RETURN OF IN-PERSON HOLY WEEK SERVICES

For the first time since 2019, Salem welcomed unlimited worshipers to the Nave to celebrate Holy Week culminating with Easter. And a festive celebration it was, with ten services from Palm Saturday/Sunday to Easter!

It all began with Palm Saturday/Sunday when the Luke Passion Gospel was read interspersed with music from the Salem Saturday Singers, Salem Brass, and Salem Choir with a solo by Anita Lane.

Maundy Thursday began the Easter Triduum (period of three days of prayer) with the celebration of the Last Supper where Azilqua Pukuma, Lila Pushman, and William Spencer received their first communion at the evening service. The music was provided by the Salem Ringers and Salem Choir with a solo by Paul Timmel. At the end, the altar was stripped before the congregation departed in silence.

Good Friday, Tenebrae, the Office of Shadows, consisted of readings from Luke 22 and 23 alternating with hymns as candles were extinguished. The Salem Choir led the hymns with Nancy Asendorf providing the anthem.

The Easter Vigil began outside around an open fire for the Service of Light reminding us of Peter, sitting around a fire, betraying Jesus . After the Christ Candle was lit, Ray Toy lead us into the Nave to hear the narrative of God's mighty deeds. The Service of Readings follows with readings and a Psalm or canticle and prayer and is followed by Remembrance of our Baptism. The Vigil concluded with the first service of Easter and communion. The music was provided by Dan and Emily D'Avella, Sid Meier, Paul Bell, Jeff Rasmussen and Liz Richardson.

Easter Sunday morning began with the Salem Brass playing "Crown Him with Many Crowns" and the Salem Choir processing to "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today." The full liturgical service that has been missing from Salem's in-person worship returned! Alleluia! The Lord is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! The service ended with the traditional "Hallelujah" from Handel's Messiah.

REFUGEE TASK FORCE UPDATE

THE DURRANI FAMILY, NEW REFUGEES FROM AFGHANISTAN

The teens, Rohail, Saba, and Lima have been in school now for over a month. They're much engaged in these educational challenges and enjoying the social opportunities school brings. We are considering options to help Masooma with her English until ESOL classes begin at CCBC in July. We will also assist in exploring employment possibilities. Medical and dental appointments will now appear on their schedule.

Throughout April they observed the holy month of Ramadan, engaged in reading through the Quran, and fasting from dawn till dark.

Following the furnishing of their apartment, we are fully engaged in a second stage of support, and dealing with a variety of logistics. We may have tasks or needs from time to time to present to the congregation.

We will continue, yet for a time, to need your financial support as they build toward independence across the coming year. Please use a pew envelope to make your contribution, or just mail it to the church office, making your check out to Salem, and clearly marking your gift for the Refugee Fund.

Please keep this family in your prayers, along with the many thousands of other Afghan refugees, the several millions of refugees fleeing the war in Ukraine, and the tens of millions of refugees the world

over. One of the gifts of knowing Masooma, Rohail, Saba, and Lima is this reality: we discover again that the overwhelming mass of so many millions of refugees is composed of individual faces and hungers, hurts and hopes, just like the family before us. As Jesus' disciples obeying his command to love the stranger, and as citizens of this nation with its immigrant heritage and legacy of welcome, we are informed and encouraged in our service, our advocacy and our prayers.

ANNUAL MEETING MAY 15

Our Annual Meeting is scheduled for **May 15** after the 11 a.m. worship service. We will begin with a potluck luncheon in Bethany Hall where we will greet our newest disciples. Included in this meeting will be the second vote (required by our Constitution) to change our Constitution to allow the Congregational Council to approve projects using a percentage of the budget, rather than the current method of a certain dollar value. This is a wonderful opportunity to join together to celebrate our congregational life and mission as we look forward to the rest of the year. Please look out for a sign up for the luncheon in the Narthex.

NEWS FROM THE ANTI-RACISM TEAM

This group has been meeting monthly for two years. During that time we have spent time learning about how the institution of slavery has influenced American culture. We have followed podcasts, watched videos, and read books to help us understand this issue and the residual racism that affects life today. We have worked with the Synod to expand understanding and encourage cooperation. We also worked with Pastor Lee Hudson from the Delaware-Maryland Synod to encourage the passing of legislation at the state level during last year's legislative session.

Because of our return to more normal church activities our meeting schedule will change to reduce potential conflicts of interest. Beginning in **May**, our meeting time will change to the **second Wednesday** of the month at **7 p.m.** We continue to meet primarily on Zoom.

In the fall, we are planning to hold our training on conflict de-escalation which has been delayed because of Covid-19. We feel this training should be done in person. This important training will be held in the early fall. If you are interested in joining this group or participating in the training, contact Pastor Sarah.

