ANCHORS AWEIGH!

Even though Christmas is still weeks away, the Salem Stitchcrafters' gifts for seafarers passing through Baltimore's port are already wrapped and ready to go.

On Thursday, October 24, members of the group that meets weekly at Salem assembled 305 gifts, each one including a handcrafted hat and scarf, a copy of the New Testament, and a handwritten Christmas greeting. Blessed by Pastor Carolyn, these gifts will soon be on their way for points around the globe. There, on Christmas Eve, ships' captains will preside over Christmas Eve services and distribute our gifts.

We remember in prayer these crew members, whose lives are often difficult and lonely. May our gifts remind them that they are appreciated.

But that's not all!

Thinking locally, the Stitchcrafters have embarked on an eight-week challenge: How many hats can we make to warm the 150 heads (and hearts) of those at the Westside Emergency Men's Shelter? Our deadline is Thursday, December 19. We supply patterns and yarn.

Join us! All are welcome. We are a community group that meets most every Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon. Drop in and chat or stay for all two hours and knit and/or crochet with us.







SALEM'S MOLLER PIPE ORGAN

During this anniversary year, our Salem congregation will have had a number of opportunities to celebrate our 175 years musically. In September "Salem the Musical" put the words of our history to music, and all who attend the anniversary concert on November 10th will be lifted up with an afternoon of inspiration in the sanctuary. Music at Salem has had a fine history of its own, and since March 10, 1929, it has often been accompanied by our Moller organ.

In his history of his ministry, Pastor John Bowers wrote that on that day, described by him as a day of "unusual gladness," a congregation "filled the pews and aisles." Pr. Bowers preached on Psalm 66:2, "sing the glory of God's name, give to him glorious praise." He went on to report that "After the offering Mr. Moller, Sr., a close friend of our family for years, was introduced. He complimented us on the acquisition of such a suitable organ with all modern attachments and our cash payment for it." The purchase of a Moller organ was undoubtedly a step up for Salem. The original organ in the 1903 church was donated by a local group and certainly could not compare.

From 1875 to 1992, M.P. Moller, Inc. was a well-respected and prolific manufacturer of more than 11,000 fine instruments that served a broad United States market but in addition filled orders from Denmark, Japan, Mexico, England, South Africa, and Uruguay. Clearly churches were frequent customers, but Moller organs were sold to schools, concert halls, movie theaters, and private residences as well. They also manufactured many "Artiste" type instruments, smaller mass-produced instruments which were built to standard specifications with fewer sets of pipes.

The firm was founded in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania in 1875 by Danish immigrant Matthias Peter Moller. Achieving early success, he was persuaded to move his business to Hagerstown as the city worked to build its reputation as a manufacturing center. Pr. Ed Whetstone has shared the information

that the founder's son, also named Matthias Peter Moller, was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church, Hagerstown where Pr. Ed's father served as pastor in the 1950s and 1960s.

M.P. Moller, Inc. closed in 1992 after undergoing a series of labor disputes as well as a decline in orders. By that time, potential customers were selecting organs operating with solid-state electronics and a price below that of the traditional pipe organ.

Although M.P. Moller, Inc is no longer in business, we at Salem continue to appreciate the beauty of the instrument that we purchased in 1929 and give thanks that it has led us for 95 of our 175 years as we make a joyful noise together.



NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR SALEM MEMBERS TO ASSIST REFUGEES, TO WELCOME THE STRANGER

During this time when the Refugee Task Force is not actively sponsoring a family, there are still many meaningful opportunities to welcome newcomers to our community.

Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area (LSSNCA) continues to welcome new neighbors on a weekly basis across the D.C. metro area, with offices in Greenbelt, Arbutus, Frederick, Fairfax, and Woodbridge, as well as a Resource Center in Alexandria that serves as both a donation hub and a shopping experience for program participants. Our staff work tirelessly to support new arrivals, but we rely on volunteers to help meet the ongoing needs of these families. Volunteer opportunities include assisting families with setting up internet connections, driving them to appointments, or entertaining children during the case intake process. Volunteers who can assist with finding housing are also greatly appreciated, as housing remains a persistent challenge for many families.

Although my role at LSSNCA is not directly related to resettlement (I work as an IT project manager), I witness firsthand the impact that community support can have. I imagine that there are those who might be interested in occasional or more frequent opportunities to help ease the burdens of our refugee neighbors.
