Here's a run-down of our charities who will receive 100% of the money raised:

Interfaith Partners for the Chesapeake (IPC) works to engage congregations in being good caretakers of our shared watershed. IPC works in two ways: by raising awareness of the power that people of faith have to restore clean water and environmental justice, and by offering hands-on assistance helping

congregations plan, pay for, and install healing projects for their communities such as rain gardens, tree plantings, native plantings, and more. www.interfaithchesapeake.org

Baltimore Area Aftercare Program (BAAP) is an all-volunteer organization with volunteers from a variety of churches in the Baltimore, Maryland area dedicated to working with returning citizens coming out of prison or jail. Services include mentoring and assistance with finding housing, jobs, and resources such as food, clothing and transportation. https://www.baap-matt25v36.org/

The Peru Fund raises money to support clean water projects in rural Peru. Providing access to clean water allows a community to lead a healthier life and a means of food production. They favor projects that depend on the community to provide the manual labor with men and women being equally involved in the planning, leadership, implementation and ongoing maintenance. https://perufund.org/

Mar-Lu-Ridge is a year-round outdoor ministry in the Catoctin Mountains of central Maryland. The ministry offers summer camp, retreats, and a conference center. Established in 1959, Mar-Lu-Ridge is overseen by the ELCA but is open to people of all faiths. Money raised will go to the capital campaign to fund much needed updates to facilities, including improving ADA accessibility. www.mar-lu-ridge.org



LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF Quilts and School Kits Joint Dedication

October 7 & 8

Salem has traditionally made generous donations of quilts and school kits to Lutheran World Relief for distribution to those in need at a number of overseas ministries. Separate dedications have usually been included in two fall weekend worship services. This October we will dedicate them together on Saturday, October 7 and Sunday, October 8.

The idea for this joint dedication grew out of a visit to Salem's LWR Quilt Group during its weekly work session on July 25 by Martha Piedrasanta, Quilt and Kit Senior Manager and Mary Tereszkiewicz, Quilt and Kit Ministry Associate of the LWR staff. Salem quilters truly enjoyed getting to know them and shared some of the details of how the quilt ministry operates at Salem.

Martha and Mary presented not only general information on the Quilts and Kits Ministries but also brought videos and still pictures of several areas where LWR aid is so important. The quilters heard the sad stories of those in Ukraine who suffered attacks and especially of those who are now refugees. They also reported on how quilts are helping babies in Njombe, a cold region of Tanzania. Many children there do not grow properly because the nutrition they eat goes mainly to keep them warm rather than support growth. An LWR quilt can give a baby the warmth to use nutrition to develop in a normal, healthy way.

Since all of the quilts and school kits need to be delivered to the LWR warehouse in New Windsor, Maryland, it was obviously a good idea to dedicate them together and transport them together.

Salem quilters are continuously pleased at the ongoing and generous support from members of the congregation. The frequent donations of fabric and thread are especially important and valuable. Salem generosity extends to school supplies each fall as school kits are assembled for the coming year. Each of these individual gifts adds to the work that LWR can do worldwide.


Mar-Lu-Ridge Camp and Conference Center has launched a capital campaign to raise \$2M to make major improvements on the campus. Chief among those is \$1M to renovate the Conference Center, the major expense being the installation of an elevator. They plan to build a pavilion in Area 3 and to safeguard the log buildings that are showing insect infestation as well as other projects. The chief aim is to make the Camp and Conference Center accessible to folks with disabilities. Director Sarah Leftler said they have turned away about 6 groups in the last two years because the Ridge was unable to accommodate folks with ambulatory challenges. They are determined to change that and this campaign will make great strides to that end.

I was a camper there in the 70s and 80s, and both my kids have been going to MLR since they were about 6 years old. My wife Lindsay has volunteered as the medical director for several years now. If you have ever been there, you know what a special place it is to experience the presence of the divine while surrounded by nature.

I am organizing a concert, which will be Sunday October 1, 2023 at 3PM at Salem, in the sanctuary. A Free-will offering will be collected for the MLR Capital fund. I have directly reached out to a number of folks about being in the concert, and the program is starting to take shape with some singing, some instruments, a poetry reading and perhaps a theatrical sketch. There is room in the program for more! DIETRICH BONHOEFFER AND ADULT FORUM

Dietrich Bonhoeffer lived during the first part of the twentieth century and was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian and anti-Nazi dissident who was a key founding member of the Confessing Church. His writings on Christianity's role in the secular world become influential in the Church. Apart from his theological writings, Bonhoeffer was known for his staunch resistance to the Nazi dictatorship, including vocal opposition to Adolf Hitler's euthanasia program and genocidal persecution of the Jews.

