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SALEM REMAINS COMMITTED TO SAFETY AS IT REOPENS FOR INDOOR WORSHIP

Although the gatherings are smaller due to COVID-19 restrictions, the atmosphere is still warm and welcoming at Salem's newly-reopened indoor worship. As of October 3, 2020, parishioners are now able to reunite for services inside on Saturdays and Sundays, with some necessary safety precautions in place amid the coronavirus pandemic:

- Indoor worship is limited to 40 attendees, so registration by 11:45 a.m. on the preceding Friday is required
- Face coverings are required and temperatures are taken in the vestibule
- After entering the sanctuary through one-way access, attendees make their way to socially distanced seating in the pwes
- For now, waves and peace signs replace hugs and handshakes
- There is no singing at this time, but splendid instrumental accompaniment still wafts through the church prior to during the slightly abbreviated service

Despite these adjustments, Salem retains the peace, love, and comfort it has always provided. Pastor Dave and Pastor Sarah continue to deliver their captivating sermons and worshippers are still elated to gather and hear the Word of God.

For those who prefer not to attend in person or are unable to do so, alternatives continue to be made available. Salem's exceptionally-produced virtual services are broadcast online every Sunday at 10 a.m. and can be viewed at any time via the website. In addition, recognizing that many members of the Salem community have not received Holy Communion since March, live online communion service is now offered via Zoom on the first Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m.

We are immensely grateful for all of the extraordinary efforts that Salem's pastors, staff, musicians, and volunteers continue to make during this unprecedented time.

Just a reminder that in-person worship is by RSVP. You must RSVP every week using the Sign-up Genius link that you received in the prior weekend's email "Worship and Announcements" or by calling the Salem Office before 11:45 a.m. on Friday. The limit is 40 and we have gotten very close to that number, we would be upset if you came and we didn't have room for you!

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY UPDATES

We began "Takeout Sunday School" in October and we have received a lot of positive feedback! Each month, we send home three (3) Bible stories with related activities for families to complete together based on the theme of the story (we are following the lectionary). At the end of the month, we will host a 30-minute zoom that families can join to discuss the lessons from the month, share some of the crafts and activities that they completed, or just meet for fellowship. We had our first zoom Sunday School session on Sunday, October 25th at 9:30 am.

We sent "Takeout Sunday School" bags to 31 families in October and have sent out the November lessons, with our zoom fellowship scheduled for 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, November 22nd. We even added a few families who have been watching our virtual worship services.

We do not know how long we will remain using this format, but for now it is an option that seems to be working for our families who had been regularly attending Sunday school. We hope to be able to meet in our rotation format again in the spring.

LIVE STREAMING UPDATE

With the success of the pre-recorded services on YouTube and Facebook, Salem intends to continue its on-line worship presence. A task group, consisting of Guy Davis, Joey Morgan, Steve Kopp, Lisa Yerkey, Jim Kempton, Paul Timmel, Pastor Dave, and Pastor Sarah, was formed to investigate equipping the Nave to eventually live stream the 11:00 service. Bids and proposals were obtained from three vendors. The proposal is being submitted to Church Council for approval. It will then go to a mail Congregation vote. Live streaming can then be expected early next year.

Live streaming will make the pastors' jobs easier by eliminating the Thursday pre-recording process and the production team's efforts easier without the post-recording editing. It is also anticipated that wedding and funerals may also be recorded and/or live streamed.

Concurrently, Faith Lutheran Church in Cockeysville, our on-line partner, is in a similar process of planning live streaming and independently chose the same vendor for the equipment.

FLOWER STEWARDS

door and should you chat briefly with the recipient, it should be done with appropriate social distancing. IN MEMORY OF LOUISE

She was not on the staff. Nor was she ordained. And she did not sit on a church committee, although she made daily contributions of time and talents to her church. With the sudden death of Louise Rau at the age of 82 on September 28, Salem lost a woman who freely gave of herself.

In some ways, Louise, a registered nurse, patterned her life after Jesus' friend Martha. Born in Hagerstown on November 15, 1937, she joined Salem in 1965, thus beginning more than a half-century of volunteerism. As Pastor Dave said, "Only she and Jesus know" the full extent of her contributions. That said, this is the little bit that we do know.

One of Louise's first assignments at Salem was to organize a church nursery, complete with 12 cribs for children of worshippers. Many parents of that day would later credit her with helping to potty train their little ones.

Then there are Louise's contributions to Salem's music program. Most notably, she offered her talents as an unpaid substitute organist. She prepared each Salem Choir member's Sunday folder, as well as helping to organize the organist's music. She arrived at church hours before services began to prepare for the choir, bringing in and making coffee, cutting up fruit for a pre-service refreshment, and providing a bit of candy, and then, afterwards, cleaning out coffee pots and mugs. Meanwhile, choir and acolyte robes (as well as other linens used in worship) were clean and pressed courtesy of, who else? Louise. Oh, and she played the handbells.

St. David's Choir got the royal Louise treatment as well, getting kindly guidance from their honorary Grandmom. Speaking of which, the Mabil girls were able to sing in the choir and take piano lessons, thanks to Louise. A nurturer by nature, she lifted up countless children in need of a gentle touch.

