GRADUATING IN 2022?

YOU MIGHT BE ELIGIBLE FOR A SALEM SCHOLARSHIP!

Salem's high school seniors--and their families--have many concerns about post-high school plans at the beginning of the new year, not the least of which is the cost of higher education. Do keep in mind the ministry of Salem's Scholarship program, which for over 20 years has assisted Salem members as they undertake the next step in their academic preparation. Stipends of up to \$750 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill but they can make an important difference.

Salem scholarships recognize accomplishment in any of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need. They also take into account the differing ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may be the best fit for

students.

The deadline for 2022 applications is **April 15**. Salem's high school seniors will receive a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program but it's not too early to learn about the program. If you want to learn more, a <u>brochure and application form</u> are available from the church office. Students with a current Salem Scholarship may find the renewal form <u>on Salem's website</u>.

EARTH DAY, APRIL 24

Guardians of Eden (GOE) is gearing up to celebrate Earth Day in April. A special speaker will be delivering the sermon on April 24. The showcase will focus on the beautiful earth and its environment. We will host Dr. Chuck McClurg of the University of Maryland and Tim Jennings of Longwood Gardens at Adult Forum. Sunday School students will also participate outdoors. Children should be dressed for working outside, weather permitting. GOE already has some shovels, gloves and trowels for planting and for weeding. The focus will be on our earth given to us by God!!



HAPPENINGS IN ADULT FORUM

During March, Adult Forum studied the Proto-Gospel of James and started a two-week study of the Infancy Gospel of Thomas with the help of Bart Ehrman's *Lost Scriptures* book. The Proto-Gospel of James looks at the life of Mary from her birth to shortly after Jesus' birth; this book is valued by the Catholic Church, as it is one of the few sources of the immaculate conception of Mary. The book spends little time talking about Jesus, which may be why it was excluded from the New Testament. As for the Infancy Gospel of Thomas, this book looks at the childhood of Jesus.

In April, we will finish up the study of the Infancy Gospel of Thomas followed by a look at Joseph in Egypt as viewed through archaeological discoveries using the Great Courses series of videos on Palm Sunday. On April 24, the Guardians of Eden have arranged for speakers to talk at the Adult Forum as part of Salem's Earth Celebration. (See article above.)

UPDATE FROM THE REFUGEE TASK FORCE ~AN APPEAL FOR YOUR FINANCIAL SUPPORT~

MEET THE DURRANI FAMILY

Masooma and her children, Rohail, 16, Saba, 14, and Lima, 12, arrived at their new home in Catonsville on March 14. They were met by about 15 members of the task force along with some of their teenagers. The family has made good progress settling in to their new home. Assisted by members of the task force, they've made two trips to the local Halal grocery stores, shopped for needed personal items, had their internet and cable installed, made a shopping trip to purchase rugs for their apartment, and have been registered to attend school. Rohail and Saba will be attending Lansdown High School and Lima, Lansdowne Middle School, where they will all have opportunity to improve their English skills.

We are learning more of their story. Twice widowed, Masooma's 21 year old son from her first marriage lived with them at their home in Kandahar. But he is still in Afghanistan, as they were separated on the day they, and many thousands, were all trying to get to planes in the Kabul airport. They all miss him very

among those refugees who have fled to Poland.



much, talk to him often, and are very much hoping that he will eventually be able to join them here. Her second husband, these children's father, died in a drowning accident when they were all under five years old. Masooma has a brother who lives in Windsor Mill and a sister who lives in Baltimore. They've had several visits with her brother and his family.

Though they do not yet have a good picture of the wider community of congregation and friends who have supported them, they are deeply grateful for the help they have received and the people they've met. There are tentative plans for a mid-May welcome event, hosted by our parish youth, at which the whole congregation will have an opportunity to meet them.

In the meantime, *your financial support is needed and much welcome*. Contributions may be made to the Refugee Fund; use a Pew Envelope or mail to the church office, clearly marking your gift "Refugee Fund." If you would like to be involved more personally, speak to any of us. We will need transportation to medical and dental appointments and folks to visit with them and help them improve their English. Fresh in all of our minds now are the travails of the refugees from Ukraine, with constant coverage of the story before us. And we're grateful for the skilled and compassionate work of Lutheran World Relief now

The chaotic, frantic departure of refugees fleeing Kabul was nearly a year ago, and the event and its coverage far more brief, but just as difficult and hope-filled. For the Durranis, that journey ended in Catonsville. We give thanks for the opportunity to help them embark on a new life among us.

UPCOMING SALEM MUSIC OFFERINGS

FREE MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

Salem has multiple pieces of medical equipment in our attic. It is available <u>FOR FREE</u> to Salem members, and to <u>any others</u> who have a need.

SALEM SPECIAL FUNDS

The General Fund pays for all the ongoing expenses - salaries, utilities and the like. The regular offerings support the General Fund. Salem has several special funds that are not supported directly from the budget. Monies directed to these funds do not come from General Fund contributions.

