CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

- Received a presentation regarding the plans for the 175th Anniversary and voted to authorize \$16,000 in 2024 most of which is to pay for a catered dinner for the congregation at the FOP Lodge in Oella in November 2024
- Passed a motion to give a 1.5% Cost of Living Adjustment to the staff
- Reviewed the 3rd Quarter Financial Report which shows a deficit of \$26,000 so far this year. But the fourth quarter is the highest quarter of the year so there is no need to worry.
- Pastor Asendorf shared a letter from Robin Schaefer indicating she plans to retire effective December 31, 2023. She thanked the congregation for the opportunity to serve and expressed how much she has enjoyed working with Pastor Dave, the Salem staff and the congregation.

HART MILLER ISLAND TRIP

On Tuesday, October 17th, a group from Salem visited Hart-Miller Island. The trip was sponsored through the Guardians of Eden (GOE). Hart-Miller Island was once part of a peninsula, eaten away by erosion off of Back River and the Middle Rivers in Essex, Maryland. Originally owned by Joseph Hart, and used for hunting, the island was bought by the state of Maryland. Beginning in 1981, the island was rebuilt using sediment recovered by dredging from the bottom of shipping channels.





On our tour we had

the opportunity to see many birds, including osprey, eagles, American avocets, egrets, gulls, a turkey, and turkey vultures. The island is home to over 300 species of birds, as well as a lot of wildlife. Wildlife includes foxes, deer, turtles, and raccoons.

Personnel also work with the Port of Baltimore and the Department of the Environment.

There has been an outreach into local schools, with 171 terrapins placed in classrooms for students to learn about the environment and its wildlife. This year alone, over 600 people have taken tours of the island. There has been a great deal of community involvement, including an oversight committee, as well as groups such as the boy scouts, who have been involved in planting more trees.



Our group had the opportunity to visit the State Park here,

which is normally opened from May until the end of September. On a busy summer weekend as many as



1000 people may be visiting this state park. Today we could set at a site by the beach and enjoy snacks and taking in a beautiful view of the bay.

Rest rooms are available, as well as camp sites on other parts of the island. The GOE hopes again to sponsor another trip in the future to the island. Hopefully people will come to be better acquainted with environmental work going on in the state of Maryland.

ADULT FORUM NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER

November will begin with the last chapter of the Dietrich Bonhoeffer series.

The month will continue with a two-week series by Dr. Guy Davis on "Antarctica and Climate Change." Antarctica, the seventh continent, is one that few get a chance to visit. Guy Davis discusses his trips to Antarctica and the sub-Antarctic region. Penguins, whales, and seals abound amidst the ice and rocky shores. But global warming is occurring. How will it affect Antarctica and the rest of the world?



In December, Pastor Carolyn will lead a two-week series on the Camino de Santiago, a web of pilgrimage routes that lead to the remains of St. James in Santiago de Compostela, Spain. Beginning in at least the 800's, the Way of St. James has been walked by millions of pilgrims



throughout the last millennia. Why has this Way attracted, enticed, and inspired so many Christians and non-believers to walk hundreds of kilometers through rural Iberia? For what—or for Whom—are they searching? Week 1 (December 3) will focus on a history and theology of Christian pilgrimage, particularly the Camino de Santiago. In week 2 (December 10) Pastor Carolyn will share reflections on her recent pilgrimage experience walking the Caminho Português route.

It's that time of year to make sure you have coffee to flavor your turkey gravy and chocolate to top your pumpkin pie! So watch for the Fair Trade Cart in the narthex. And stop by to make a purchase, or at least check out our wares.

You'll notice that we've increased prices on our coffee and tea for the first time in many, many years. Increased prices enable a fairer wage for the growers. Our prices are still lower than stores because Salem never benefits financially from these sales. Prices are rounded to the dollar, some up and some down. Any monies received beyond our costs are generally used to buy coffee and tea used here at Salem, for receptions, dinners and in the church office.



We don't know if, how or when a Thanksgiving holiday might be observed in the various developing economies where these small scale farmers labor. But we do know the farmers have greater cause for thanksgiving when they have been paid a fair wage for their work. Beyond this, it is cause for a whole village's thanksgiving as greater incomes benefits schools, clinics and wells.