Pastor Dave pointed out at her memorial service (conducted in keeping with COVID-19 restrictions on October 10) that one of her major assignments was to clean up after him. We have it on good authority that she also kept him well stocked in candy (don't tell Nancy!). We also know that Louise's everyday chores extended beyond that, as she cleaned stains on the office carpet and tended to and watered indoor plants. She cleaned up the kitchen after various groups. And when Baltimore County sent representatives to inspect our kitchen, they were met at the door by Louise. During Lent, she helped set up for soup suppers.

In addition to all of this, Louise, a resident of Charlestown, showed up every day to the church office to assist with printing and mailing, copying and answering the phone. On Thursdays, she adjusted the thermostat in the Wittenberg Room for the Stitchcrafters, opened the closet door, and ran off copies of patterns, as well as meeting and greeting every stitcher, Salem member or not, with a cheery "hello." She was considered an "Honorary Stitchcrafter."

To be certain, Salem lost its "Martha," but we also lost our "Mary," as she sat at Jesus' feet and put her faith to work in life. But who knew? We also lost our "Christiana," her birth name. Cont'd...

We as a congregation join with her beloved husband Lowell and her extended family (she was the mother of four, grandmother of four, and great-grandmother of seven) in mourning her passing. As Salem remembers her with gratitude, we rejoice that a member of our family is now with her Lord. Who can replace her? We can only hope that the Lord will provide. God rest Louise's soul, a good and gracious servant.


YOUTH SUPPORT SEAFARERS

HISTORIC OLD SALEM NEWS AND TRIPS

Looking for new Board Members to join us in our preservation efforts of Old Salem Church and Cemetery. It is Salem's original worship site built in 1849 by our Lutheran ancestors. Board members will serve a two-year term beginning November 2020. The Board meets four times a year on the third Wednesday of February, May, August, and November with our special open house and programs on the first Sunday afternoon in June and the third Sunday afternoon in September. Pastor Dave and Pastor Sarah lead an All Saints Service at Old Salem the first Sunday afternoon in November. We host a Christmas Open House in December at Old Salem (both of which have been cancelled this year) and an annual Craft Fair and Flea Market the first Saturday in March as one of our major fundraisers. Throughout the year, we sponsor bus trips to theatres, restaurants, train rides and all kinds of interesting sites, again to help raise funds for the preservation efforts at Old Salem for the church and surrounding cemetery grounds. OLD SALEM - FORTY YEARS LATER

Forty years ago, in the summer of 1980, Salem members could look with pride on the completion of an extensive and historically accurate restoration of its original church home, the building we now call Old Salem. Constructed by the original immigrant families who came from Germany, the church offered its members the opportunity to experience Lutheran worship in their native language as well as the blessings of a loving Christian fellowship.

From these modest beginnings, Salem's membership expanded and in 50 years outgrew the little church on Ingleside Avenue. In the fall of 1903, they moved into their new home on Frederick Road. With a limited annual budget of \$300 for its care, the church Property Committee maintained the original structure and surrounding cemetery. Even with the assistance of several volunteers who gave many hours of time to its care, the little building would need additional attention.

By the mid 1970s, Salem was taking a serious look at how it would allocate its resources. The now seventy-year-old church and twenty-year-old education building were both in need of extensive maintenance. The 1970s were also a time when social issues were much on the minds of many Salem members who wanted to expanded the congregation's ministry in these areas. Some Salem members suggested that simply tearing down the old building would help with expenses.

Fortunately, Salem found the solution to this challenge in the creation of an independent organization, originally called Friends of Old Salem, to maintain the church and graveyard as a community historic site that could attract financial support outside the congregation. As part of that effort Old Salem was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places and was accepted. Its new historic status allowed Old Salem to be awarded a number of grants, including a generous one from the State of Maryland.



Leo Ritter, husband of a Salem member, played a key role in the project. A licensed architect, he drew up the

planning documents for the restoration and oversaw the progress of the firm that was chosen to perform the work, which began in 1976. Four years later, Old Salem was ready for its new role in the life of the congregation, which began at once. On Sunday, November 2, 1980, the 4^{th} and 5^{th} grade Sunday School class visited and experienced activities such as pumping the organ and learning about kerosene lighting and heat from a wood stove.

In the course of the restoration project, the independent group evolved into Historic Old Salem, Inc., approved by the congregation in October 1976. As it did from its beginning, Historic Old Salem, a tax-exempt organization, raises funds and maintains the building and cemetery. The organization schedules and presents several yearly events, including Founders Day in June and its All Saints Service in November, and coordinates other use of the building including weddings and concerts. And it is not unusual for historic tours of Catonsville to make a stop at the little church on Ingleside Avenue.

CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

September

Election of Church Council Members - President, Sharon Stanton, Vice-President, Sharon Schueler, Secretary - currently vacant, Treasurer - Thomas Vasold, Financial Secretary - Beth Massey Robin Schaefer will take minutes at the future Church Council meetings.