RSVP (Renew Sustain Venture Proclaim) – This fund was created after the major renovation in 1997 to fund future capital projects, ensure ongoing maintenance of the property, and to also help with other important ministries such as calling an Associate Pastor in 2007 and a Vicar in 2017-18. There is a monthly offering envelope to encourage support of this fund.

Memorial Fund – This fund receives gifts from individuals remembering a loved one or honoring a living person. Many families request donations to this fund in lieu of flowers. These funds have been used to buy paraments, worship accoutrements, a new piano, musical instruments, and even computer equipment related to enhancing our worship life. Paul Krabitz oversees the Memorial Fund. Expenditures of more than \$750 are approved by the Church Council.

Bequest Fund – Gifts from estates are the source of this fund. It is not a restricted endowment but may be used by the congregation for any purpose. It was last used to help pay for the new roof and the masonry repointing in 2009. The fund also serves as a source of monies that could be used in event of an emergency.

Mission Fund – Created in 2011, this fund is intended to be used for mission projects. Initially funded from a surplus during the year after Pastor Whetstone retired and before Salem hired a new Associate Pastor in 2011, the fund was used to help launch Church on the Square. From 2013 through 2015, we donated \$20,000 a year to this new start. The Mission Fund underwrote the Three Kings Service which was an outreach event for our Hispanic neighbors in 2019 and in July of 2019, contributed \$8,000 to help the Mountain of God purchase a used van for shuttling folks to worship. In March of 2022, the Church Council authorized gifts to the Epileptic Outreach Project in the Congo sponsored by the Mountain of God Lutheran Church in Catonsville.

2nd **Coat Fund** – This fund came into existence as the result of a sermon Pastor Whetstone preached in the fall of 2006. The fund is used to help members of the Salem congregation in times of financial duress. It often helps to pay for medical expenses. When the fund falls below \$1,000, an appeal is made to the congregation to help replenish the fund.

RECYCLE YOUR OLD CELL PHONES

Did you get a new phone recently? Do you have an old cell phone that you no longer use? Please consider recycling it and help save the animals. Coltan, an ore that provides essential components for cell phones and other electronics, is primarily mined in critical habitats for gorillas and chimpanzees. By recycling old cell phones, we can reduce the need for mining in these areas where gorillas and chimpanzees live. It will help to protect critical habitats as well as keep toxic chemicals out of our landfills. Drop off you old cell phone in the box in the entrance foyer of the Catonsville Senior Center, 501 North Rolling Road, 21228, and a volunteer will take care of the rest. We'll start a service project on Sunday, April 3, making *Birthday Boxes* and ask for the congregation's support of this project by donating the items listed below. These items can be placed in the containers in the Narthex near the elevator as well as brought to Bethany Hall during the Sunday school hour (9:30-10:30 a.m.).

13 x 9 disposable pans with see-through plastic lids

1 box of cake mix (any flavor) 1 can of either Sprite or Coke (or a six pack)

1 can of icing (any flavor) 1 box of birthday candles

Additional items - small container of sprinkles/jimmies

These *Birthday Boxes*, when filled, will be taken to CEA (Catonsville Emergency Association) for distribution to families with children who perhaps cannot afford the ingredients to make their child/children a birthday cake. The cake can be made by simply adding the soda to the cake mix eliminating the egg and oil used in traditional mixing of the cake batter. The project extends our Lenten theme of "Acts of Kindness" to the end of the Sunday school season in June. *Donations will be accepted through Sunday, May 29.*

SALEM PARKING LOT CLOSURE

You will find the Frederick Road entrance to Salem's parking lot closed during the week. It will be open before worship on Saturday afternoon and remain open until after worship on Sunday afternoon. The purpose of the closure during the week is to prevent unwanted pass-throughs or drive-throughs. Unfortunately, a goodly number of drivers have been using our parking lot as a road and racing through our lot to cut off the corner at Newburg and Frederick Road. It is a safety issue that we are addressing by closing this entrance. For many years this entrance was open only on Sunday morning but an agreement with the bank in the 1990s opened up the entrance to provide their customers easier access to the bank and the ATM. Now that the Truist branch has permanently closed the Property Committee has moved to close the entrance during the week.

The group is open to all readers interested in meeting and discussing books. Books discussed range from novels, nonfiction, biographies, short stories, or poetry. The next meeting will be on **April 11** to discuss *How the Word Is Passed* by Clint Smith. Beginning in his hometown of New Orleans, Clint Smith leads the reader on an unforgettable tour of monuments and landmarks - those that are honest about the past and those that are not - that offer an intergenerational story of how slavery has been central in shaping our nation's collective history and ourselves.

