SALEM CELEBRATES 175 YEARS


Five years ago, when Salem observed its 170th anniversary, THE MONARCH included an article about John Hubner, a very special person in our church's long history. As we now celebrate 175 years, it is appropriate to share a portion of that article once again.

John Hubner's life story is one of living the American dream. He arrived with his parents in Maryland in 1855 at age 14 as an immigrant originally from Lonnerstadt, Bavaria. After living here for three years, he moved to Relay and worked as a clerk for the Adams Express Company, which did business on the B & O Railroad. He married Mary Harken, a young woman from Anne Arundel County, in 1864 and went on to a successful career running a railroad hotel. Within a few years, he and Mary had moved to Baltimore where he headed a brick manufacturing business for a number of years.

Now established in the Baltimore business community, he recognized the opportunity for profitable real estate ventures in Catonsville and relocated to our community in 1870. By the mid-1870s, the Hubners, including five children, were living in Beechwood, a gracious three-story mansion located on Frederick Road where the Catonsville Presbyterian Church is now located, and they were members of Salem. John Hubner enjoyed success dealing in real estate and served as president of the Catonsville Loan Association, as manager of the Manual Labor School, and as a director of the House of Refuge. Hubner Avenue, a short street just north of Edmondson Avenue, bears his name. If all that were not enough, he also served four terms in the Maryland General Assembly.

It is easy to understand why our Salem congregation called on him to head the effort to relocate from its original site to a more central location. He negotiated the purchase of the lot at Newburg Avenue, site of Newburg Hall, for \$1800, and oversaw the demolition of this structure. He then chaired the building committee as they engaged an architect and a builder and saw the project to completion, with a total cost of \$30,000. Over and over his name appears with appreciation in accounts of Salem's building projects, including the early addition to the church and the construction of the parsonage. And an additional bond with Salem was created when his daughter, Grace, married Salem's young bachelor pastor, Rev. Martin Luther Enders.

John Hubner died in 1920 and is buried in Greenmount cemetery. To be sure that he and his contributions are not forgotten, the people of Salem commissioned a stained-glass window honoring him and his family. It is located in the large window on the west side of the sanctuary. In this anniversary year, we continue to pay tribute to his memory.

SOCIAL MINISTRY POTLUCK AND PROGRAM

Plan now to attend our very special Social Ministry Potluck Dinner and Program on Sunday, April 14th at 5 pm. *Pastor Amy Berger*, currently a member of the Mar-Lu-Ridge Board, will be our key note speaker. She will share what camp life is all about at Mar-Lu-Ridge and give us updates on their capital campaign to renovate some of the facilities there making them handicap accessible and more accommodating.

Mar-Lu-Ridge is located in Jefferson, Maryland, a short distance from Frederick. It was founded in 1959 as the Outdoor Ministry of the Maryland Synod of the Lutheran Church. In 1962, the Chapel, Salem-on-the-Mountain was constructed and is well known for its beautiful view of the Potomac River and valley below.

Campers of all ages engage in cooperative learning while participating in a large variety of safe, non-threatening, non-competitive and hands on activities that promote campers' confidence. It also gives the campers an understanding of what it means to live as a community in Christ. This July, three of Salem's youth will be attending Confirmation Camp along with Pastor Carolyn – Michael Moore, Aidan Pfluger and Anna Morgan.

There is a dinner sign up board in Salem's Narthex for main dishes, salads, and/or desserts. It is suggested that you consider some type of "camp food or picnic dishes" as part of the shared meal that day. It will be a fun "Camping Experience" way to share our meal together.

CHILDREN MINISTRY

This month we started to learn about some lesser-known heroes in the Bible. During the last week of February, the children learned about Miriam and Baby Moses and how Miriam rescued Moses. The children had fun playing a game of rescuing Baby Moses. The next week we moved on to learning about the Commandments with an opening led by Pastor Carolyn. We then moved on to Deborah. We talked about how she sat under the palm tree when people came to her and how she was a wise judge who helped them solve their disagreements. We ended the month talking about what is Holy Week and did an egg hunt with each egg containing a symbol representing important events that occurred during the week. For Palm Sunday we talked about Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem, we made beautiful resurrection cross pictures, and participated in donkey races. There was no Sunday School on Easter but the children were invited to join Pastor Carolyn between services for an Easter Egg Hunt.

Sunday School students will again be making birthday boxes to donate to CEA (Catonsville Emergency Assistance) for distribution to families with children who perhaps cannot afford the ingredients to make their child/children a birthday cake. The cake can be made by simply adding a 12-ounce can of soda to a cake mix eliminating the egg and oil used in traditional mixing of the cake batter. Donations will be accepted through Sunday, May 26th. We will assemble the boxes on June 9th, the last day of Sunday School. Items needed:

- 13 x 9 disposable pans with see-through plastic lids
- Birthday Bags large enough to fit a 13 x 9 pan and ingredients
- 1 box of cake mix (any flavor)
- 1 12 oz can of either Sprite or Coke
- 1 can of icing (any flavor)
- 1 box of birthday candles
- Small container of sprinkles/jimmies

GUARDIANS OF EDEN NEWS

There's a lot going on that the GOE committee would like to make the congregation aware of.

Ken Scarlatelli will be having a demonstration about bees and beehives at his home on Saturday, May 11th at 507 Dorchester Road. Please be prompt at 1:00 p.m. and the informative demonstration will last until 2 p.m. It's very important that people arrive at 1:00 or before.

Greenfest will be held on Saturday, April 13th at Howard Community College from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Greenfest will be held at the SET building on campus, located at 10901 Little Patuxent Parkway. It is open to the public. There will be a native plant sale, with various workshops throughout the day, as well as document shredding available. There will also be giveaways of compact bins and rain barrels. Pre-registration is required to qualify for the drawings.

