ADULT FORUM – DECEMBER

This Advent, as we prepare our hearts for the coming of the Christ child, Pastor Carolyn invites you to a four week series of contemplation and discussion of the Christian mystical tradition. If you are Wondering—"What is a mystic?" or "We have a tradition of mystics?" or "I've wondered about meditation, but is that Christian?" or "What does any of this have to do with Advent?"—good news! This forum is perfect for you!

Each Sunday, we will be learning about a mystic and their contribution to Christian thought in light of each week's Advent theme. Half of our time will be spent in discussion, and the other half will be dedicated to a prayer practice inspired by the mystic of the week.

Week One: **November 27**, A Living Hope with Mechthild of Magdeburg—Prayer Practice: The Thousand Names of Jesus.

We will be introduced to Christian mystical theology and its history within the Christian tradition. Our first mystic will come from the Rhineland tradition and was the first woman to write in vernacular German. We will read excerpts of Mechthild's love poetry to God. Our prayer practice comes from Anthony de Mello. Father de Mello is an Indian Jesuit priest who incorporates his Eastern spirituality with his Catholic prayer practices. We will be using a meditation from his meditation guide *Sadhana*. As our first week of Advent's theme is Hope, we will wonder together our hopes both as an individual and as a part of Salem.

Week Two: **December 4**, A Peace that Passes Understanding with Julian of Norwich—Prayer Practice: Lectio Divina

We will discuss Julian of Norwich, an English mystic with her startling yet beautiful visions of Jesus' love poured out on the Cross. With Julian, we examine the redemptive work of love on the Cross in a new light. Our prayer practice will be the ancient way of encountering holy texts called lectio divina. As our second week of Advent is Peace, we will ponder what Christ's peace means in a world that is so often fraught with conflict and violence.

Week Three: **December 11**, A Joy-Bearing Grief with St. Symeon the New Theologian—Prayer Practice: The Jesus Prayer

For week three, we turn to our Eastern Orthodox siblings in Christ as we learn about St. Symeon the New Theologian. We will discuss the role of experience in our faith and how we come to understand the Divine. Our prayer practice will come from a tradition partially inspired by St. Symeon that is still deeply influential in the Orthodox church today: the Jesus Prayer. As our third week of Advent is Joy, we will delve into St. Symeon's curious theology of weeping and the role of joy in repenting from sins.

Week Four: **December 18**, A Mother's Love with Julian of Norwich and Meister Eckhart—Prayer Practice: Centering Prayer

As Advent closes, we return to Julian of Norwich and reflect on her vision of Jesus as our Mother. With Meister Eckhart, a sometimes scandalous Dominican preacher, we will ponder what the Christmas season means for us the rest of the year, and how we might keep the Christ child's birth within our souls. We will close with Centering Prayer, a recent prayer movement in Christianity with roots in medieval mystical writing. For our final Advent theme of Love, we will rejoice in God's motherly love and seek that Divine Love that is the root of our being.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Sunday, November 20th – The children learned about Advent and waiting for the birth of Jesus. The children participated in three exciting activities. They made and decorated their Advent wreath, they made a candle and in honor of Thanksgiving, they each made a thankful pumpkin.

Sunday, December 4th and **Sunday, December 11**th – Sunday School Christmas Pageant rehearsal and crafts **Sunday, December 18**th – Sunday School Christmas Pageant - This year the Sunday school students will participate in a simple pageant during the Sunday school hour beginning at 9:30 am on December 18th. Everyone, even if you do not have Sunday school age children, are invited to gather with us in Reformation Hall and enjoy the Christmas story as told by the children. We will not be doing a formal pageant at the 5 pm Christmas Eve Worship Service this year. However, Pastor Carolyn is planning a special service for that evening.

Please note: There will be no Sunday school classes on Christmas Day. One worship service will be held at 10 am. Please enjoy the holiday together with your family and friends.

And then again on New Year's Day – January 1st, 2023 – No Sunday school class.

We'll look forward to seeing everyone on Sunday, January 8th at 9:30 am in Bethany Hall.

CHRISTMAS OR XMAS?

I first wrote this in 1996 for a church newsletter, and reposted it in later church newsletters. A couple years ago I posted it on Facebook, and many shared it - and they are posting it again, so I thought I would, too.

There are often complaints about the word "Xmas." "They've taken Christ out of Christmas," decry some.

Christ may have been replaced by commercialism in the celebration of this Festival season, but that isn't where the "X" comes from.

The word "Christ" in Greek looks like this: $XPI\Sigma TO\Sigma$ (pronounced "christos"). The first letter is an "X," but it isn't an "ex" as in our alphabet, but a "chi" (rhymes with "sky") in the Greek alphabet. This letter has a "ch" sound – like in the word "Christ."

While the second letter looks like a P (pee), in Greek it is a Rho and sounds like the English "R".

The "chi rho" is common Christian symbol that uses the first two letters from $XPI\Sigma TO\Sigma$. Because of the shape of the letters, the symbol is often mistaken for a "PX". A chi-rho symbol is one of the oldest

Christian symbols. There's probably one in your congregation.

Spelling the holiday "Xmas" doesn't necessarily take Christ out of the holiday; neither does spelling the word "Christmas" put Christ into the holiday.
