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SALEM CELEBRATES 175 YEARS

In this 175th anniversary year, we are tempted to pause for a moment and take a good look at our dear Salem Lutheran Church, and when we do this, we can identify so much that gives us reason to celebrate. Our spirit-filled worship life (including inspiring musical offerings); our opportunities for religious education for members of all ages; opportunities for Christian service, both here in our own community as well as in areas far beyond Catonsville; our strong financial position; and perhaps most precious of all, our genuine love and concern for each other combine to make us a truly blessed community.

In 1974, as Salem celebrated its 125th anniversary, it was decided that a new history of the congregation would be a valuable and lasting remembrance of the celebration. The congregation asked a new member, Dr. Edward Orser, to undertake this project. Ed and Jo Orser were new members of the congregation after moving to our area as Ed began a 40-year professorship of American Studies at UMBC. His book, [*Salem Evangelical Lutheran Church, 125 years of Christian Ministry, 1849-1974*](#), continues to be an important source of congregational information.

It was with great sorrow that we said farewell to Ed at his funeral at Salem on January 20th this year. Pastor Dave in his sermon pointed out that Ed's book went beyond so many similar congregational histories in that it focuses on the spirit of the members through the years rather than just a list of building projects or the names of pastors.

Ed's book points out that our church's Christian ministry has taken differing forms in various periods of its history, and that change has not always been easy. He concluded by writing "...what is impressive in examining the record of Salem's 125-year ministry is its resilience in adapting the nature and character of that ministry to new times and new conditions. The challenge for the future, as for the past, is to be able to hold true to the basic commitment to Christian ministry while maintaining an openness to the possibility for reformation and renewal."

Those words are as true today as they were 50 years ago. We can say to each other and to ourselves, "A VERY HAPPY ANNIVERSARY".

The third Sunday we started to discuss Lent and how people observe Lent in different ways: some people give things up, others do extra acts of kindness while some people add extra Bible time to their daily schedule. We will be learning about Miriam and Baby Moses, Moses and the 10 Commandments, Deborah, and how Naaman is healed with a focus on the bravery of the unnamed servant girl.

ARE YOU A HIGH SCHOOL SENIOR?

YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR A SALEM SCHOLARSHIP!

Making plans for the next step after graduation can be stressful for high school seniors and their families, especially with the increasing cost of higher education. Please keep in mind the ministry of Salem's Scholarship Program which, for over 30 years, has assisted Salem members as they take the next step in their academic pursuits. Stipends of up to \$1000 per year for a total of four years cover only a modest part of the total higher education bill, but can make a difference and serve as an important piece in defraying costs.

Salem scholarships recognize individuals based on any (or all) of the following categories: academic achievement; Christian character, service, and citizenship; educational and career goals; and financial need. We thoughtfully consider all of the ways in which students have applied their talents and interests, and therefore recognize the variety of post-high school educational experiences that may ultimately be the most appropriate for each student.

The deadline for 2024 applications is April 15. Salem's high school seniors will receive a personal letter inviting them to consider applying for the program, but it's not too early to learn about the program. More recently she has worked in freelance day trading. She's grateful that this affords her more time for personal interests and her spiritual journey. Enjoyment of music led her to sing with the Sweet Adelines Barbershop Chorus. She's also studied Indian Classical Singing.

She'd come to feel a strong sense of call to Jesus, to explore the Christian Church. Christmas Eve, yearning for a communal experience, she looked online for a local service and happened upon our 7:30 service. Drawn by the music and our expressed invitation, she came to the 10 p.m. service. Warmly welcomed and enriched by her experience, she returned for the Christmas morning service. At the Saturday evening service on December 30th, she told Pr. Dave that she wished to be baptized, and felt God's Spirit calling her to be baptized before the new year. We were blessed to celebrate her baptism the next morning.

Her first name in Hindu tradition means "meditation", and that has been a rich channel in her searching. She has taught meditation in the men's and women's prisons, working with Pr. Sue Beck of St. Dymas.

It was only after coming to worship that she realized this was the congregation for which her barbershop chorus had sung at the FOP Lodge a few weeks before, and discovered that Pr. Sue has her office here at Salem. She now sings in the Salem Choir.

All this has given her a strong sense that Salem is the right place for her to be now in her journey, and she looks forward to growing in her faith along with us.

Pastor Sigurd and Jean Arnesen

Pastor Sigurd and Jean Arnesen were both members of a large Norwegian Lutheran Church in Brooklyn, NY. Brooklyn was always Sig's home; and Jean's family moved there in her youth. They didn't know one another until they happened to sit beside each other at a wedding reception. There was such sufficient spark that Sig told his folks that night that he'd met the woman he intended to marry. And marry they did. This was following Sig's Army service and graduation from St. Olaf College.