The Irvine Nature Center in Owings Mills is open Tuesday through Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. April – October. There are 8 plus trails, 8 resident raptors, an aviary and a Native American site to explore. The Center consists of more than 211 acres containing meadows, wetlands, and forests. No pets are allowed. There are free Fridays on April 5, 12, 19, and 26 as well as May 3, 10, 17 and 24. Other Adult Programs are available on other weekdays, requiring fees and registration.

In April, the GOE will be decorating a showcase with the theme of bees. There will be free giveaways of a bird house, bee house, and garden tools. People can register between services and after the late services on the weekend of April 6th Saturday only, as well as the weekend of April 27th and 28th.

Currently the committee is working on a lending library. Books are available in the Upper Room on the second floor. There is a notebook with sign out sheets for borrowing the books, all of which are stamped with Salem Lutheran Church. If interested, please fill in your name, the date, the title and your contact information. GOE is asking that the books be returned within 3 weeks.

Lastly, the GOE is joining the Youth Group and Pastor Carolyn to honor Earth Week with a clean-up of the Oella Cemetery on Rest Avenue in Catonsville. Hours are 9 a.m.-noon on Saturday, April 20th and waivers must be signed. Protective gloves and shoes should be worn. Contact Pastor Carolyn or Ken Scarlatelli or Norma Hensler-Davis if interested.

CARL ENGELBRECHT HONORED

Salem Member Carl Engelbrecht was recently afforded the honor of having an asteroid named after him. The award was given to Carl because of his work on the New Horizons Project, which flew by Pluto and the Kuiper Belt object Arrokoth. New Horizons science team member, Marc Buie, discovered the Asteroid, and therefore had the ability to name it. The asteroid, which was formerly designated 2002 PZ146, is now called (206015) Car-lengelbrecht. It is a mid-sized asteroid (about 3 km in diameter) in the main asteroid belt, and NASA calculations show there is essentially no chance of it hitting the earth in the future. CENTERING PRAYER

What is Centering Prayer?

Centering Prayer is a Christian contemplative practice of abiding in the indwelling presence of God in silence. One rests in this silence through the practice of surrender in each moment - noticing thoughts, feelings, judgments, and sensations as they pass through the mind during prayer, and letting them go, not clinging to them as they arise. This is known as Kenosis, the “self-emptying” of Christ.

How do I practice Centering Prayer?

Centering prayer can be practiced alone or in a group. The practitioner sits in a straight posture with eyes closed. A few deep breaths can help to settle the mind and body.

Once in a settled state, a sacred word is introduced as the symbol of one’s consent to God’s presence within. Some find that instead of a sacred word, a simple inward glance toward the heart and indwelling Divine Presence is more helpful, or noticing the breath. During prayer, whenever one becomes engaged in thoughts, emotions, images, there is simply a noticing without judgment, this sacred word or breath is used as an anchor to return to silence. Contemplative prayer is not so much a “doing,” but “being,” with silence as a container for listening and inviting God to orchestrate the practice.

Group practice is a powerful way to enter the silence of God together. In a structured group setting, the practice begins with an opening prayer in union, followed by a short reading by the facilitator, meant as an “entry way” into God’s presence. After the reading, the group sits for 25-30 minutes of silence, after which the facilitator gently concludes the sitting and repeats the reading. There is a time for brief sharing of insights. Sharing is a time to practice receptive silence and deep listening as the group continues to cultivate a contemplative atmosphere.

Centering Prayer familiarizes us with the first language of God, which is silence. The fruits of contemplative prayer are experienced in daily life. One may start to observe positive changes in habits, thought patterns, and behaviors with continued practice.

Centering Prayer was developed by Fr. Thomas Keating, a forerunner and teacher in the Christian Contemplative prayer movement. For more information, visit <https://www.contemplativeoutreach.org>.

HISTORIC OLD SALEM NEWS

Upcoming events, come join us:

We are again hosting our outside yard sale on Saturday, May 4th from 8 a.m. to noon in the Salem parking lot. Spaces are \$15 each and you will need to provide your own table or display set up. NOT accepting any White Elephants. Instead, please host your own table; we'd love to have you join the event. Reservations are being taken now.

Sunday, May 12th 9:30 .a.m – Judy LeGath and Michele Trump Miller, two of our Board members, will share Salem's history through the early years of our congregation's forming in 1849 and worshipping at our original church, now what we call Old Salem. Judy and Michele will lead the discussion at Salem's Adult Forum in the Katie Luther room. All are invited.

Sunday, June 2nd – 2 – 4 p.m. – Judy Legath will share a wonderful, informative program about Gustav Lurman, a local Baltimore businessman, who was one of the primary financiers contributing to our first congregation to help build the church. Mr. Lurman was a Catonsville resident, having purchased the estate known as "Bloomsbury" in 1848 and then renaming it "Farmlands". The property remained in the Lurman family until 1948 when it was sold to Baltimore County Board of Education, who then built Catonsville High School in the 1950's on the corner of S. Rolling Road and Bloomsbury Avenue. Our program will be held at Old Salem, 701 Ingleside Avenue. Everyone is invited to attend and "Yes" we'll have refreshments following the presentation.

Wednesday, July 31st - bus trip - come for a 3-hour crab feast n' cruise on the Dorothy Megan paddle wheel boat out of the Suicide Bridge marina in Hurlock, Maryland. Food Assistance





"Intercessory prayer can penetrate the hearts of those we cannot open and shield those we cannot guard and teach where we cannot speak and comfort where our hearts have no power to soothe. Prayer with its unseen hand, can enter where we may not."