Approved the Worship Life's Recommendations regarding returning to Indoor Worship beginning the first Sunday in October.

October

- The Anti-Racism Task Force has requested \$9,000 to be included in the 2021 Salem Congregation Budget for two training sessions next year, 'Unconscious Bias Training' and 'De-escalation Training'.
- Pastor Dave reported that 33 people attended the first virtual Holy Communion service held on Wednesday, October 7.
- The Council approved the concept of paying part of Mary Miller's health insurance. This will be forwarded to the Finance Committee and incorporated into the 2021 budget after Mary provides exact figures.
- The Council worked on salary recommendations upon hearing the report of the Ad Hoc committee and will forward these to the Finance Committee for incorporation into the budget planning process.

NEWS FROM THE ANTI-RACISM TEAM

We are very thankful for the presence, energy, and creativity of so many participants during our first Anti-Racism Team meeting on October 1! We are deeply grateful to God for your faithful response to this call to help lead our community of faith on this journey.

We have had two well-attended viewings and discussion on the film **"Emmanuel**" on October 9, and the 16th.

Here's where we are headed as a team and a faith-based community:

We are subdividing into 2 groups to address the following topics:

- to address education on awareness of structural racism
- to address advocacy and action

Our next meeting as a large group is set for **Thursday**, **November 12 from 7-9 p.m.**

We have requested funding from Council for two trainings to be held in the new year (2021) on understanding systemic white privilege and de-escalation of racial tension. (see page 10, Council Highlights)

SOUL CARE IN TUMULTUOUS TIMES

Beloved reader, how is it with your soul?

Before you answer that, pay some attention to your body in this moment. Relax your shoulders. Soften your forehead. Unclench your jaw. Take a deep breath in. Hold it for a moment. Now let it out. So, beloved. How is it with your soul? What is burdening you these days? What is bringing you hope?

What feelings are most at the surface for you?

As I write this, I have just returned from a week of vacation – a week of relaxation, reading, outdoor activities, and watching The Great British Baking Show with my spouse and our dog. So, in many ways, my soul feels restored and rested.

Of course, as Lutherans, we know that our lives and faith are full of paradox. So as we face this chaotic election, rising COVID cases, and the coming of colder months, I can acknowledge that my soul also feels troubled and worried. Nonetheless, my recent time away is allowing me more energy and endurance to face the uncertainty of the days ahead.

I recognize that a week of vacation is a great privilege – one that my job with this caring Salem community graciously provides. And I recognize that not everyone enjoys this same privilege or will be able to simply check out for a week in the near future. Still, I want to encourage you to care for yourselves and your souls in whatever big and small ways you can in this season.

So in no particular order, here are some tips for self care and soul care that I hope you will find useful:

- Give yourself permission to drop or let some things go. We are living through the collective trauma of a pandemic. We are not supposed to be functioning at our "normal" capacity or pace. Allow yourself the grace to let the laundry sit unfolded, to not complete your to-do list, or to drop a commitment that is not vital. Don't be afraid to ask for help or delegate if you need help accomplishing this. You are more than your productivity, beloved child of God.
- Practice gratitude when you can. Consider writing in a journal, a note on your phone, or a blank word document something you are grateful for each day. There is much to lament and worry over, but there is also much to be grateful for from our families to our favorite pair of cozy socks to the fact that we live in a world where dogs exist.
- Take a moment to read and reflect on Psalm 146 either alone or with your family. What words or phrases jump out to you? What feels challenging in these words? What feels hopeful?
- Consider avoiding Facebook, Twitter, social media, or even your favorite news source for a specific amount of time perhaps an entire day, perhaps a weekend, perhaps an hour. The world will still be here when you return.
- If moving your body helps you to come back to yourself, take a short walk and remember how neat it is that the seasons have never once failed to change. If going outside feels like too much, search for "10 Minute Yoga" or "Easy 10 Minute Stretch" on YouTube.
- Spend some time in prayer. It doesn't have to be quiet and contemplative, although it can be. Sometimes prayer can be giving God a piece of your mind so that you don't give it to your neighbor. Sometimes prayer can be silent tears. Sometimes prayer can be sitting in stillness and just listening. Sometimes prayer can be creating art or tending to your plants.
- Turn on a song that always makes you want to move and dance it out, even for just 30 seconds. If you can bring someone else in on the dance party, even better.
- Take a nap. 5 minutes or 5 hours. You can always use the rest.

- Reach out to a trusted friend, a pastor, or family member just to talk. Remember that the Salem community has weekly fellowship and small groups online and you are always welcome. Your pastors are here for you as well, and we love to hear from you.

- Trace the sign of the cross on your forehead. Remember that you are a beloved child of God. This is, of course, not an exhaustive list of ways to care for yourself and your soul. But I hope it might provide some inspiration and a little bit of respite when you need it most. Ultimately, you know yourself and what helps to bring you peace and joy. So listen to your body. Relax those shoulders. Take a few minutes even when you don't have a few minutes to spare and spend them in prayer or gratitude or communion with God and neighbor. And remember that you are beloved child of God, and God desires your wholeness and rest and peace.