It is the story of the Monticello Plantation in Virginia, the estate where Thomas Jefferson wrote letters espousing the urgent need for liberty while enslaving more than four hundred people. It is the story of the Whitney Plantation, a former plantation devoted to preserving the experience of the enslaved people whose lives and work sustained it. It is the story of Angola, a former plantation in Louisiana, turned maximum-security prison, that is filled with Black men who work across the 18,000 acre land for virtually no pay. And it is the story of Blandford Cemetery, the final resting place of tens of thousands of Confederate soldiers.

A deeply researched and transporting exploration of the legacy of slavery and its imprint on centuries of American history, *How the Word Is Passed* illustrates how some of our country's most essential stories are hidden in plain view - whether in places we might drive by on our way to work, holidays such as Juneteenth, or entire neighborhoods like downtown Manhattan, where the brutal history of the trade in enslaved men, women, and children has been deeply imprinted.

Informed by scholarship and brought to life by the story of people living today, Smith's debut work of nonfiction is a landmark of reflection and insight that offers a new understanding of the hopeful role that memory and history can play in making sense of our country and how it has come to be resourceful.

On March 6, the youth group and Sunday school children assembled the kits containing a bar of soap, an adult size toothbrush, a pair of metal nail clippers, and a comb, all rolled up and secured within a bath towel. They put together 65 kits. The kits were then delivered to the BSC Warehouse in New Windsor, Maryland for distribution through Lutheran World Relief. Unfortunately, when the kits were delivered to the warehouse, the representative there was unable to specifically state where they would end up, but we were assured that there was definitely a great need for them and were much appreciated. (Note: since that time, there has been notification that the kits would head to Ukraine where they are greatly needed.)

On Saturday, March 5, and Sunday, March 6, the youth group led our worship services and did a wonderful job in so doing. "Our thanks to Miss Anita, Miss Sara, and Pastor Sarah for guiding us in the planning sessions to prepare the worship services." As this year's Lutheran Youth Organization's theme for the year is "Life at the Crossroads," the youth incorporated that theme into the services by sharing their own interpretation of its meaning. VIRTUAL WORSHIP

Who could imagine that when that last person left the sanctuary on Sunday, March 8, 2020, our way of worshiping together would never again be the same? But blessed with resources and talents, not to mention faith and determination, Salem has been able to carry on in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic. And now, two years later, virtual worship is an option that is here to stay.

With little warning of a disease that we were just learning about, Pr. Sarah and Pr. Micah recorded a "sofa worship" on March 15. By the following week, a pre-recorded service was online, with Pr. Dave and Pr. Sarah, as well as Pr. Micah of Faith Lutheran, presenting the elements of worship. Mary Miller played the piano, and Pr. Sarah and Pr. Micah sang hymns.

Soon thereafter came expansions in music (with Sid Meier and Greg Lauer of Faith) and technical improvements (two cameras). In the following weeks, members of both congregations read the lectionary and gave children's messages, all recorded from home. A major innovation was the Virtual Choir. With an accompaniment recorded by the church musicians (Mary, Sid, and Greg), choir members recorded their parts of anthems at home. Sid combined the individual tracks and produced a virtual choir (think "The Brady Bunch").

Although the weekly service viewed online was only an hour long, it was the result of an arduous weeklong process. Monday morning planning sessions included the pastors, the production team (Joey Morgan, Robin Schaefer, Guy Davis), and the church musicians. There were plenty of behind-the-scenes tasks as well; Robin, for instance, worked to insure streaming rights to music.

Recording took place at either Salem or Faith (depending on which pastor was delivering the sermon) on Thursdays. Joey compiled the video clips on Fridays, and, on Saturdays, Guy reviewed and uploaded the recorded worship to Salem's YouTube and Facebook channels. The videos were available for viewing on Sunday; initial online attendance averaged 240 a week.

With warmer weather beginning in late spring of 2020, outdoor in-person worship services were conducted by Pr. Dave and Pr. Sarah, even as the pre-recorded virtual option continued to be offered. As a result online attendance halved to 120 but once again rebounded to 180 when winter weather forced the cessation of outdoor worship. Meanwhile Zoom Wednesday fellowship with the pastors and small-group Tuesday and Thursday fellowships provided a way for members of the congregation to stay in touch. After a year's absence, communion was introduced once a month on Wednesday evenings.

All the while, according to Guy, three things were becoming obvious: online worship was here to stay and was a source of evangelism, pre-recorded worship required a great deal of time and effort, and in-person worship would eventually return, making live-streaming necessary. Bids were received from three audio-visual companies and Armbruster AV was chosen. The Church Council, led by President Sharon Stanton, and the congregation subsequently voted to approve the undertaking. Independently and concurrently, the Faith congregation, our pandemic partners, made the same decision. Live-streaming within each congregation was a reality by May 2021.

In the ensuing months, live-streaming offerings extended beyond 11 a.m. Sunday worship to include Saturday evening contemporary worship, as well as weddings and funerals, Wednesday Lenten and special services. 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


