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REFORMATION

On Saturday October 28 and Sunday October 29 we will celebrate the Reformation that opened new ways to understand Christ and to be Christ's Church on earth. We'll gather for worship at 5 pm on Saturday and again 8:15 and 11:00 on Sunday morning. Wear your red!

Following is an excerpt from Martin Luther's Meditation concerning Christ's Passion.

"Now continue to rise beyond Christ's heart to God's heart and you will see that Christ would not have shown this love for you if God in his eternal love had not wanted this, for Christ's love for you is due to his obedience to God. Thus you will find the divine and kind paternal heart,

and, as Christ says, you will be drawn to the Father through him. Then you will understand the words of Christ, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only son.....(John 3:16). We know God alright when we grasp him not in his might or wisdom (for then he proves terrifying)

but in his kindness and love."

MAR-LU-RIDGE CAPITAL APPEAL CAMPAIGN CONTINUES

Salem members have contributed over \$22,000 towards the MLR Capital Appeal. The Appeal seeks to raise \$2 million dollars to improve accessibility to the camp and to provide for some much needed renovations. Our Salem congregation has set a goal to raise \$75,000 by June of 2026. Thanks so much for your generosity.

GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS, 2023

Imagine a day of service on which a team of seven cooks assembles and bakes 15 crustless quiches for the Westside Men's Emergency Shelter, each casserole serving eight hungry men on the first day of the NFL season (with cereal bars, bananas, and mini-cinnamon rolls on the side, thanks to Jim Kempton putting to use a Thrivent "Action Team" grant).

Or how about Salem's Anti-Racism Task Force joining forces with the youth group, under Pastor Carolyn's guidance, to spend time at the in-town North Avenue Mission for a tour of office space and a recap of the community's history and the services it provides? Top that off by the Salem group's pitching in to beautify NAM's Red Shed Village, which provides transitional housing for people experiencing homelessness: A worthwhile outing, to be sure.

But what if a half dozen or so dedicated gardeners prepared Salem's church grounds for the cold weather, trimming bushes, pruning trees, and eradicating ivy and weeds: That would be a day well spent.

And how about a Saturday meeting of the Salem Stitchcrafters, who meet nearly every Thursday, but this time, using Thrivent "Action Team" funds for yarn, gathered on a Saturday to complete hats and scarves for their Seafarers' Christmas-at-Sea project? Best of all, thanks to new stitchers to the group, there was a frequently expanded circle of chairs in Reformation Hall.

And then there's the group that met upstairs at Salem and, with their best penmanship and sincere wishes, reached out to the homebound, those in the service, and college students, among others. Especially in this age of electronic communication, who wouldn't appreciate a handwritten note?

Finally, imagine a team of volunteers taking a Saturday morning to assemble 181 student backpacks, as well as 29 layette kits, all heading for distribution by Lutheran World Relief. An incredible sight in Bethany Hall, to be sure.

Any one of these volunteer activities would be amazing in itself. But together, Salemites joined forces to make possible our congregation's overwhelming annual response to "God's Work. Our Hands," a synod-wide day of service, celebrated here on Saturday, September 9.

Special thanks to Deb Brohawn and Pastor Dave for conquering "The Beast," aka Salem's kitchen stove. To Tim Jennings for beautifying Salem's outdoor entranceway with three lovely pots. To Julie Mercer, president of the Bon Secours Foundation, for receiving 100 baby blankets, crafted by the Stitchcrafters and Salem's quilters, and to Pastor Dave, for blessing these gifts destined for Baltimore's Early Head Start program. To the person who anonymously donated 25 of those student backpacks. Again, to Jim Kempton, who funded cloth diapers thanks to a Thrivent grant. And to all those unnamed who made this wonderful day of Christian fellowship and generous outreach possible.

DIETRICH BONHOEFFER AND ADULT FORUM

We will continue this fascinating study of Dietrich Bonhoeffer through the month of October.