SALEM PARKING LOT CLOSURE

You'll find the Frederick Road entrance to Salem's parking lot closed during the week. It will be open before worship on Saturday afternoon and remain open until after worship on Sunday afternoon. The purpose of the closure during the week is to prevent unwanted pass-throughs or drive-throughs. Unfortunately a goodly number of drivers have been using our parking lot as a road and racing through our lot to cut off the corner at Newburg and Frederick Road. It is a safety issue that we are addressing by closing this entrance. For many years this entrance was open only on Sunday morning but an agreement with the bank in the 1990s opened up the entrance to provide their customers easier access to the bank and the ATM. Now that the BB&T branch has permanently closed the Property Committee has moved to close the entrance during the week.

SCHEDULING YOUR EVENT AT SALEM

As more organizations and Salem groups and committees are meeting in person, we are finding that some groups are not telling us of their plans. We have a large building and although sometimes it seems infinite space, that is not really so. Some spaces, the Sanctuary and Reformation Hall for example, are really one large room with a "divider." If there is a singing group on one side and a study group on the other, neither gets much done. We have had to stop accepting new AA/NA groups because of the crowded calendar of recurring meetings, for example. You **MUST** check with the church office to get on the calendar before planning your event, meeting, rehearsal, etc., or even just thinking about changing rooms! Thank you for your cooperation!

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Under the guidance and instructions from Sharon Schueler, a member of the Guardians of Eden Committee, on Sunday, April 24 approximately 15 children came to celebrate Mother Earth and God's wonderful gift to us of our planet and how to care for it. The children worked hard on removing a large section of the English Ivy attached to the parking lot fence, planted some flowers, and mulched areas on the slope as well as along the sidewalk entrance. Sharon shared with the children how to care for their



own gardens and lots of info about the plants here in Salem's gardens. Thank you Sharon and to Earl Ruley who worked with the children pulling English Ivy off the fence.





We want to thank the Salem congregation for their overly

generous support of our current Sunday school service project which began the beginning of April. The Birthday Boxes, containing the following items:

13" x 9" disposable pans with see-through plastic lids

- 1 box of cake mix (any flavor) 1 12 oz. can of Coke or Sprite
- 1 can of icing (any flavor)

1 box of birthday candles

Additional items - small container of sprinkles/jimmies

When assembled, these will be taken to the Catonsville Emergency Assistance to be distributed to families with children who perhaps cannot afford the ingredients to make their child/children a birthday cake. The cake is made by simply adding the soda to the cake mix eliminating the egg and oil used in traditional mixing of the cake batter.

The project extends our Lenten theme of "Acts of Kindness." We will continue to collect items through the middle of May. These items can be placed in the large box in the Narthex by the elevator. Again, many thanks to everyone who has so generously supported our project so far.

ADULT FORUM

In April, Adult Forum looked at the Infancy Gospel of Thomas and also had a presentation by Chuck McClure and Tim Jennings on garden and water plants that was enjoyed by many.




SALEM BOOK GROUP WILL DISCUSS HOW THE WORD IS PASSED

In April, there was an active discussion on *How the Word Is Passed* by Clint Smith. On **May 9**, the group will discuss *Ordinary Grace* by William Kent Krueger. *"That was it. That was all of it. A grace so ordinary there was no reason at all to remember it. Yet I have never across the forty years since it was spoken forgotten a single word."*

New Bremen, Minnesota, 1961. The Twins were playing their debut season, ice-cold root beers were selling out at the soda counter of Halderson's Drugstore, and *Hot Stuff* comic books were a mainstay on every barbershop magazine rack. It was a time of innocence and hope for a country with a new, young president. But for thirteen-year -old Frank Drum it was a grim summer in which death visited frequently and assumed many forms.

Frank begins the season preoccupied with the concerns of any teenage boy, but when tragedy unexpectedly strikes his family which includes his Methodist minister father; his passionate, artistic mother; Juilliard-bound older sister; and wise-beyond-his-years kid brother - he finds himself thrust into an adult world full of secrets, lies, adultery, and betrayal, suddenly called upon to demonstrate a maturity and gumption beyond his years.



Told from Frank's perspective forty years after that fateful summer, *Ordinary Grace* is a brilliantly moving account of a boy standing at the door of his young manhood, trying to understand a world that seems to be falling apart around him. It is an unforgettable novel about discovering the terrible price of wisdom and the enduring grace of God.

The book season will close on June 13 with *The Other Madisons* by Bettye Kearse.

"Bully for you, Teddy!" based on Teddy Roosevelt's life from childhood to just as he learns he has become President. 

I want to thank you and the Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church congregation for your generous donation of \$500.00 for Gilchrist's partner, Nkoaranga Lutheran Hospital Palliative Care Program in Tanzania. On behalf of Gilchrist, I would like to express our gratitude.

Nkoaranga's hospice program serves more than 1,800 patients with a small staff of five people, as well as about 11 volunteers. A large number of residents are HIV-positive, and 1,300,000 children have been orphaned as a result of the HIV/AIDS epidemic.

Through monies raised to date, together Gilchrist and Nkoaranga have been able to assist with inpatient care for the management of patients' symptoms at end of life, fund scholarships for children diagnosed with or impacted by HIV, provide emergency housing repairs, establish support groups for adults and children with HIV, supply goats and chickens to help families become more self-sufficient, and so much more.


