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GUARDIANS OF EDEN NEWS

April marked the celebration of Earth Day. GOE had a showcase which displayed titles of books related to the care of our earth and its creatures. We are continuing to build a lending library with books and magazines in the upstairs UPPER ROOM. Titles include *Animals in Danger* (children), Happy Earth Day! (children) Nature Conservancy magazines, and EOS Science News. If interested, please sign out the item that you wish to read, with your name and date.

We are also planning a trip in the fall, possibly in October to Hart-Miller Island. Hart-Miller Island is comprised of over 1,100 acres and includes 5 miles of trails as well as camping sites. It is an important habitat for wildlife.

We would leave the church around 8 a.m. People who plan to go would be boarding a 20-foot boat, with an indoor cabin. Lunch should be packed and the return time to church would be around 1:30 or 2:00 in the afternoon. ADULT FORUM

Coming up this fall in Adult Forum is a study of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer was a German born Lutheran pastor who spoke out during WWII against Adolf Hitler and Nazism. Bonhoeffer has a biography that reads like a WWII novel or Hollywood movie. There are two titles of books written about him 'Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy', and 'The Faithful Spy: Dietrich Bonhoeffer and the Plot to Kill Hitler'. From Wikipedia: "His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world have become widely influential; his 1937 book The Cost of Discipleship is described as a modern classic." Apart from his theological writings, Bonhoeffer was known for his staunch resistance to the Nazi dictatorship, including vocal opposition to Adolf Hitler's euthanasia program and genocidal persecution of the Jews." Mar-Lu-Ridge Camp and Conference Center has launched a capital campaign to raise \$2M to make major improvements on the campus. Chief among those is \$1M to renovate the Conference Center, the major expense being the installation of an elevator. They plan to build a pavilion in Area 3 and to safeguard the log buildings that are showing insect infestation as well as other projects. The chief aim is to make the Camp and Conference Center accessible to folks with disabilities. Director Sarah Lefler said they have turned away about 6 groups in the last two years because the Ridge was unable to accommodate folks with ambulatory challenges. They are determined to change that and this campaign will make great strides to that end.

I was a camper there in the 70s and 80s, and both my kids have been going to MLR since they were about 6 years old. My wife Lindsay has volunteered as the medical director for several years now. If you have ever been there, you know what a special place it is to experience the presence of the divine while surrounded by nature.

HALLIE SHEPARD NAMED A CATONSVILLE-ARBUTUS TIMES

FEMALE ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

Salem is very familiar with Hallie Shepard from the Youth Services of a few years ago, from her starring role as Annie in Salem Players' production of Annie, from leading the on-line Easter Vigil service during COVID shutdown in 2021, and from winning a Salem Scholarship award this year. But wait, there's more! She has also been a star athlete for Catonsville High School in cross country and indoor and outdoor track. Hallie had several victories and top-10 finishes during her first two seasons, but it was her determination and drive following a serious car accident in August 2022 that led to Hallie being named a Female Athlete of the Year. Her concussion forced her to take time off and ease her training, which was a challenge for the competitive athlete. Working with her cross-country coach Sandra Gallagher-Mohler, Hallie overcame through her frustration and made her last season count. In crosscountry, she finished sixth in the counties, fourth at regionals and 13th at During the indoor state championship meet, Hallie ran a personal best of 11:26:23 in the 3,200 meters, over 20 seconds faster



than her previous best. Hallie commented, "It meant a lot to me to gain back that strength and confidence. I was able to be really proud of myself that day, just realizing that I had run as fast as I did." "That was the breakthrough race that she really needed because she kind of had just been stuck," Gallagher-Mohler said. "Her workouts were fantastic, but she basically missed almost the whole fall, since she really didn't get any of that base training." Hallie capped her senior campaign outdoors by taking ninth at states in the 3,200, third in regionals and fifth at counties. One of her indoor and outdoor track coach Jaren Mybin responded "Watch her run, she is so fluid. She just makes it look so easy and I'd be calling out times, but they are fast. Hallie is



one of my favorites. Hallie really, really made me interested in long-distance running."

To cap her career, Hallie was honored with Baltimore County's Mildred Murry All-Academic Scholar-Athlete Award and Scholarship this year. The Mildred Murray scholarships are given to senior male and female student-athletes who have maintained a minimum 3.5 unweighted grade point average for each quarter and have participated in at least two varsity sports. Each BCPS high school nominates seniors for this honor.

Hallie is graduating from Catonsville High with a 3.91 unweighted grade point average and is a member of the National Honor Society. At Catonsville, she played soccer and

ran cross country for two years and participated in indoor and outdoor track for four years.

Hallie will attend the University of Arizona in the fall, but will not race competitively. "The weather is a big plus, but also it's a great school with a lot of traditions and I'm going into medicine, so the program there is really spectacular and I'm in the honors program as well, so in honors college there is a lot of opportunity for academic growth and also growing through the community," Hallie said. "They also have a lot of study abroad programs and if I ever change my mind about what I want to do as a career, being at a big school is a big plus for that to really study anything that I want to do."

