SALEM WELCOMES 12 NEW DISCIPLES

Kimberly and Don Evans have been married for 41 years and are residents of Charlestown Retirement Community. With a Math degree, Kimberly taught for 5 years. She then got an M.S. in Economics which led to a 22-year career at the U.S. Treasury Department. Don has a B.S. and M.S. in Electrical Engineering from Johns Hopkins University, and an advanced degree George Washington University Computer Design and Operation. Don applied his education to his 40-year career with Westinghouse/Northrup Grumman. Don and Kimberly met through their love of English Country Dancing. Kimberly loves to do embroidery, to read and to hike. Don has always loved to play piano and got to attend Peabody Prep.





If there was such a thing as an award for the oldest "new members" of Salem, **Debbie and Mark Sanders** would certainly be top contenders for that honor. While recently standing in the Wittenberg Room, they looked at the portraits of Salem's pastors and noted who had led the congregation when Debbie's father was growing up in the church.

That was just the beginning. Debbie was baptized and confirmed at Salem, and Mark was also baptized here just before the couple took their wedding vows before Salem's altar. When their daughter and son came along, they, too, were baptized here.

But then John's teaching position for what is now Verizon led them to Chicago. When he retired, they moved back. He pursued a second career, teaching math for the University of Phoenix and the Community College of Baltimore County at Catonsville. Once again retired, he spends a lot of time in his woodshop building, among other things, furniture.

As for Debbie, she is a lifelong organist. It was when she needed a page turner for an Easter cantata that she first met Mark. Since then, she has served at multiple congregations, and their family always worshiped where she played. Her recent positions as organist here in Catonsville include serving at Charlestown and Bishop Cummins Reformed Episcopal Church. Debbie is now retired. Because of that, and in light of the fact that they have lived in their Ellicott City home for more than forty years, they decided it was time to come home to Salem. Both Debbie and Mark have jumped headlong into Salem with various activities. She has joined the quilting group, and both of them have volunteered for Salem's Marketplace. They are pleased that they have been welcomed with open arms. Debbie particularly appreciates the liturgical setting of the 11 a.m. Sunday service. You can find them in the fourth row on the righthand side of the sanctuary, except when Debbie is filling in as a substitute for Salem Ringers, or on the organist's bench, when she fills in for Mary Miller.

Among Salem's newest members, there is one who truly needs no introduction. For the past four months, he's served us communion and led us in prayer, shared the Holy Scriptures and publicly professed his faith. And now, **Pastor Stan Steele** is officially one of us.

In case you've missed the story of his early years, Pastor Stan, a native of Columbia, South Carolina, is a lifelong Lutheran, baptized and confirmed in the faith. While a student at the University of South Carolina (he majored in International Relations), he was encouraged by his pastor to consider attending seminary after graduation. He did, and what followed is a lifetime of devotion to the work of the Church.

Although he had previously visited Salem for meetings, Pastor Stan first worshiped here on July 1. Unlike many other new members,



though, he was not "church shopping," but rather, beginning his time as our interim senior pastor. Having known Salem "by reputation" (which is "very positive"), he characterizes Salem as a "healthy congregation," truly a "community church" where people care for each other.

Previously, Pastor Stan has served in various positions in and around the area. He is currently living in Elkridge and noted that this is something of a central location for him to be near his family. His wife Stephanie, an ordained Lutheran pastor, is officially retired but still serving a congregation in Carroll County on a part-time basis. Together, they have three adult children and two granddaughters.

As for his somewhat limited spare time, Pastor Stan enjoys relaxing with a good book; in addition to theological works, he favors mysteries and other novels. Non-fiction work, not so much.

Nor is Pastor Stan a golfer: He finds the game "tedious and exasperating." Members of the Steele family are longtime Eagles and Phillies fans, but Pastor Stan likes the Ravens "quite a lot." He agreed that he did not land in Baltimore during the Orioles' best days. Meanwhile, he continues to root for the Gamecocks of USC, a team that "continues to break my heart."

His musical taste is "eclectic," including classical music, jazz and classic rock. "I'm all over the dial." He enjoys British television shows. And having appreciated the recent Bob Dylan biopic, he is looking forward to seeing the new Springsteen movie. No horror films, please. Finally, Pastor Stan made his Salem Players debut in the recent production of "70, Girls, 70."

Asked what service he attends and where he sits (questions asked of new members for their "Monarch" biography), Pastor Stan laughed, "If there is a service, I'm there." Even when he is not leading Saturday evening service, he sometimes slips into a back pew.

When Salem welcomes a new Senior Pastor, Pastor Stan will be moving on. At that time, he said he looks forward to the bishop finding something else for him to do. "I'm not the retiring type."

CHILDREN'S HOME FOOD DELIVERY TEAM'S FOURTH ANNIVERSARY

Four years ago on November 1, 2021, volunteers from Salem began a food delivery ministry to support the children and staff of The Children's Home. This Catonsville nonprofit, established in 1863, provides residential therapeutic care to youth 13 to 21 who have experienced abuse, abandonment, neglect, violence, or are in need of supervised care. Our ministry came about when former pastor, Rev Dave Asendorf, contacted The Children's Home to ask how Salem could serve them. Expecting to hear that they were in need of tutors or mentors, he was surprised to learn that their biggest need was for reliable volunteers who could pick up food donated by Chick-Fil and deliver it to their kitchen three times a week. Chick-Fil-A, like all restaurants, has to refresh all the food they have on the service line at fixed times with freshly cooked food, but the food they pull is still good to eat. It is bagged up and put on a designated shelf in their walk-in freezer, where it is picked up by our volunteers every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Children's Home kitchen staff can incorporate these donated biscuits, rolls, chicken, macaroni and cheese, etc. into the 160 or so meals they serve to the residents and staff every day. Prior to Salem volunteers assuming these deliveries, Children's Home staff had to go out and pick up the food three times a week.

In four years, our volunteers have done over 620 of these deliveries! An average daily delivery consists of about 60 pounds, so that comes out to **over 37,000 pounds of food!**

We have eleven current volunteers and ten past volunteers who have served faithfully.

As far as the impact of this ministry, the Children's Home staff regularly express their gratitude for the faithfulness of our team. In the past our group was honored by their Volunteer of the Year award. They have been dubbed by one staff member the "Stealth Volunteers," for being so steady, quiet and reliable. As for Chick-Fil-A, they noticed our team's consistency and commitment and gave a \$100,000 Community Engagement award to the Children's Home to recognize their partnership with Salem volunteers. And at this year's annual meeting our volunteers were honored once again with an award for their service.
