the early 1900s, reset in an ice cream parlor with an ice cream addict as its main character. The cast ranged in age from 4 to 57, and featured

a can-can! In that new and exciting season, it stood out as a highlight and a huge success. There was clearly momentum for more.

By the 2<sup>nd</sup> show, the programs proudly announced "Presented by the Salem Players". Productions were far simpler in those early years: a much worn stage curtain, simple scenery, furniture from around the building, costumes invariably gathered from members' closets, the audience sitting on metal chairs. Until the renovation in 1997 there was no air conditioning and the only access to the hall was through the nave, up from the youth room or doors on Newburg Avenue.

The repertoire grew. Full scale musicals by Gilbert & Sullivan and Rogers & Hammerstein, classics like *Arsenic & Old Lace* and *the Philadelphia Story*, as well as some original content by local playwrights were produced.

Now it's 46 years and 60+ plays, multiple Strawberry Festivals and Variety Shows later. Productions have become increasingly outstanding and Salem Players' performances have come to match community theatre anywhere in the Baltimore area. Salem's Drama Camp, initiated and directed for years by Don Schwartz, rose from this mission, as well.

<u>WHY?</u> We are rooted in our Salem family, and our Christian beliefs. Without Salem, there would be no Salem Players. Early on, Pastor Ed drafted a Mission Statement describing our aspirations for Salem Players. It was adopted, and appears in each program. It remains our purpose and we hope it will continue for years to come.

Through the medium of drama, in service to the congregation and community, the Salem Players will endeavor to both entertain and explore the human condition in celebration and contemplation of God's grace. In its activities, Salem Players will use the benefits of common discipline and inter-generational fellowship as a channel for those whose artistic talent, varied skills, and good nature draws them to join in the creative challenge and redeeming joy of a theatrical production. All to the Glory of God!

We strive to provide fellowship and entertainment for Salem and the Catonsville community in two shows per year, along with support for cantatas, dramatic biblical readings, and other celebrations at Salem. During Covid, when live theater was impossible, we wrote and produced *The Ladies in Waiting of Christmas* for You-Tube distribution to members.

Beyond presenting excellent theater, Pat's vision for Salem Players endures. Salem Players tithes the profits from each play to Salem. We have upgraded the Reformation Hall stage lighting and sound systems which are available for use by other Salem activities and occasionally for outside fundraisers. During the hall's renovation, we had the stage floor professionally refinished. For the past several years we have also supported the Marketplace and the Drama Camp by providing a full scholarship to the camp in the silent auction.

**WHERE?** Of course, it's Salem, the church building, AND the congregation.

In addition to the inside March event, we will again host our outside event on:



## SYNOD MIDDLE SCHOOL EVENT – NOVEMBER 17<sup>TH</sup> – 19<sup>TH</sup>

Aiden Pfluger, Michael Moore, and Pastor Carolyn Lawrence attended the middle school Synod Event at Potomac Park Retreat and Conference Center, Falling Waters, WVA, over the weekend of November 17<sup>th</sup>. They joined with middle school youth from other congregations in the DE/MD Synod and had a wonderful, but busy retreat weekend.

The theme for the weekend was CREATE – created/creator/creating/creation. They discussed how we are created in God's image; wonderfully created by a God who knows us deeper than we know ourselves. The young people met in small group sessions throughout the weekend to discover "What does that mean to



them?; How can they better understand our Creator?" The youth also met in large group settings to share worship, music and games all centering around this theme. They completed the assembly of school kits for Lutheran World Relief as the service project. They experienced dorm life in a building which allowed groups to split genders among the rooms and still have a common area for devotionals and fellowship. The dorm style rooms were arranged with bunk beds, a private lavatory and shower facilities with a second sink and vanity in the main room with mirrors making it convenient for the youth all needing the mirror. There was a lot of fellowship time and some free time too as Aiden and Michael perfected their mini golf skills on the 9 hole course on the conference center grounds. All in all, it was a wonderful weekend experience for them and now they are looking forward to the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans in July 2024 where they will gather together with about 30,000 other youth across the country.
