

GOD'S WORK. OUR HANDS 2024

"God's work, our hands: working together, building a future, repairing the world. . ."

A tall order, to be sure, but once again, Salem will be among a multitude of ELCA congregations marking "God's Work. Our Hands 2024." Although this annual day of service is officially celebrated on a Sunday, Salem gets a head start, with a slate of activities set for Saturday, September 7, from 9 a.m. to noon. With a wide range of volunteer opportunities offered, there is something for everyone in which to participate.

Among the activities planned for that day is the assembling of school kits to be distributed by Lutheran World Relief. Because last year's goal of 150 was easily surpassed (we sent 181 kits), members of the congregation are currently sewing 200 bags. Even if you're unable to physically help with the packing of the bags, which will take place in Bethany Hall, you can still be a part of this ministry: An article with details is in this issue of "The Monarch." At the same time, at least 25 layette kits, also destined for LWF, will be assembled.

Salem's Stitchcrafters will be taking advantage of yarn purchased from a Thrivent Action Team grant to quick knit/crochet hats and scarves for the Seafarers' "Christmas at Sea" project, even as the sacrifices made by those working onboard ships have been made especially clear to us this past year. Needles and hooks, as well as patterns will also be provided. At the same time, some 100 baby blankets, crafted by the Stitchcrafters and members of Salem's quilting group, will be donated to those serving families enrolled in Baltimore's Early Head Start program.

After a morning of yarncrafts, the Stitchcrafters are planning to enjoy a brown bag luncheon. All are invited to join them. Additionally, a group will be writing notes to those who are homebound, away at college, or serving in the Armed Forces. These are just a few of the opportunities to get involved, according to Mary Kay Willing of the Social Ministry committee, with details to follow.

"Bless, God, our hands as we work in your name, sharing the good news of your Gospel."

A VERY SPECIAL FOUNDERS DAY AT OLD SALEM

Every year Historic Old Salem sets aside the first Sunday in June as "Founders Day" that includes a program, often with an historic theme. June 2nd this year was no exception. The program included a talk on Gustav Lurman, often referred to as "Salem's Founder." His role in founding Salem Church has been well documented and much admired. In 2016 Old Salem was delighted to be able to dedicate a copy of an original oil painting of Lurman that belongs to a descendant. What was new to the story this year came from additional information from the Archives of the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland.

Not unlike the earliest members of Salem, Lurman was a German immigrant. He came to Baltimore in 1830 from Bremen, a German city closely associated then and now with international trade. He and a cousin established a highly successful import-export business that operated out of the Port of Baltimore. Their success made him a wealthy man and established him as a leader in the German -American business community. He married Frances Donnell, the daughter of a prominent Baltimore family. The Lurman Family was blessed with six children.

By 1848, wealthy area urban families were beginning to look for places to escape the heat and humidity by purchasing summer retreats. In that year Gustav and Frances purchased Farmlands, a 600-acre working farm with a mansion house that included 9 bedrooms. Over their years at Farmlands (located where the Catonsville High School is today), the Lurmans established extensive formal gardens and added interesting plantings in various areas of the estate.

The Salem Archives learned a few years ago that when St. Timothy's Episcopal Church was founded in 1844, a German-speaking member of their staff arranged German language worship services for our German immigrant farmers, but the services ended when he was reassigned to a post in New Jersey. The question remained, "Where was the Lurman connection?"

New information this year from the Episcopal Diocese of Maryland showed a connection with the Lurman family and St. Timothy's. Surely this was our link. It was Gustav Lurman who called the original meeting at the home of Paulus and Anna Reich for September 30, 1849. It was Lurman who arranged the purchase of the Salem property for \$300 and paid for it. It was Lurman who gave an additional \$500 to purchase building supplies. If these were loans, there is no record that he was ever repaid. Lurman continued to assist the new church for more than a year, but then his name disappears from the records. The new congregation, named Salem on September 30th, was well established. We can assume that 175 years later, he would be pleased to know that Salem is still serving its own congregation as well as the greater community.

In Catonsville now, the name Lurman survives in the Lurman Woodland Theater, where concerts are given each summer weekend. Bill Reich, a volunteer with the Theater operation, was in attendance at our June 2nd program and shared much about the theater and its contribution to summer in the community today.



CHILDREN MINISTRY

Sunday School students ended the year on June 9th by making birthday boxes to donate to CEA (Catonsville Emergency Association) for distribution to families with children who perhaps cannot afford the ingredients to make their child/children a birthday cake. Through many generous donations, we delivered 105 boxes to CEA. Sunday School will begin again with Rally Day on Sunday, September 8th. We hope to see everyone then.





HOLLY PLANK NAMED MRS. MARYLAND

Holly Plank, the daughter of Mary Miller, was awarded the Mrs. Maryland United States title and will compete in the Mrs. United States pageant this October in Memphis, TN!

SALEM'S ASCENSION PAINTING

Walking into Salem's sanctuary today, it is impossible not to notice the many beautiful enhancements that fill the chancel. These additions have been made over the years to reflect the congregation's appreciation for the ministry of Word and Sacrament that is delivered from the altar, lectern, and pulpit, and all are offered to the Glory of God. Among these additions is the Ascension Painting. In this anniversary year, it is appropriate to lift this up since it was the first of the enhancements added when Salem moved to our present location. As the photograph shows, the chancel originally consisted mostly of the dark oak wood that was used extensively in the interior.

Salem records reflect two dates (1906 and 1908) for the arrival of the painting. The records show that it was a memorial given in memory of Margaret Reich by her husband Henry. Since we know that she died on January 8, 1908, it probably arrived in that year. The artist was Charles Mente (1857-1933) whose body of artwork continues today to be bought and sold on the art market.

After a restoration project in 2006, the work was rededicated on Ascension Sunday of that year. The following information was distributed to those attending:

The painting is a meaningful representation of our Lord's Ascension, masterly and beautifully done. Its colors portray heavenly gold reflecting on tones of earth. The contrast of blue sky and Jesus' robes upon the concave surface of the chancel gives a three-dimensional appearance. Jesus' right hand is raised in benediction, blessing those who gather here for worship. His left hand sends us forth, to be his witnesses, loving him as we serve others.

The Christ figure is nearly in its original condition, with very minor repair and cleaning. The surrounding canvas has been repainted several times. This time fiberglass has been used to seal the plaster wall under the canvas, to prevent cracking as the building continues to settle on this busy thoroughfare.

Long time Salem members remember a period when a repainting of the surrounding canvas included a "little village," possibly suggesting Jerusalem.
