A FAREWELL TO SALEM ANGELS MINISTRY? WE HOPE NOT!

Thirty years ago, Parish Assistant Jean Kohlenstein recognized the need for a ministry to provide meals to members who are ill, recovering, or in some special need who live alone or have no one at home to provide for them. Among the early volunteers were Darla Sando, Vicky Whetstone and Linda Ziegler who have shared leadership for the Salem Angels. This ministry further evolved to include hosting receptions for members' funerals when requested.

In years past there was a cadre of 15-20 members who volunteered to be called upon when meals were needed or receptions planned. The number varied across the years but always enough that volunteers were taking turns and serving as they were available.



For meals, generally 2-3 meals for a week or two are arranged when needed by members ill and living alone or without someone there to help care for them. For funeral receptions, serving generally takes 4 to 5 hours; were more volunteers available, separate responsibility for setup, serving and cleanup could be made.

In recent years, responsibility for funeral receptions (which have significantly increased in number), has fallen on Darla, Vicky and Linda alone. (There are volunteers willing to provide a dessert.) Meals are now provided by only a small handful of members. It varies, of course, but usually about 20 meals a year are supplied and about 8 receptions hosted.

Dozens and dozens of members across the years have found this ministry to be extremely thoughtful and, in some instances, a much-needed lifeline. You may yourself have appreciated this ministry. Or may hope it could be available to you or a loved one sometime in the future.

Unless there is a sufficient number of volunteers willing to provide meals OR help with funeral receptions, Salem will need to end this ministry before September. We hate to see this happen but it has become unsustainable with so few volunteers.

COMMUNITY DINNER COMMITTEE NEEDS YOUR HELP

In 2024, the Salem congregation formed strategic goals to advance our mission and ministry in Catonsville. One of these goals was to explore the possibility of a monthly community meal. Our mission is to support positive fellowship in our congregation and to extend a welcoming hand to the community. The Salem Monthly Community Dinner committee needs a bigger task force to help on the days of the events, which will be the first Thursday of each month, starting in October. We are hoping that Salem organizations and/or individuals will volunteer to "sponsor" a month. We are not asking for funds, but for helping hands. We need helpers for such tasks as setting up tables and chairs, setting the tables, making coffee and drinks, decorations, manning the serving line, washing dishes, cleaning up afterwards, etc. Also, due to Baltimore County health regulations, these meals would NOT be potlucks, but be prepared in the church kitchen (or catered). The first couple of months we intend to invite just our own congregation to see what (figurative) bugs need to be worked out of our operation, but our goal is to open dinner up to the whole community. SALEM WELCOMES MARDI NICKEL

In a congregation such as Salem, where there are so many names to remember, the name of one of our newest members is easy: "Mardi" as in "Gras," "Nickel" like the coin. A "cradle Lutheran," Mardi said that during her 20s, she checked out other houses of worship. But, as she recalled, "I always came back."

Before attending Salem, while living in Perry Hall, she was a longtime member (approximately 20 years) of St. John's Lutheran Church of Parkville, served by Pastors Matthew and Amy (nee Asendorf) Berger. When her son and daughter-in-law proposed that they buy a large house in Catonsville, one with private living quarters for her, Mardi had no doubt where she would be worshiping.

A retired nurse, Mardi worked for 50 years in a variety of capacities, from administrative positions to hands-on assignments. "I had great opportunities," she recalled. Retiring just before Covid, she noted, "I couldn't have timed it better." These days, she enjoys dolls and



dollhouses and dabbles in a number of craft activities. In addition to being close to two school-age grandchildren, she enjoys the company of two cats and one dog, not to mention the deer who visit her backyard on a daily basis.

As for Mardi's first visit to Salem, she said that she immediately felt welcome, even as she realized that she had sat in "someone's pew." These days, look for her at the 11 a.m. Sunday service, seated in the back corner, which is now, as it happens, "her pew."

NEW REFUGEE TASK FORCE CHAIR, UPDATES

We're grateful to Beth Rodgers who has graciously agreed to serve as our new Refugee Task Force chair. Beth has been a stalwart member of the TF these past ten years, and will be as grateful for the dedication and diligence of our task force members and the support of Salem congregation as I have been.

Since the Durrani family achieved their independence this past January, the TF is taking a rest from primary sponsorship. We remain amazed and filled with gratitude for the congregation's \$34,000 response to our February appeal for Lutheran Social Services/NCA and their desperate needs in this current refugee crisis, as well as a deluge of requested supplies during the following weeks. Additionally, the Social Ministry Committee dedicated their annual fundraiser for this cause and raised over \$3,000 for the refugee ministries of Global Refuge, Lutheran World Relief and LSS/NCA.

We are seeking to be supportive of others' efforts and have become engaged with the Howard County-based Interfaith Refugee Ministry. We are providing \$600 toward the dental needs of a local Afghan family refugee family and contributed \$1,500 for a month's rent for a recently arrived Burmese refugee family. We are also relaying the IRM's appeal for a car much needed by one of their sponsored families. If you could consider providing one, or know of one, please contact me.

We are glad to share some updates from the Durrani family. Masooma, who has remained employed at Forest Haven Home has applied to the Balto County School system for cafeteria work. Saba graduated from Catonsville High in June and is working as a receptionist at Forest Haven. She has begun college classes at CCBC, and Rohail continues his studies there. Lima had a very good sophomore year. Rohail, a 2024 graduate, is now working as a licensed producer for an insurance company. Several months ago Sahra and one year old Zaimab were back from Cleveland for a delightful visit.