This fall, Adult Forum kicks off with a seven-week series on Dietrich Bonhoeffer and why his theology is still important today. Here is the plan for the seven weeks. (Each week will be independent of the others except for the second one, which is dependent upon the first week.)

- 9/17: Watch the first part of Martin Doblmeier's film entitled Bonhoeffer.
- 9/24: Finish watching and discussing the Bonhoeffer film. The DVD will be available for those who are unable to attend or want to watch it again.
- 10/1: Watch and discuss Dr. Di Rayson's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Ecology. Dr. Rayson is a theologian at Pacific Theological College in Australia. She lectures on topics of Public Policy, Ethics, and Ecotheology and uses Bonhoeffer's theology to interrogate and respond to contemporary issues and support the church.
- 10/8: Watch and discuss Dr. Lori Brandt Hale's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Justice. Dr. Brandt Hale is Professor and Chair in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Augsburg University in Minneapolis. She has published papers on Bonhoeffer, including Bonhoeffer's Christological Take on Vocation, and incorporates Bonhoeffer's thoughts into her teaching; in particular, throwing ourselves completely into the arms of God and taking seriously not only our own sufferings, but those of God in the world.
- 10/15: Watch and discuss Dr. Reggie Williams's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Race and Religion. Dr. Williams is a professor at McCormick Theological Seminary. His research interests include the impact of exposure to Christianity in the Harlem during the Harlem Renaissance on the German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer.
- 10/22: Watch and discuss Rev. Dr. Jennifer McBride & Dr. Thomas Fabisiak's talk on Bonhoeffer on Incarnation. The Rev. Dr. McBride is Associate Rector of Formation at All Saints Episcopal Church in Atlanta and is the President of the International Bonhoeffer Society. Dr. Fabisiak runs a college degree program at Arrendale State Prison for Women through Life University in Marietta. Both individuals have been active in prison ministries and have incorporated Bonhoeffer's message of discipleship into their teaching.
- 10/29: Watch and discuss Dr. Andrew Root's talk on Bonhoeffer on Faith. Dr. Root is an Associate Professor at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. Dr. Root's studies have focused on Bonhoeffer's engagement in youth ministry.

Please come and join us at 9:30am in the Katie Luther Room to learn about Dietrich Bonhoeffer and why his theology is still relevant in our broken world.



NORTH AVENUE MISSION SERVICE PROJECT

REFUGEE TASK FORCE UPDATE

This year Rohail, Saba and Lima will all be attending their first year at **Catonsville High School**. Lima will be a Freshman, Saba, a junior and Rohail, a Senior. CHS now has an ESOL program which will be part of their program yet this year.

We hope Salem youth at CHS will look for them and help to welcome them there!

Sahra, Masooma's niece, continues her full time **employment** at ZIPS Cleaners on Rt. 40. Masooma is hoping to soon begin work at Forest Haven Nursing Home.

Rohail has made good use of his learning permit, and is already an excellent driver. We have a car ready for donation when he earns his **driver's license**. He now just needs to log the required driving hours.

We have been tapering our **financial support** until in October the family will have full responsibility for their rent and utilities. Masooma is nearly finished the necessary bridge work at the U of Maryland Dental School. Our remaining financial needs—September rent portion, car repair and title transfer, and final Dental School bill total about \$600 beyond the current \$1100 in the Refugee Fund.

Members of the task force continue at times to assist the family with the extensive **paperwork** required of refugees. The requirements of and dealings with the state of Maryland's Department of Human Services and the United States' Citizenship and Immigration Services would be challenging for anyone, but especially those new to this country and to our language. The experience is demanding and sometimes seems punitive.

Sahra just had her **Asylum** Interview; the rest of the family had their interview in February. Due to a large backlog, there is at least a six month waiting time for USCIS' response. The World Relief lawyers who've helped them complete their applications and assisted them in their interviews have both felt that each presented their case with courage and conviction, and feel confident about their chance for approval. Asylum status would fulfill our nation's promise to our Afghan allies, secure their stay here, and serve as their path to citizenship.

We're pleased to announce that the **al Fahad family**, the Syrian refugee family of six whom you helped us to sponsor several years ago, are now all American citizens. They live in their own home in Windsor Mill which they bought last year.

How can you help? At present we still are providing transportation to medical and dental appointments and occasional trips to the grocery store. Let us know if you'd be willing to assist. Rohail would welcome support in meeting his goal for driving hours. And we must ask for your continued financial support a bit longer. You can mail your donation to the church office, clearly marked Refugee Fund, or place in a pew offering envelope. Our CHS students can be friend the teens in their first year there.

Of course, the Durrani family, and refugees the world over continue to need our prayers and our advocacy. In this manner we continue our nation's proud heritage of hospitality, and even more importantly, we fulfill our Lord's command to serve his needs in the stranger and the poor.