Then living in Cleveland, at age 30 Sig decided to attend seminary. They moved to St. Paul and upon graduation from Luther Seminary in 1961 he was ordained in the American Lutheran Church (which merged with the LCA to form the ELCA in 1987). His first call was to serve a struggling mission church "out in the orange groves" near Sarasota, Florida. The congregation became well established and in 1969 the Church called him to a new challenge, to serve Faith Lutheran Church on North Avenue in Baltimore City. It was the year after the riots and urban congregations were in crisis. Throughout the next years, by their efforts in the congregation and in the community, he led the church's integration. In his work with the community, he became well acquainted with such Baltimore leaders as Clarence Du Burns, Thos. D'Alesandro, and Kurt Schmoke.

Across the years, though busy raising six children, Jean was very actively involved in the life of the congregations and the community—teaching Sunday School, leading the Women's Group, serving on Church Council, singing in the choir, directing children's choir, volunteering at a free clinic, Meals on Wheels, at Union Memorial Hospital as a hospice volunteer and then working there.

When Sig retired 33 years ago they moved to Georgia; finding that there were no churches in the area, he started a mission congregation. He served several interim positions. One was in Ocean Springs, Mississippi after half the homes were destroyed in Hurricane Katrina. The church housed 200 volunteers. Sig recalls working 12 hour days. Last year he and Jean returned to Baltimore to be near family here, living at Charlestown. They visited a dozen churches before they decided to join Salem. Jean has joined the choir and remarked that they keep discovering new, interesting and wonderful things in the life and ministries of Salem.

Mr. Lurman was a Catonsville resident, having purchased the estate known as “Bloomsbury” in 1848 and then renaming it “Farmlands”. The property remained in the Lurman family until 1948 when it was sold to Baltimore County Board of Education, who then built Catonsville High School in the 1950’s on the corner of S. Rolling Road and Bloomsbury Avenue. Our program will be held at Old Salem, 701 Ingleside Avenue. Everyone is invited to attend and of course, we’ll have refreshments following the presentation.

Wednesday, July 31st - bus trip - come for a 3 hour crab feast/cruise on the Dorothy Megan paddle wheel boat out of Suicide Bridge marina in Hurlock, Maryland. 

CEA PROGRAM ASSISTANT

Catonsville Emergency Assistance (CEA), a local non-profit organization providing neighbors in need with emergency food, utility, and eviction assistance, is seeking a Part-Time Program Assistant (25 hours per week). The Program Assistant is the initial point of contact for community members in need of assistance. This role requires strong interpersonal skills, the ability to multitask, excellent communication skills, and patience. A typical day at CEA for a Program Assistant consists of answering phone inquiries, scheduling appointments, assisting, and advising those in need of services, distributing food, restocking freezers and food shelves, and other office assistant duties as assigned. This Program Assistant will partner with another Program Assistant in separation of duties related to client and volunteer management. This is a rigorous four-day week (Monday through Thursday), where the Program Assistant will serve over 40 clients per week, including 5-10 individual meetings with clients in need of eviction and utility assistance.

REFUGEE TASK FORCE SEEKING A CAR

The Task Force is searching for someone willing to donate their car to our refugee family. The car we planned to give them is not now suitable. Having a driver in the family will literally change a daily challenge of their lives.

Interior LED Lighting Energy Savings Upgrade

In late January Salem submitted an application to the EmPOWER Maryland program for no cost installation of energy efficient interior LED lighting. BGE recently approved our application and installation will begin in late February/early March. The most noticeable difference will be new two by four-foot overhead lighting fixtures in Bethany Hall, office, choir, and various meeting rooms. No changes for the Nave, Reformation Hall, or the stage areas. The installation will take approximately three weekdays. Salem will see a decrease in electricity use after installation, stay tuned for additional details.

Thank you for your support of LVC fellowships. Your gift helped us continue the service experience at no cost to LVC fellows, with LVC covering the costs for housing, utilities, transportation, health insurance, programming, and administration. Because of your generosity:

- Nine LVC fellows were gifted the year-of-service experience in Washington DC and Minneapolis MN; with virtual fellows serving from their hometowns.
- Fellowships included intentional community in LVC housing, year-long placements with nonprofit partners, and exploration of spirituality and LVC values.
- The service experience was provided at no cost to LVC fellows, and they received a modest monthly stipend.
- LVC continued monthly, national program days, bringing everyone together to take deeper dives into social justice topics like activism and voting rights; while learning to use a social justice lens to reimagine the possibilities.

In Fall 2023, LVC organized alumni-led Zooms to galvanize support; and in early 2024 hired an interim executive director to continue conversations about LVC's future. With more fellowship applications in January than in all recent years, we are excited about the days ahead.

For Walaa Ali al Ali, a Syrian refugee living in Lebanon, your love arrived in the form of a beehive. As the primary breadwinner for her family — including her mother, her developmentally disabled brother, a niece and a nephew — she struggled to find work amid Lebanon's economic crisis. Her family was safe from the war in Syria, but they didn't have access to adequate food or basic medical care.

Through LWR, Walaa enrolled in a livelihoods program for refugees and received all the training and supplies she needed to start a business as a beekeeper. With the money she earned, she also planted a vegetable garden to help feed her family. Now she's earning enough to keep her family afloat, and she's even training other women how to produce and sell honey.