In other new news of our families, Kaltrina Alaj was married July 3rd in a small ceremony in northern Virginia.

You have likely heard that the current administration has revoked Temporary Protective Status for our Afghan allies who came to the US after Kabul fell to the Taliban. These were all those Afghan nationals who served as translators, security forces and more to the US mission in Afghanistan. We believe the Durranis are safe having received their Asylum status last October. Our former families, of course, are all now citizens. (Masooma's husband, who was engaged in work for the US Army, was murdered by the Taliban when the children were young.)

Those Afghans who remain on TPS deserve our advocacy and prayers. Efforts since 2022 to create a more permanent pathway to citizenship for these allies have been stalled in Congress. As of July 24, these Afghans must leave the country because the Department of Homeland Security claims the conditions in Afghanistan have improved such that these men, women and children no longer need this protection. Current assessments from other countries, the UN, and International Relief and Development groups (not to mention friends in Pakistan) paint a very different picture: economic and employment insecurity, food shortages, gender violence and restrictions. Common sense and area reports predict retribution to those Afghans who choose to leave.

GUARDIANS OF EDEN

HART MILLER ISLAND Hart Miller Island is located in Baltimore County near Middle River east of the city. It was 2 separate islands but is now one, almost entirely man made. In 1981 the area was filled in by dredged material and this project was completed by 2012. The island is the home to many types of birds and wildlife. It can only be reached by boat.

GOE is sponsoring a free trip on September 30th. We will leave from Salem at 8:15, and carpool, meeting the boat at 9:00 a.m. The boat will cross to the island and return at noon. On the island, a shuttle and guide will give us a tour. If interested please contact Norma Hensler-Davis by August 20th. We will take a minimum of ten people and maximum of 20. Hope to see you there.

GOD'S WORK/OUR HANDS – GOE committee members will lead an activity on Saturday, September 6th from 9 a.m. to noon at Salem. We will continue efforts to remove English ivy from the border fence and grounds. Our primary goal is to plant a variety of native perennials to fill in under the existing tall trees and shrubs. GOE will purchase all the plants from a local nursery and will also provide composting materials and mulch for this project. We recommend that participants bring their own gloves and garden tools to use on this project if you have them, but shovels are the primary tool we do need. GOE does have some garden tools to use; however, extra equipment would be appreciated. We also will provide the yard waste bags, bottles of water and a snack. It is recommended also to wear long pants and sturdy, closed toed shoes and bring gloves. Prior to that day, poison ivy and sticker bushes will be removed. <u>UPDATES - RECENTLY PLANTED WHITE OAK TREE:</u> As you may have noticed the tree has fewer green leaves now than in May. No worries – the tree is still alive and thriving! The defoliation is evidence of how much insects love White Oak leaves. This is a natural part of the wonderfully diverse ecosystem that White Oaks are an essential part of. There is no need to purchase any fertilizer or insecticide. Nature's intricate and often unseen system of checks and balances is at work!

TREX RECYLE PROJECT: GOE will be setting up a "recycle" center to collect plastic film throughout the summertime. Examples of accepted items include grocery bags, bread bags, bubble wrap, newspaper sleeves, ice bags, plastic bottle casing wrap, produce bags, Ziploc and other recloseable food storage bags. **ALL PLASTIC MUST BE CLEAN, DRY AND FREE OF FOOD RESIDUE.** If Salem participates in the TREX recycling challenge and collects 1,000 lbs. of polyethylene plastic film, TREX will donate a bench to Salem made from these recycled materials. MORE DETAILS OF THIS PROJECT TO COME IN MIDJULY.

<u>CARBON FOOTPRINT:</u> What is a carbon footprint? A carbon footprint is the total amount of greenhouse gasses {including carbon dioxide and methane} that are generated by our actions. The average carbon footprint for a person in the United States is 16 tons, one of the highest rates in the world. Why is Salem considering reducing their carbon footprint? The reduction will help mitigate climate change and its adverse effects. In response to Listening Goal #7, over the last few months, GOE committee members have engaged in a factfinding effort to {1} compile a history of carbon footprint reduction actions taken by Salem over the years; {2} research what carbon footprint means and share this information with the Salem community; and {3} develop recommendations for promoting environmentally friendly practices throughout the congregation.

Here is a summary of past actions taken by the Property Committee members:

1997: Renovation of Building: replaced two oil fired heating system burners with natural gas fired burners

Early 2000's: replaced old metal framed windows in the Education Building Wing built circa 1950's onto the original building built circa 1903, with Pella double-paned insulated windows

Around 2010: updated 40 watt T12 fluorescent tube lighting with newer 32 watt T8 lighting & replaced stained glass window coverings throughout the Church Building with plexiglass providing additional insulation and protection

2013: replaced two heating system boilers with energy efficient Lochinvar boilers

2017: replacement of Frederick Road and Parking Lot wooden entrance doors with single panel panes with more efficient secure steel doors

2022: LED overhead lighting upgrade in Reformation Hall

2024: replaced interior fluorescent and exterior HID lighting fixtures with LED units. Incandescent and CFL light bulbs replaced with LED bulbs

In addition, the Property Committee has pursued solar energy panels for installation. In both endeavors to do so, Salem was deemed ineligible for solar panels due to the age and type of the roof.
