ADULT FORUM

During January, Adult Forum will be using a Bible Study called *From Generation to Generation*. This study takes the stories of familiar Bible characters and explores their responses to God's call amid the unpredictability and challenges of life. Believing in God's steadfast love, these ancestors in the faith responded with trust in God's faithfulness. Their experiences show us what it means to live in the story that God keeps God's promises from generation to generation and remind us that we too can trust in God's promised future.

In the Gospel of John, Jesus provides a liberating example that can shape our understanding of how God acts toward God's people. Jesus calls the disciples together after a long day and takes on the role of a household servant, washing their dirty, dusty, smelly feet. In this humbling posture, Jesus demonstrates that God is not about power but, instead, servanthood. God puts the needs of people ahead of God's own status, prestige, and comfort. Instead of being served, God serves.

When Jesus washed the disciples' feet, he set aside the culturally expected role of the leader and took care of his followers, a self-denying action that was made more poignant in the events that followed. As extraordinary as it seems, it was simply consistent with God's actions toward people throughout time. Stories from scripture recount how God repeatedly put the needs of the people ahead of what was expected and demanded. God's benevolence and patience formed a people called to live with a purpose that drew the world closer to what God intended. Psalm 100:5 is just one of many times the faith community voiced these words:

For the Lord is good;

his steadfast love endures forever,

and his faithfulness to all generations.

Knowing that God's promise shown in steadfast love endures forever and that it is consistent across the generations gives a circle of safety to those who follow God - from Old Testament times to today and into the future. The liberation provided by this love and faithfulness allows us to step out trusting that missteps will not destroy us, that God's guidance will take us where God has called us to go. It allows us to build a different culture and community, one based on care and compassion.

This five Sunday study will help us

- Know that we are inheritors of God's promise to Abraham and Sarah, which is fulfilled in Jesus Christ.
- Appreciate the richness of this heritage as recorded in Old and New Testament stories and revealed in the lives of God's faithful yet imperfect servants from generation to generation.
- Respond to God's call in our lives and look to this heritage for inspiration and guidance.





STITCHCRAFTERS HELP NORTH AVENUE MISSION

What began as an eight-week challenge has resulted in an on-going project for the Salem Stitchcrafters. Beginning in October, the group focused its knitting and crocheting talents on making cold weather gear for the North Avenue Mission's "Free Market." Yarn was purchased using funds from a Thrivent "Action Grant" and a bounty of handcrafted items have been distributed, just as the weather turned cold. To date 91 hats, 74 scarves, and 14 pairs of mittens have been delivered, with more on the way as enthusiasm for the project has only grown.

The Stitchcrafters meet every **Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon** in Reformation Hall or by ZOOM, depending on health conditions in our community. The group supplies yarn and patterns, crochet hooks and knitting needles, as well as instruction and support.

The next meeting will be on **January 24** (note day change) to discuss *Katharina*: *Deliverance*, by Margaret Skea. *Katharina*: *Deliverance*, the first installment of the fictionalized story of Katharina von Bora, the wife of Martin Luther, focuses on her childhood and early adult years.

Katharina comes from a moderately well-to-do family from Saxony and is only five years old when her mother dies, leaving her and her brothers in the care of a father who is not up to the task. He quickly

remarries, and the new stepmother promptly packs the girl off to a convent at Brehna.

But the early decades of the 16th century are a time of social and religious upheaval in the German lands as the opposition to the corruption and worldliness of the Catholic Church gathers momentum under the leadership of fiery preacher Martin Luther. Centuries-old traditions come under fire, including the practice of shutting young women in convents even when they lack the vocation for the religious life. In time, reform ideas reach Katharina's convent as well and find fertile ground in the minds of several residents there.

After a daring escape, Katharina finds shelter in the house of famous painter Lucas Cranach and his wife Barbara in Wittenberg, a town that becomes the center of the Lutheran movement. One by one her friends, all former nuns, find husbands and settle into their new lives, but after a romantic disappointment it seems that Katharina will not be so lucky as to settle down in her own household. That is until she realizes that Luther, faced with growing attacks from all sides, may be in need of a partner and companion able and willing to share his burdens.



REFUGEE TASK FORCE HOPES TO SPONSOR AFGHAN FAMILY SOON

We are still awaiting word from Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service's local partner, Lutheran Social Services- National Capital Area. They are in the process of establishing a local office at Holy Apostles-St. Stephen Lutheran-Episcopal Church in Arbutus.

Sponsorship includes welcoming the family to the United States and to this community, finding local housing and filling the apartment with furniture, food and household goods, assisting the family with employment, medical and legal matters, school registrations, arranging transportation, and providing financial assistance. It is a major commitment across



their first year to help them achieve independence, often followed by a continuing friendship.

With the Church Council's approval we will be inviting the congregation's support as we seek furnishings, employment leads, funds, prayers and various assistance.

Refugee sponsorship has been a significant and meaningful aspect of the Lutheran Church in the US since the aftermath of World War II with the massive dislocations and chaos in Europe. It began primarily as assistance to fellow Lutherans; in the mid-forties one in nine Lutherans in Europe was a refugee. As a small child, I recall refugees speaking broken English at our dinner table. When I was eleven, my father was absent all winter working at a refugee camp for refugees fleeing the failure of the Hungarian Revolution. (Then on synod staff, he also chaired the board of Lutheran Refugee Services.) By the 1970s LRS began to extend its work to other refugee populations. Those efforts vastly expanded with the influx of refugees following the war in southeast Asia.

Since 1976 members of Salem have sponsored families from Vietnam, Kosovo, South Sudan and Syria. It is surely a most meaningful and memorable dynamic in our heritage and our faithfulness.

Once again we anticipate, as a shared act of faith and discipleship, welcoming the stranger, and once more welcoming our Lord in the faces and hopes of the least and lost.

Invite them to Salem. They can attend worship with you or maybe participate with you in one of our many service activities, like "God's Work, Our Hands", Marketplace, Stitchcrafters, Lazarus Caucus, etc.

Pray with them and for them.

There are a lot of things we can do on our own but being part of a congregation of Jesus' disciples opens up so many more opportunities to do God's work. I've been amazed, overjoyed, and overall just feeling very blessed to be a part of this Salem community. Hearing, during my first visit, that there was a Refugee Committee meeting after the service sparked my interest and started me on this Blessed Journey . God certainly lead me here and has given me a feeling of purpose I haven't ever felt.