- 10/1: Watch and discuss Dr. Di Rayson's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Ecology. Dr. Rayson is a theologian at Pacific Theological College in Australia. She lectures on topics of Public Policy, Ethics, and Ecotheology and uses Bonhoeffer's theology to interrogate and respond to contemporary issues and support the church.
- 10/8: Watch and discuss Dr. Lori Brandt Hale's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Justice. Dr. Brandt Hale is Professor and Chair in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Augsburg University in Minneapolis. She has published papers on Bonhoeffer, including Bonhoeffer's Christological Take on Vocation, and incorporates Bonhoeffer's thoughts into her teaching; in particular, throwing ourselves completely into the arms of God and taking seriously not only our own sufferings, but those of God in the world.
- 10/15: Watch and discuss Dr. Reggie Williams's lecture on Bonhoeffer on Race and Religion. Dr.
 Williams is a professor at McCormick Theological Seminary. His research interests include the impact of exposure to Christianity in the Harlem during the Harlem Renaissance on the German pastor and theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer.
- 10/22: Watch and discuss Rev. Dr. Jennifer McBride & amp; Dr. Thomas Fabisiak's talk on Bonhoeffer on Incarnation. The Rev. Dr. McBride is Associate Rector of Formation at All Saints Episcopal Church in Atlanta and is the President of the International Bonhoeffer Society. Dr. Fabisiak runs a college degree program at Arrendale State Prison for Women through Life University in



Marietta. Both individuals have been active in prison ministries and have incorporated Bonhoeffer's message of discipleship into their teaching.

• 10/29: Watch and discuss Dr. Andrew Root's talk on Bonhoeffer on Faith. Dr. Root is an Associate Professor at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. Dr. Root's studies have focused on

Bonhoeffer's engagement in youth ministry.

Please come and join us at 9:30am in the Katie Luther Room to learn about Dietrich Bonhoeffer and why his theology is still relevant in our broken world.



FAIR TRADE NEWS-

A PRICE INCREASE FOR SMALL SCALE FARMERS IN THE DEVELOPING WORLD

Increased costs and needs are a dynamic world-wide. The time has come for our first price increase in more than *a decade*. Fair Trade is a commitment to ensure that farmers in resource-challenged parts of the world receive a just wage for their labor.

These are our new prices:

Ground Coffees, 10-12 oz\$9	Divine Chocolate Bars, 3 oz\$4
Tea, 20 bags, 1.4 oz\$4	Equal Exchange Chocolate Bars,
	2.8 oz\$3 (no increase)

In order to avoid needing to make change, we continue to round up the cost to the nearest dollar. That excess remains in the Fair Trade account to provide coffee for church suppers and receptions, the church office, and eventually may defray a cost increase.

Our sole purpose in selling Fair Trade coffees, teas, and chocolates is to provide small scale farmers in developing countries —not charity—but a just wage for their labors. And thereby, as you have read many times, this increased income lifts the health and wealth of the whole village. Salem receives no financial benefit from our Fair Trade sales.

And, of course, we are also able to do this while offering our members the finest coffees, teas and chocolates still at a very affordable price!

THE GOLDEN YEARS OF VICTORIAN BOOKBINDING in the 1870s and 1880s

I purchased my first old book during college, from a little shelf in front of Duane Johnson's wonderful bookstore just off the square in Gettysburg. It's an 1846 copy of Horace's poetic works in Latin, leather-bound with marbled endpapers. The price—10 cents—is still on the flyleaf. A library of old books then just grew across the years, mostly found in bookstores in Minneapolis, Hagerstown and Frederick and at Washington County auctions. Most all are from my earlier collecting years at costs far less than today. Most are books of literature and history, particularly the Reformation, dating from the 1690s to the 1920s.



Old books hold a particular charm along with their content: the very early ones printed with a dozen or more shifting fonts, the feel of old leather bindings, the geniality of aged woodcuts on rag paper, the sharpness of the fine copper and steel engravings. Then too, the brilliance of these embossed and brightly-colored, cloth-bound books with gilt-enhanced designs on the covers and spines, along with the charm of these brightly-colored printed covers of children's books. One more expression of the exuberant ornamentation of the Victorian era.

I'd often wondered, seeing these gilt-adorned books scattered across the shelves, what they might look like displayed. So I appreciate the opportunity to share them with you in the showcase. Some notations and explanations are included there. All of the books date from the 1870s and 1880s, but for a couple earlier.