She plans to run at her own pace in Arizona. "I think I'm going to start off slow, definitely local, I mean running is an awesome sport because you can take it with you anywhere, so I'll be taking that with me everywhere I go for the rest of my life," she said. "Being able to do some local stuff there when it's not blasted hot and just staying active will be a big thing, but having nice weather year-round will be important for me, running leisurely and lots of gym time, but definitely taking a break from the competitive side of running right now."

MINISTERING TO THE MOST VULNERABLE

Having the sally port gates slam behind her after walking into the prison for the first time was a bit of a shock to **Susan Beck '74, French**. Luckily, a friend was there to hold her hand as they adjusted to the tight space and waited for the next door to open. As Beck got her breathing under control, she joined her classmates in a clinical pastoral education class on the rest of the tour of the facility.

Beck, a former French teacher and a childbirth instructor, never envisioned her retirement as a career rebirth, but as she contemplated how she wanted to spend her time, she kept returning to



her love of the church and wondered how she might serve. Prison ministry was the farthest idea from her mind, says Beck now. She imagined shepherding a congregation and ministering to families, but what that evolved into was a role as a community pastor, hosting weekly pub theology sessions and also stepping in as an interim pastor at different churches.

When her predecessor tapped her to think about taking over the spiritual leadership of The Community of St. Dysmas—a Lutheran ministry within the Maryland State Correctional System—Beck thought "no way" at first. But after Beck started volunteering with St. Dysmas, "It was pure gospel," she says.

Serving an incarcerated congregation

These days Beck works out of a donated office space down the street from UMBC at the Salem Lutheran Church in Catonsville. Salem has set aside space for Beck to make copies, write her newsletter, and put up notes and cards from her congregants behind bars.

"Christianity is so focused on forgiveness of sins and God's grace and God's unconditional love, and that transforms people," says Beck, who received her masters of divinity from Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg in 2010. "I do not seek to ever find out what their offenses are. That's not important to me as their pastor, but sometimes they tell me. And as a mother and a grandmother, it's really hard to hear—but

when someone seeks God's forgiveness and they get it, it changes their lives. It doesn't change their circumstances. They're still going to live out their sentence. They may never get out of prison, but everything's different. That's Jesus' message and it was right there in the prison, and I absolutely loved it."

Beck explains that while there are many larger prison ministries, St. Dysmas is one of the only places that provides a welcoming and affirming service for the LGBTQAI+ community within the Maryland prison system. "We very much



welcome the questioners and the people who aren't quite sure where they belong.... We welcome first and walk with people along their way, which is a very Lutheran thing to do."

In post-canonical biblical literature, St. Dysmas is named as the criminal who dies next to a crucified Christ, asking to be remembered in the afterlife. "So our saint is a convicted criminal," says Beck, "as was our Lord and Savior. Jesus died with a criminal record. How about that?"

In January 2023, after nearly five years of doing this work, Beck was formally installed as the pastor to a congregation entirely behind bars but spread out over the Maryland state prison system. On Monday nights she's in Hagerstown; on Wednesdays, Sykesville; and Saturdays in Jessup. Beck is accompanied by a rotating cadre of volunteers, who step up to make sure each facility has coverage for worship services and Bible studies.

Creating a sanctuary behind bars

What an average service looks like for Beck is after the sally port gates shut behind her and the next set of doors opens, she needs to successfully go through a metal detector in fewer than three tries. ("Don't wear bras with underwires.")

In a clear, plastic purse, she only brings with her items on an approved list from the Maryland Correctional Facilities: bread and a sealed container of grape juice for communion, devotional materials, different colored cloths for different liturgical seasons. Sometimes she needs other materials. "I did a baptism a couple of weeks ago, and I had to send many reminders to the administration that, 'I need to bring in a plastic bowl. It's just a plastic bowl."

If she successfully makes it through the metal detector, she is patted down by a female guard, and then escorted to the space her congregation will use to worship. Sometimes it is a room and sometimes it is a hallway. Usually members of the congregation will set up chairs and arrange the area for worship. Beck or another volunteer will play music (she has the paperwork cleared to bring her violin in), and they will create a sacred space within the prison walls.

Beck serves communion, offers a time for reflection, and shares a short sermon. "Over time, as they hear us preach and teach and talk—and the services are very interactive—those relationships build. And even though we're informal and it's not a cathedral, it's not a sanctuary like you would imagine, I want to create a sanctuary for them."

Shared humanity

Beck, who is 70 years old, says that this work she previously couldn't have imagined for herself continues to energize her. "UMBC offered me an accessible path to education," reflects Beck. "But you don't ever stay on one path—you go off and expand it."

When she goes to leave the prisons at night, her parishioners will tell her, "Watch out for the deer. They're crazy this time. You'll watch out for the deer?" And as the sally port gates shut behind Beck, with her now on the outside, she says, "I know on the other side of that door, there are gangs and there's danger and there's people yelling at them. But they said, 'Watch out for the deer.' That's just so human."

"Intercessory prayer can penetrate the hearts of those we cannot open and shield those we cannot guard and
